> At the suggestion of Sheila Tate, I am writing to request a date on which Phyllis Richman, a Washington Post photographer, and I would be able to visit the White House "wine cellar" and to discuss the general subject of wines with a member of the Reagan administration.

As indicated from the enclosed letter of March 6, 1981, you can see that we have been discussing this request for some months now with various White House personnel. I first discussed the subject with Larry Speakes following my letter of February 23, 1981 (copy enclosed). He suggested that Sheila would want to handle the subject after consulting with Mrs. Reagan. Following several conversations with Sheila and Betsy Koons, it was decided that a visit should not be scheduled until later in the spring. When I checked back with Sheila in May, she indicated that, rather than interviewing John Ficklin (to whom I had also spoken), we should contact you. We were told to arrange a visit through Craig Fuller, it has been impossible to reach. Finally, in checking with your aide Shirley Moore, it appears that a direct written request to you is appropriate at this time.

Realizing that your schedule is a demanding one, we would hope to speak with you regarding the White House "cellar" operation and the Reagan family's wine tastes during an interview of thirty minutes duration. Because I will be in France June 15-July 5, 1981, we would suggest any date (including Saturdays) after July 6, 1981. Although I had hoped to have the article for Mrs. Richman to run during the week of Bastille Day (July 16th edition), we could accomplish that only if the visit were scheduled for July 7th, 8th, 9th or 10th. We fully realize that your schedule is subject to that of the President's and leave the choice of a date to your best judgment.

Many Served At White House

Reagan Helps Napa Valley Wines

By JEFF MAPES Scripps League Newspapers

WASHINGTON — Since taking of fice, President Reagan has become a hind of super-salesman for California wines, particularly those from the vapa Valley.

California wines are now served exclusively at State dinners and White House affairs, and choosing the right wine gets the care and attention of a big-deal federal issue.

Simply put, the matter is not left up to the domestic staff. Deputy Chief of Staff Michael Deaver, one of Reagan's "Big Three" advisors, personally tastes each wine before it is served at the White House, and he frequently confers with a Sacramento wine merchant to talk over the latest

releases on the market.

Dever, 45, is a longtime intimate of Reagan and has had an equally long love for wine. When he went to work at the White House, Deaver decided to expose Washington's diplomatic and political community to the best vintages and varietals California has to offer.

"We're very proud about the fact we're Californians and we have this product," Deaver said in an interview in his quarters next to the presidential Oval Office. "We have the very best wines in this country. The hardest part is to pick" which ones to serve.

Not surprisingly, Napa Valley wines are at the top of the list. More than two dozen local wineries have had their products served at the

White House under Reagan. Perhaps the most frequently served is Jack Davies' Schramsberg Cremant champagne, which Deaver said "is terrific" for those after-dinner toasts in honor of visiting heads of state.

Wine has not typically received such high-level attention at the White House. Deaver said the beverage has gotten a mixed reaction from recent presidents.

"President Nixon evidently loved good French wine," Deaver said, "and Gerald Ford I guess didn't care one way or another and Jimmy Carter, I don't know if he knew the difference between a '52 Margaux and a case of Almaden."

Deaver pauses a moment. "I shouldn't say that," he added with a

smile. "It's making Almaden sound like nothing and they have very nice wines."

Deaver relies heavily on Dave Berkley, 39, the wine taster and buyer for Corti Bros. markets in Sacramento. Berkley also has a monthly show on food and wine that airs on a Sacramento television station.

The two became friends after Deaver came to Sacramento to work in the governor's office under Reagan. When Reagan won the presidency, Deaver "requested that! put together a list of representative California wines available in Washington, D.C.," Berkley recalled in a telephone interview. That wasn't

Soon Berkley was sending back new wines for Deaver to taste and conferring frequently with the White House chef to make sure the wines properly complement the menu.

"There has been a commitment to give as much representation as possible to the different areas of production, the different varietals and the different producers," Berkley explained. "We try to continually offer new wines."

Now Deaver has a closet stuffed full of wine not only from Berkley but from vintners anxious to have their wines served at the White House. "The smart ones" will donate wine for dinners, Deaver joked. He makes it worthwhile: he usually sends White House Menu cards listing the wines served along with a photo to the president to the wineries to display in their tasting rooms.

Now, a visit with Deaver is a sought-after stop for winemakers visiting Washington. The Sonoma County vintners recently met with Deaver and left 34 wines for his perusal.

"There's no way we're going to be able to serve all these," Deaver said, "but one or two will pop out for a luncheon or dinner."

In fact, Deaver now has regular wine tastings on Friday afternoons with a select group of White House staffers and media bigwigs (Bill Plante of CBS News is one frequent participant) to choose wines for future White House dinners.

Deaver said he is eclectic in his choices.

"We stick with the cabernets, we drink a lot of chardonnay, we drink some chenin blanc and gewurztraminer. We've tried some of the late harvest dessert wines..."


