INFORMATION COLLECTION

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Drug-Free Schools Recognition Program

The Drug-Free Schools Recognition Program will recognize 50-100 schools with exemplary drug prevention programs. Schools will be nominated by State Departments of Education and other agencies involved in preventing drug abuse. Nominated schools will be reviewed and visited by a panel consisting of a law enforcement officer, a guidance counselor, an individual who has worked with drug abuse programs, a minister, a parent of a teenager, or a community representative who is acquainted with drug programs. Schools or programs selected for recognition will be honored at ceremonies in Washington, D.C.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Criteria and Procedures for Evaluation of K-12 Substance Abuse Curricula

The Criteria and Procedures for Evaluation of K-12 Substance Abuse Curricula Project will develop, produce, and disseminate a guide to help school and district staffs select and implement substance abuse curricula for elementary and secondary schools. Specifically, the guide will: (1) direct attention to a number of critical issues that research indicates should be considered in the selection and implementation of substance abuse curricula; (2) provide a typology to serve as a framework for school districts to classify, review, and evaluate substance abuse curricula; (3) provide criteria or standards for evaluating substance abuse curricula; and (4) suggest strategies which have proven effective for translating curricula into effective practice in classrooms and schools.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

American Association of School Administrators

For the past two years, NHTSA has contracted with the American Association of School Administrators to perform two tasks. The first is to assess the current status of programs on traffic safety offered in public schools. A draft final report has been prepared describing the results of this assessment. The second is to incorporate traffic safety issues into the program of the annual Seaside Health Promotion Conference held in Seaside, Oregon.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

National Institute of Justice (NIJ)

Violence Prevention Education Field Test

This project will evaluate the impact of a violence prevention curriculum on the attitudes and behavior of tenth graders. A two week curriculum module is to be tested in ten cities across the country. The evaluation includes an examination of school academic and disciplinary records for both treatment and control subjects at two sites.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA)

Prevention Research (including Incidence and Prevalence of Drug Abuse and Drug Use and Lifestyles of American Youth)

The Prevention Research Program funds etiological, intervention, and clinical epidemiological research on psychological, genetic, and environmental factors which predispose or protect individuals from drug abuse. The special focus of this research is on early childhood and adolescent populations. Current research includes an assessment of the efficiency of drug abuse prevention programs based upon social learning theory and the combined effects of school and community efforts on problems of drug abuse. Special attention is being given to strengthening the schools' capacity for early identification and referral. In addition to the survey, NIDA's programs also include longitudinal studies of drug use, the consequences of drug abuse, vulnerability to drug abuse, and etiology.

NIDA, in cooperation with three national health education associations and participating Federal agencies, has initiated the National Adolescent Student Health Survey. The Survey of 8th and 10th grade students examines such issues as health-related knowledge, practices and attitudes regarding drug and alcohol use, sexually transmitted diseases, AIDS, suicide, and violence.

The Drug Use and Lifestyles of American Youth High School Survey continues an ongoing series of surveys of young men and women begun in 1975. The survey consists of two interconnected parts: an annual survey of a nationally representative sample of 16,000-18,000 seniors in 130 high schools and annual follow-up surveys mailed to a subset of each senior class for the first ten years following graduation. The broad content of the study includes attitudes, beliefs, and perceptions about drug use and other relevant psychosocial factors. The study aims to monitor annual trends in drug use and to uncover the causes, consequences, and patterns associated with drug use. Findings from the study are reported through various media.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA)

Alcohol Prevention Program

The Alcohol Prevention Program supports studies aimed at reducing the incidence and prevalence of alcohol abuse and alcoholism through interventions, such as school-based programs for children and adolescents. These programs are developed, tested, implemented, and evaluated especially for youth populations, including high-risk groups such as the children of alcoholics.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Model Schools Data Base

This project is a management information system for the Department of Education. It will allow ED better access to information about model drug abuse prevention programs around the country.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

New Research Perspectives on Student Drug Abuse

The New Research Perspectives on Student Drug Abuse project will support a series of commissioned papers prepared by 10-15 leading scholars and researchers. They will be asked to examine drug issues anew and to contribute to the development of a research agenda that will assist efforts to eliminate drug abuse in schools. Several tutorial workshops will be convened to provide a forum to present the commissioned papers.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

OSAP is legislatively mandated to help prevent alcohol and drug problems by, among other activities: coordinating the findings of research sponsored by agencies of the Public Health Service on the prevention of drug and alcohol abuse; conducting training, technical assistance, data collection, and evaluation activities of programs supported under the Drug-Free Schols and Communities Act of 1986; and supporting the development of model, innovative, community-based programs to discourage alcohol and drug abuse among young people.

INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Schools Without Drugs Publications

The Department of Education distributes free a number of publications to assist prevention efforts. Among these is Schools Without Drugs, a guidebook for parents, school officials, and community leaders. The book offers a plan for schools to eliminate drug use. It also offers resources, legal information, model programs, and references. ED also publishes a bi-monthly newsletter, The Challenge, which highlights successful programs, provides the latest information on effective programs, and answers questions from school officials and others. And finally, ED has distributed information on crack cocaine and steroids.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA)

Prevention Programs Direction

BIA (assisted by Administration for Native Americans (ANA) and IHS of the DHHS) is conducting an American Indian Youth Conference. The major focus of the conference is prevention and health activities to increase awareness among American Indian youth of the risks and consequences of alcohol and substance abuse; to develop strategies for successful self-control; to exchange ideas for peer modeling in schools; and to develop youth leadership networks as part of community support systems. Indian youth and parents representing public, private, and BIA-funded schools are selected to attend. Supporting materials for youth and parents are developed for school distribution following the Conference.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Prevention Guide Update

The existing Prevention Guide describes curricula on alcohol and drug use and impaired driving. It will be updated to include revisions to curricula already in the Guide and to highlight the many new curricula available. Intervention programs, especially those for high schools, will be included. Curricula will be categorized according to subjects covered and suitability for various grades. An overview of State legislation regarding drug and alcohol curriculum requirements will also be included.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Audiovisual Grants Program

Up to 16 grants will be awarded for the development and distribution of audiovisual materials to elementary and secondary schools. These materials, which will focus on drug abuse prevention, will be close-captioned videotapes with brief teacher guides.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

"Breaking Barriers: A Traffic Safety Manual for High School Student Leaders"

This manual provides information on planning and implementing alcohol and safety belt projects. It is intended for student leaders and organizations such as the Future Farmers of America.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Future Farmers of America

The Future Farmers of America, composed of 450,000 high school students nationwide, has published a program manual for classroom use regarding the effect of alcohol and drug use on driving. In addition, they have designed training for a leadership conference.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

"A Winning Combination: An Alcohol, Drug, and Traffic Safety Manual for College Campuses"

This manual for colleges and universities addresses how to plan, implement, and evaluate drug abuse and traffic safety programs on campus. The manual discusses such topics as policies and procedures; programs; dealing with problems; staff training; the campus and community; evaluations; and liability. Each chapter consists of an overview of the issue written by experts. In addition, the manual contains an "Idea Sampler" of materials for use by colleges.

DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY

U.S. Customs Service

"You Can Help!" Drug Education Campaign

The "You Can Help!" drug education campaign includes a slide show, audiovisuals, and a U.S. Customs Service Drug Awareness Kit. These materials are targeted primarily at parents and adults to make them more knowledgeable about the drug problem in their communities and schools.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT (HUD) AND DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

HUD and Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

Regional Conferences on Drug-Free Public Housing

OSAP is assisting HUD in conducting regional conferences on drug-free public housing. This assistance includes providing appropriate materials on drug abuse prevention.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Youth Impaired Driving - Public Hearings

These five public hearings are focusing on the problem of youthful impaired driving and the need to address this problem systemwide. Testimony has been requested to provide information on programs conducted by schools, communities, courts, treatment agencies, and the police and to dramatize the successes and weaknesses of efforts to reduce impaired driving by youth.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Directory of Youth DWI Programs

NHTSA is providing funds for the development of a <u>Directory of Youth DWI Programs</u> that will include State and community impaired driving programs for youth. Developing the <u>Directory will require</u> a nationwide search to identify sample programs and strategies for all segments of a community's comprehensive effort to reduce impaired driving. The <u>Directory will provide</u>: (1) goals and objectives for each segment of a community's effort to control youthful impaired driving; (2) an assessment instrument to determine which segments are active and which need activity to begin; and (3) examples of program activity, with contact people identified, for each segment.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration has joined with the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism, the National Association of Broadcasters, and the States to discourage chemically impaired driving. Fact sheets on drinking and driving and recipes for non-alcoholic drinks were printed. With the assistance of the National Association of Broadcasters, public service announcements were also provided to all television stations.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)

Law Enforcement Explorer Drug Abuse Prevention Project

DEA is presently involved in a drug abuse prevention effort with the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Explorers. In May 1984, BSA, DEA and Texans War on Drugs jointly sponsored a training seminar for posts from six communities in Texas. The result of the seminar has been the development of a guidebook which was printed and distributed to approximately 2,000 Explorer posts and BSA councils around the country.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES (HHS) AND DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

National Clearinghouse for Alcohol and Drug Information

The Clearinghouse provides information and services to those with questions or concerns about all types of drug problems, including alcohol abuse, illicit drug use, and misuse of prescription drugs. Special target groups for the Clearinghouse are community leaders, those working with youth, parents, health and human service providers, and persons with alcohol or other drug-related problems.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

Media and Materials

Through a variety of media and publications, the Office for Substance Abuse Prevention provides drug abuse prevention information targeted at youth, their families, and schools.

For example, OSAP developed "Cocaine: The Big Lie."

To address increasing cocaine use among older teenagers and young adults, OSAP has launched a multi-media campaign, "Cocaine, The Big Lie." The campaign focuses on the addictive qualities of cocaine, its potential for producing severe, negative health effects, and the need to seek treatment. As part of the campaign, an 800-toll-free number, which directs users to treatment facilities in their local communi- ties, has been established. Also included in the campaign is the publication, Cocaine Addiction, It Costs Too Much.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)

Publications

DEA's publications are designed to support and complement other DEA prevention activities. The publications inform and educate the general public as well as special interest groups. Popular publications include Drugs of Abuse, DEA's standard reference which describes drug terms and symptoms; the Soozie and Katy Coloring Book, which is targeted for students in kindergarten through third grade; Controlled Substances: Use, Abuse, and Effects, which provides descriptions of generic drugs of abuse; and Drug Enforcement, a magazine which discusses issues of interest to health professionals and law enforcement officials.

DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT (HUD)

Speakers Bureau

Following the National Conference on Drug-Free Public Housing, HUD received numerous requests for speakers addressing drug abuse and prevention. Consequently, HUD is developing a Speakers Bureau comprised of local and national experts. The Bureau will put local Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) in touch with appropriate persons who would be willing to speak at either a residents' meeting or a local or State PHA meeting.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

National Institute of Justice (NIJ)

"Drug Prevention Education"

This Issues and Practices report documents the approaches used in four jurisdictions to plan, design, and implement drug education programs for elementary school students. These programs feature cooperation between law enforcement agencies and public schools to present materials on the dangers of using drugs, on how to resist peer pressure to take drugs, and on student self-concept. The report will describe the agreements between the law enforcement agencies and schools, the curricula used, the selection and training of police officers, and the results of current short-term evaluations of the programs.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)

Films and Public Service Announcements

This program involves the following: (1) the development of films and videos which are used primarily as training materials for schools, community organizations, and government agencies; and (2) the effective dissemination of those films and videos. The program also develops, produces, and markets public service announcements that are used to increase public awareness of drug abuse and to promote a drug-free lifestyle.

DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY

U.S. Customs Service

"Users Become Losers"

The "Users Become Losers" anti-drug public service announcements feature individuals who have had someone close to them die or who have experienced serious negative consequences as a result of illegal drug use. These radio, television, and print announcements have been distributed to stations throughout the country as a way to alert individuals to the dangers of drug abuse.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA)

Memorandum of Agreement with the Indian Health Service

This Memorandum of Agreement seeks to coordinate BIA and IHS resources and services for alcohol and substance abuse prevention, intervention, treatment, and aftercare among American Indians. As part of that effort, a newsletter will be distributed to tribes.

ACTION

Drug Alliance

ACTION provides financial support to a number of independent agencies throughout the country for projects designed to prevent substance abuse among school-age youth. For example, the Colorado Federation of Parents for Drug-Free Youth received funding to organize and train parents, youth, and community groups throughout the State to establish Be Smart! Don't Start! Just Say No! Clubs. The Just Say No Foundation of Walnut Creek, California, also received funding to encourage community-based service organizations to support Just Say No! Clubs in elementary schools. ACTION sponsors many other initiatives aimed at drug abuse prevention among youth: Title I Part C Demonstration Grants for drug abuse prevention activities; Community-Based Volunteer Demonstration Grants; Other Demonstration Projects; and Support and Public Awareness Initiatives.

ASSISTANCE

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Regional Centers Program

The Department of Education maintains five regional centers to:

(1) train school teams to combat drug and alcohol abuse;

(2) assist State educational agencies in coordinating and strengthening alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs;

(3) assist local educational agencies and institutions of higher education in developing and maintaining programs for teachers and administrators; and (4) evaluate effective substance abuse prevention programs and disseminate information about them.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

State and Local Programs

State and Local Programs is a formula grant program which allocates funds to States and Territories based on their school-age populations. Each State's allocation is divided between the State educational agency (SEA) and the Office of the Governor. The SEA must allot at least 90 percent of the funds it receives to local educational agencies to improve alcohol and drug abuse education, prevention, early intervention, and rehabilitation programs. The Governor provides financial support for the alcohol and drug abuse programs of community-based organizations.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Schools Without Drugs: The Challenge

The Challenge is a follow-up to the Department of Education's handbook, Schools Without Drugs, and is sponsored by the Department of Education and 14 national associations. The Challenge program invites schools and communities to establish or sustain an alcohol and drug abuse prevention program based on the principles of Schools Without Drugs. The objectives are to mobilize schools and local communities and to combine the efforts of students, parents, teachers, school administrators, law enforcement officials, and community organizations to get alcohol and drugs out of schools.

The Challenge provides names and locations of schools close to a new member and provides the name of a contact person within a school where special activities have been helpful in efforts to fight drug and alcohol abuse. The Challenge provides a bimonthly newsletter which describes successful anti-drug programs, what other schools are doing, and information on current research.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Federal Activities Grants Program

The Federal Activities Grants Program supports the following prevention activities: model development, dissemination, technical assistance, and curriculum development. Awards are made to State educational agencies, local educational agencies, institutions of higher education, and other nonprofit agencies, organizations, and institutions.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Training and Demonstration Grants to Institutions of Higher Education

The Training and Demonstration Grants to Institutions of Higher Education support preservice and inservice training or the demonstration of programs for elementary and secondary schools. Institutions of higher education are the only eligible applicants.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED) AND DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

ED and Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA)

Program for Indian Youth

The Program for Indian Youth provides funds for alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs for Indian children on reservations attending elementary and secondary schools operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The law also permits grants or contracts with recognized Indian tribes.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA)

Prevention Education Programs (School Counseling Training, Substance Abuse Curriculum, and Resource Center)

The purpose of this initiative is to provide counselors at BIA-funded schools with training in individual student crisis intervention, including problems of alcohol and drug abuse. Guidelines have also been developed to include an alcohol and substance abuse curriculum in all BIA-funded schools. And finally, BIA maintains a resource center to give tribes and tribal schools easy access to alcohol and substance abuse information. Information from States and private nonprofit organizations will be available at the resource center.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Program for Hawaiian Natives

The Program for Hawaiian Natives provides financial assistance to organizations primarily serving and representing Hawaiian natives recognized by the Governor of the State of Hawaii. Funds are used to plan, conduct, and administer alcohol and drug abuse education and prevention programs that are consistent with the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

Sports Drug Awareness Program

The Sports Drug Awareness Program seeks to prevent drug abuse among school-age youth with special emphasis on the role of the coach and student athlete. With the coaches' commitment to preventing drug abuse, student athletes are encouraged to become role models, using positive peer pressure to dissuade other students from abusing drugs.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE (DOD)

Drug Prevention Program for DOD Schools

DOD's Drug Prevention Program has the following objectives:
(1) to improve the capability to determine the extent and character of drug use; (2) to establish specific rules regarding drug possession, use, and distribution; (3) to enforce established policies against drug use; (4) to implement security measures to eliminate drugs at schools; and (5) to reach out to the community for support and assistance in making each school's anti-drug policy and program work. DOD schools will be participating in the Department of Education's Challenge program and piloting the DARE Program. Developed by the Los Angeles Unified School District and Police Department, DARE helps students develop peer resistance skills while enhancing self-esteem. It features law enforcement officers as teachers. In addition, the Department of Defense, in association with the University of Michigan's Institute for Social Research, will be implementing a survey of drug use for individual schools within the DOD school system.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Project Graduation

Project Graduation encourages chemical-free parties and events to reduce the incidence of alcohol and other drug-related highway fatalities among young people during commencement season. It also serves to heighten public awareness about teenage drinking and driving. The Program has been instituted in all 50 States, Canada, and two foreign countries. A downward trend in teenage drinking and driving fatalities has been observed in those communities conducting Project Graduation.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), and Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI)

Demand Reduction Drug Prevention

This project provides the following: (1) demand reduction training and technical assistance for all FBI/DEA field officers; and (2) a national conference for school officials to participate in Sports Drug Awareness Program training. DEA and FBI will work closely with BJA on a series of new "sports heroes" anti-drug public service announcements. BJA will also coordinate with numerous public and private agencies in the filming of a 30-minute motor sports anti-drug video designed for high school students.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) and Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)

Super Teams of the Washington Metropolitan Area

The purpose of this project is to prevent the use of drugs and alcohol in schools. It includes the following activities: (1) forming support groups among athletes and school personnel; (2) teaching athletes alternatives to the use of alcohol and other drugs; (3) assisting athletes in developing strategies to resist peer pressure to use drugs; (4) developing positive standards (norms) regarding alcohol and drug use; (5) formulating action plans to improve individual and group achievement; and (6) assisting student athletes in developing skills to help younger children in elementary and junior high schools resist alcohol and drug use.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)

Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) Program: Grants

As administered by the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), DARE is a prevention program that teaches kids to resist drug use. The Bureau of Justice Assistance has funded seven demonstration projects to plan and organize DARE programs, using the LAPD DARE program as a model.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)

Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) Program: Training

Numerous requests received by the Bureau of Justice Assistance have focused on the need for training for agencies wishing to replicate the DARE program. Regional Training Centers will make training more accessible to local agencies than the present system of conducting all training in Los Angeles.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE AND DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

National Institute of Justice (NIJ) and ED

Safe Schools Program

The Safe Schools Program is a joint effort of the National Institute of Justice and the Department of Education. The Program offers resources to school administrators for increasing the safety and stability of the learning environment, while enhancing administrator accountability. The approach involves the development of locally tailored solutions for reducing crime and disruption in all schools, including those with the most serious safety problems.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

National Student Safety Program Conference

The National Student Safety Program Conference showcases student traffic safety programs. It provides training for young people from across the country to help save lives on the Nation's highways.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Road to Winning Assembly Program

The Road to Winning Assembly Program uses professional and college athletes to lead high school assemblies that provide students with information about the risks associated with alcohol and drug use and driving. NHTSA makes available a kit that States can use to organize the assemblies.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

National School Safety Center

The National School Safety Center is a comprehensive national effort to make schools safer places in which to learn, work, and teach. The Center seeks to determine the magnitude of school crime and violence, identifying ways to diminish both. Reducing the demand for and the supply of drugs in and around schools has been a focus of the Center for the last two years.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA)

National Crime Prevention Campaign

Working together, citizens, local governments, and law enforcement officials are beginning to restore a sense of security to communities and schools. Through a Cooperative Agreement with the National Crime Prevention Council, this Campaign will develop and disseminate crime prevention materials, provide technical assistance and training, and support a clearinghouse for storage and dissemination of materials for those working to prevent crime.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Network of Drug-Free Colleges

The Network of Drug-Free Colleges project will support the development of a National network of colleges committed to eliminating drug abuse on their campuses. Initial efforts will focus on four-year residential colleges. A core group of 10-12 colleges that have expressed strong commitments to eliminating drugs on their campuses will be convened to formulate goals and strategies for the development of the network. The network will be supported by existing research and expertise that will be shared through newsletters, conferences, forums, and electronic communications.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Drug Prevention Program for Students Enrolled in Institutions of Higher Education

The Drug Prevention Program is designed to encourage institutions of higher education to attack the problem of substance abuse among students and staff. The Program focuses on prevention and seeks to improve both the institution's and the community's prevention efforts through collaboration. Institutions of higher education compete for two-year grants with a new, two-year cohort starting each year.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Techniques for Effective Alcohol Management (TEAM)

The goals of Techniques for Effective Alcohol Management (TEAM) are to create a more enjoyable entertainment atmosphere, to promote effective crowd control, and to increase the safety of those attending sporting and entertainment events in public assembly facilities. Special emphasis is placed on curtailing the consumption of alcoholic beverages by those under the legal drinking age and eliminating the sale of alcoholic beverages to those same individuals.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

Maritime Administration

Midshipmen Alcohol and Drug Education Program

This Program is a comprehensive educational program using lectures, posters, and films to warn midshipmen of the dangers of alcohol and drug abuse. Specific briefings are scheduled for midshipmen departing for their six-month periods of training aboard merchant ships. Individual counseling is also available for those midshipmen referred by the Commandant or who request counseling on a volunteer basis.

ACTION

Drug Alliance

ACTION provides financial support to a number of independent agencies throughout the country for projects designed to prevent substance abuse among school-age youth. For example, the Colorado Federation of Parents for Drug-Free Youth received funding to organize and train parents, youth, and community groups throughout the State to establish Be Smart! Don't Start! Just Say No! Clubs. The Just Say No Foundation of Walnut Creek, California, also received funding to encourage community-based service organizations to support Just Say No! Clubs in elementary schools. ACTION sponsors many other initiatives aimed at drug abuse prevention among youth: Title I Part C Demonstration Grants for drug abuse prevention activities; Community-Based Volunteer Demonstration Grants; Other Demonstration Projects; and Support and Public Awareness Initiatives.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

Model Community-Based Prevention Program

The Model Community-Based Prevention Program has five objectives: (1) to promote community-based programs to prevent illegal alcohol and drug use; (2) to develop coordination among business, industry, the media, law enforcement officials, health professionals, and local communities in their efforts to prevent substance abuse; (3) to identify resources and respond to gaps in a community's ability to prevent the illegal use of alcohol and other drugs; (4) to encourage existing programs to adopt prevention messages; and (5) to increase awareness of local prevention and treatment resources for alcohol and drug use.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

Technical Assistance and Training Workshops for Ethnic Minorities

Under this program, OSAP will obtain the services of a contractor to: (1) assist in raising the level of awareness among minorities about the harmful effects and negative consequences of drug abuse; and (2) encourage minority organizations and other organizations serving minority populations to make alcohol and other drug abuse prevention a priority. The contractor will assist in accomplishing these objectives by providing on-site technical assistance; conducting workshops; providing alcohol and other drug prevention training; and providing speakers, panelists, and facilitators at conferences and workshops sponsored by minority organizations and other organizations serving minorities.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

Technical Assistance and Conferences for Parents, Youth, and the Community

The purpose of the Technical Assistance and Conferences for Parents, Youth, and the Community is to assist communities with their alcohol and drug abuse prevention initiatives. Assistance will include: (1) providing on-site technical assistance to schools, organizations, and agencies; (2) establishing a pool of experts to serve as consultants; (3) developing and field testing training materials for use by parents and organizations; and (4) conducting workshops and conferences on substance abuse prevention.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Office for Substance Abuse Prevention (OSAP)

"Be Smart! Don't Start! Just Say No!"

The "Be Smart! Don't Start! Just Say No!" campaign is targeted at preteens, ages 8-12, parents, teachers, and others who influence the attitudes and behavior of adolescents, before they face increased peer and societal pressure to drink. The campaign is designed to teach the facts about alcohol and drinking and to mobilize local governments, professional organizations, the media, and other interested groups to take action in their local communities.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP)

Systemwide Response Curriculum

The Systemwide Response Curriculum will be used to coordinate community resources dealing with impaired driving and alcohol and drug use. Collateral efforts include: (1) convening a national conference of private, nonprofit organizations to identify technical assistance which can be offered at the local level; and (2) developing a student peer leader training curriculum which is available at selected sites.

ACTION

Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP)

A total of 5,790 RSVP volunteers in 129 projects are involved in drug abuse prevention and treatment. These volunteers contribute over 1,000,000 hours of service.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)

Youth Compendium of Program Ideas

The Youth Compendium of Program Ideas is designed to assist community program coordinators in identifying the resources they need to reduce impaired driving by the young and to coordinate the goals and objectives of those addressing drug abuse prevention. Additionally, the project seeks to identify those programs and strategies that are best suited for implementation in schools and community businesses.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

U.S. Coast Guard

Just Say No

The goals of this project are the following: (1) to develop a prevention curriculum which will be used in child development centers, day-care homes, and individual family homes; (2) to educate individuals about the negative effects of illicit drug use; and (3) to schedule training to publicize the drug abuse prevention program.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION (ED)

Grants to Governors

This is part of the Department of Education's formula grant program which allocates funds to States based on school-age population. Each State's allocation is divided between the State educational agency (70%) and the Office of the Governor (30%). The Governor provides financial support for anti-drug abuse efforts to community-based organizations. At least 50% of the Governor's funds must be used for programs for high-risk youth.
