SUBJECT: Thailand

Immediately following the February 11 meeting in the East Wing and calls from Hinckle of Advance, I investigated the situation in Thailand.

On the 12th I talked with Dr. Walt Gentner of the USDA regarding his programs in Thailand. His man on the scene is Jack Bond. He is in Chiang Mai, out back of Thailand, near the Burmese border. His residence phone number is [REDACTED]. Thailand is 12 hours difference (at 9:00 in the morning here, it is 9:00 in the evening there, etc.) b(6)

Walt sponsors the King's Projects and they are handled by His Royal Highness Prince Bhisatej Rajani. Several projects come under the King's Projects:

1. Angkahng: near the Burmese border. This is a crop substitution (opium poppies) project. You will still see some opium poppies in this area.
2. Doi Inthin: Highest mountain region, again, near the Burmese border. It is a technological transfer project and a narcotics related project.
3. Mae Chem Valley: a USAID development program, also where the Silplot has their potato project underway. Some poppies can also be found there.
4. The Narcotic Control Board, under the direction of General Chavalet: manual eradication program for the area (doing better now that they have realized that with out eradication, crop substitution does not work).
5. Village Treatment: Deals with opium addiction. There is very little heroin in that part of world - it is opium.

On 2/13/86, I spoke to [REDACTED], Narcotics Assistance Unit Operator in Thailand. [REDACTED] stated that 70-80 per cent of those undergoing treatment in Thailand for drug addiction were heroin addicts. They are older and usually have problems at their workplace with drugs.

There is a monastery in the northern part of Thailand where traditional medicine is used to purge the system. This is a vomiting process where they give them the medicine and they vomit. They must stay at this monastery for a while to get cleaned out. The man running this monastery claims he has good cure rate and he has treated 70,000 addicts over the last 10 years. There are no data on the number of people coming in and going out to justify this. This is found in the National Geographic, February 1985 issue and it is the Tham Krabok Monastery. This is one of the private facilities. There are others.

Thailand now has an eradication program to buttress their crop substitution program. it has been going on for the last two years. The opium situation is much more under control than in the past. However, there is a explosion, according to Max, of cannabis production for the American market. He encourages me to come because they need someone that spoke out against marijuana years ago to go explain to them why this is such a problem.. The police are on this issue, but the tremendous increase is unbelievable. He says there are now increasing needs for treatment for marijuana and other drugs. Thailand may be going - from opium to marijuana, where others went from marijuana to opium.

SUBJECT: Defeating the Oregon Marijuana Initiative (OMI)

As briefly discussed during the NNBIS meeting, plans are underway to counter OMI's attempt to legalize marijuana in Oregon. Two meetings of concerned individuals and groups have been held in Oregon; the most recent meeting on January 22. U.S. Attorney John Lamp (Spokane, Washington) has been my contact person and has been invaluable in providing me with information on plans and progress.

Opponents to OMI intend to initiate their campaign by providing information about the negative health consequences of marijuana use. They plan to furnish appropriate materials to editorial boards and other media, schools, and service groups. Their immediate need is funds -- between \$10,000 and \$20,000 -- to purchase materials from the Heart and Lung Association, the American Medical Association, and other organizations.

I will keep you abreast of developments. One option for involving the U.S. Attorneys could be a well-organized meeting on drug prevention and education in Oregon. Any suggestions or recommendations by you or members of your staff would be greatly appreciated.





SUBJECT: DEA Drug Deterrence Program

TO: All DEA Employees

The abuse of controlled substances is a National tragedy and we can all be proud of the fact that our employees have not been swept up in this epidemic. However, drug abuse is a nationwide problem and no segment of society is immune to this phenomenon.

In the workplace drug abuse translates into: loss of efficiency; absenteeism; reduced productivity; increased potential for accidents and injuries; impaired judgment, coordination, and reflexes; and deterioration in one's physical and mental health. In a law enforcement agency the potential for abuse also exists. It can create a danger to the public's safety, expose the agency to civil liability, jeopardize criminal investigations and prosecutions, lead to corruption of employees, and undermine public confidence.

Since the Drug Enforcement Administration is charged with enforcement of the Controlled Substances Act, I know each of you would agree that drug abuse by our employees would be intolerable and totally unacceptable. We cannot afford to take for granted that we are 100 percent drug free. It is, therefore, imperative that we continue to take a leadership role by demonstrating the absolute integrity of this agency and its work force in our efforts to stem the flow and abuse of controlled substances.

Accordingly, I am developing a comprehensive drug deterrence program which will include enhanced education and training, clear policy directives, prompt resolution of alleged illegal drug involvement, and counseling and treatment where appropriate. A new and key element of our example of leadership will be the implementation of a urine testing program. It will apply to all of us--myself, our upper management, and all employees alike. It will be administered in an impartial and uniform

manner by people who will be specially trained by proven experts in this drug combating technology. The procedures, practices and systems that have been proved judicially sound by other Federal agencies experienced in similar urinalysis programs will be adapted to our program. Special care will be taken to preserve the substantive and procedural rights of all our employees.

Detailed procedures will be promulgated in the near future. A working group consisting of representatives from AO, AA, AP, and CC has been designated to develop and implement the program. Your input will be sought at various stages of the program. Recognized experts will be consulted both in program formulation and implementation.

I have carefully considered the legal and policy arguments for and against the adoption of such a program, particularly in light of its increasing use in the military, professional sports, and industry. None has influenced me as much as the need to safeguard and uphold the superb professional reputation of our employees and by extension, the agency. We must clearly set the example in the "War on Drugs" and this program will send a clear signal to all citizens and others that we are doing so with pride and conviction.

SUBJECT: Drug Interdiction

I appreciated the heads up in your recent memo on the potential funding problem for the U.S. Customs Service air interdiction programs. With so many departments and agencies involved, together with the Congress, it is not surprising that there are occasional crossed signals. Fortunately, I understand that OMB has restored the funding for Customs.

Your memo also raises the broader question of how to divide responsibility between the military and law enforcement agencies for surveillance, detection, and interdiction along U.S. borders. This is an issue with an extensive history and enormous funding implications. Changing current policy would require thorough study and would undoubtedly result in a contentious interagency debate. I agree that this question ought to be examined, although I am reluctant to include it in the Narcotics NSDD, which is now in its final stages, lest it be delayed.

In the meantime, I am confident that the NSDD will be a major step in focusing attention and resources on international narcotics trafficking and the threat it poses to our security. You and your staff have played a key role in ensuring its success.

SUBJECT: First Lady of Ecuador, Mrs. Febres-Cordero

The First Lady of Ecuador, Mrs. Febres-Cordero, is very interested in drug awareness and treatment programs for young people. While attending your First Ladies Conference on Drug Abuse in April, she asked the first question and was active in the discussion which followed.

Upon her return to Ecuador and in addition to her other community activities, Mrs. Febres-Cordero has strived to learn more about the drug problem in Ecuador and identify ways she could get more involved. For example, she is now looking at the use, sale, and distribution of drugs in discotheques in Quito. She told me that if this was found to be true she was going to have them closed.

Prior to her departure for the United States, Mrs. Febres-Cordero asked me, through the Ecuadorean Ambassador to the United States and our State Department, if there were any drug treatment facilities in the Washington area which she could visit. I recommended she visit Straight, Inc. in Springfield, Virginia because of the young age of the students.

I accompanied Mrs. Febres-Cordero to Straight this afternoon. The visit was a success. She met with Dr. Mel Riddle and his staff, toured the facility, had an opportunity to talk with a group of the students, and she met privately with three young people, one who spoke Spanish, for a more detailed discussion.

President and Mrs. Febres-Cordero have taken a very strong stand against drugs.

SUBJECT: Mrs. Reagan's music video project

The executive producer of "The Return of Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer" recently stated that he will avoid all story lines that concern drugs in his show due to Stacey Keach's conviction on cocaine charges. In view of this, I am concerned to learn from the news last evening that Mrs. Reagan is participating in a music video with Mr. Keach.

I am enclosing a copy of a letter I recently sent to Jay Bernstein, the executive producer. Perhaps you were able, before agreeing to the video, to get a commitment that Keach's new program will expose the negative consequences of drugs.

We have had a policy since 1981 of protecting the integrity of the President, the First Lady, and the White House by putting them in the company of only those former drug users who have been clean over a substantial period of time. There is an extremely high recidivism rate among certain groups of users.

Ken, perception and the possible future embarrassment of the First Lady is my concern. If Mrs. Reagan made the decisions regarding the rock video, her wishes obviously stand. If not, I suggest the decision be revisited.

Dear Mr. Bernstein:

I am pleased that "The Return of Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer," starring Stacey Keach will be returning to the air; I generally like mysteries. I was confused, however, by the attached item which indicates you will be avoiding story lines dealing with drugs in light of Mr. Keach's conviction on cocaine charges. It is a also mystery -- for several reasons.

First, Stacey Keach has apparently made a strong personal commitment to helping others deal with cocaine addiction. This is evident through: his testifying before a Congressional committee as to the devastating effects of his addiction; his participation in the documentary, "High On the Job"; his authoring of a book, Christmas With Her Majesty, based on his ordeal; and other activities.

Secondly, it is evident that the entertainment industry -- through the work of the Entertainment Industries Council, for one -- is finally making efforts to undo the damage done by years of glamorizing drugs such as cocaine. This effort is particularly important at present as research is revealing cocaine to be one of the most destructive and addicting drugs known to man.

I also understand that a soon-to-be published PARADE magazine poll reveals that the public overwhelmingly believes the entertainment industry must begin living up to its responsibility to the American public by revealing drugs to be the destructive force to individuals and society that they are.

Finally, if you are concerned about ratings, I invite you to study the story lines of "Miami Vice."

I would hope, Mr. Bernstein, that rather than placing "any story dealing with drugs . . . at the bottom of [your] list," you will embrace this opportunity to respond to public demand, provide public service, and emulate those in your industry who are making a positive -- and invaluable -- contribution to society.

You may have a great success on your hands . . . in more ways than one.

SUBJECT: Drug Interdiction

Dick Darman and I discussed his letter to Joe Wright regarding proposed budget cuts for interdiction activities now being handled by the U.S. Customs Service. The current approach has evolved over time and thus, is often fragmented and inefficient. Now may be the time to make our drug interdiction efforts more efficient and effective. As Dick pointed out in his letter, drug smugglers exploit the current gaps in FAA and DOD radar, and, I might also add, the use of Customs P-3A radar aircraft.

There is support for increasing the effectiveness of our drug interdiction effort. I believe the most effective and efficient drug interdiction program is one where the Military mission is to detect drug smuggling aircraft and vessels; intercepts of aircraft and subsequent arrests would be a Customs mission; and, the intercepts of maritime vessels and subsequent arrests would be a Coast Guard or Customs mission. This approach would not interfere with the established cooperative effort between the Navy and the Coast Guard and would provide the best use of existing resources. It would also strengthen the NNBS concept.

The narcotics-related NSDD supports meeting the interdiction threat more effectively and efficiently and may be the mechanism for inculcating this approach within the system.
