REAGAN ADMINISTRATION WOMEN APPOINTMENTS

In his first two years in office, President Reagan selected more women to serve in top full-time policy-making positions than any other President in history during a comparable time period. By January 31, 1983, Reagan had selected 105 women for these top positions compared to 101 by the previous Administration in the first two years. As of today, over 160 women have been selected for these significant posts. All told, Reagan has selected women for over 1600 important positions; 234 for the Senior Executive Service, over 800 for high-level Schedule C jobs (GS-13, \$36,327 per year, and above) and more than 400 for part-time presidential advisory boards.

President Reagan has three women serving in Cabinet-level positions -- more than any other President has ever had: Elizabeth Dole at the Department of Transportation, Margaret Heckler at Health and Human Services, and Jeane Kirkpatrick at the United Nations. He has appointed Sandra Day O'Connor to be the first woman to serve on the Supreme Court. Women serve as heads of eight major federal agencies in the Reagan Administration: Nancy Steorts, Chairman of the Consumer Product Safety Commission; Janet Steiger, Chairman of the Postal Rate Commission; Lee Ann Elliott, Chairman of the Federal Election Commission; Rosemary Collyer, Chairman of the Mine Safety and Health Review Commission; Susan E. Phillips, Director of the Institute of Museum Services; Barbara Mahone, Chairman of the Federal Labor Relations Authority; Susan M. Phillips, Chairman of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission; and Loret Ruppe, Director of the Peace Corps. Other high-ranking women include: Carol Dinkins, the Deputy Attorney General; Martha Seger, Member of the Federal Reserve Board; Ann McLaughlin, Under Secretary of Interior; Katherine Ortega, Treasurer of the United States; Aulana Peters, Member of the Securities and Exchange Commission; Mary Ann Dawson, Commissioner of the Federal Communications Commission; Mary Kate Bush, Alternate U.S. Director of the International Monetary Fund; Patricia Diaz Dennis, Member, National Labor Relations Board, Paula Tennant, Commissioner, U.S. Parole Commission; and the Ambassadors to, among other places, East Germany, Austria, and UNESCO. The President has also chosen Faith Whittlesey to be one of his chief aides at the White House in charge of Public Liaison.
