

The Work and Family Information Center

A Work and Family Information Center has been established at The Conference Board, an independent business research organization. This new service has been funded, in part, by a grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

The Center is designed to meet the information needs of the business community and organizations concerned with changing work and family relationships. It will collect, analyze and disseminate data on personnel policies and practices that are beneficial to workers and their families, innovative employer partnerships with government agencies and/or community groups, major action on relevant legislative and regulatory issues, and trends in family characteristics of the work force.

While the popular concept of addressing work and family concerns conjures up problems that arise in child care, the reconciliation of work and family responsibilities is a much broader issue. More specifically, it is not only a "working parents" issue—it also involves workers, both young and old, without children, who have other types of family concerns. It is not only a "dual career" issue—it concerns working couples at all income levels. It is not only a "women's" issue—it affects workers of both sexes.

Some examples:

- An upwardly mobile, single worker who is responsible for the care of an aging relative
- A middle-aged factory worker, unemployed because of outdated skills, who is confronted with the choice of relocation or retraining in order to replace a critical loss in family income
- An older worker facing the adjustment to retirement and a radical change in lifestyle
- A single parent/executive who must miss an important meeting because a sick child cannot be left at home alone
- A working-parent couple whose combined income does not cover needed child care expenses
- A working couple unable to vacation together because of conflicting work schedules
- A disabled worker who must support a family but cannot commute to a job
- A worker whose concern for a family member with drug problems is causing poor job performance

The Center's information service, meetings and publications will be available to Conference Board Associates, government agencies, social service organizations, educational and research institutions, foundations, other groups involved with work and family issues, and the media.

At the present time, we are much involved with the development of Health Care Expo '85 which will be held in the new Convention Center in Washington, DC in August 1985 and will be followed by similar educational health care expositions in various parts of the U. 
