SUBJECT: Private Sector Involvement in Drug Initiative

As the press and public await the unveiling of the President's Drug Initiative, the big question appears to be that of cost. His dedication to the issue and perceived likelihood of success are going to be judged in part by the eventual "price tag" of the Drug Initiative.

We must shift the debate from the cost that the federal government is willing to pay, to an emphasis on the role that all Americans must play. To do this, I feel that a very strong element in the program should be an organized private sector effort. I suggest the following two options:

OPTION I

Presidential Commission for a Drug Free America

The President could appoint a group of approximately twenty-five high visibility leaders from a cross section of the Private Sector. He would challenge this commission with leading the private sector in creating a Drug Free America.

The following are potential members of the Commission (although there may not be the specific individuals we want to pursue, they are the types I am suggesting):

By establishing this private sector group, the President would be able to emphasize the critical role that all sectors of our society must play in fighting drug abuse.

Additionally, by appointing specific individuals to this commission, we would be able to create credible "surrogates" who could be speaking on the drug initiative at times and places where the President's schedule would not permit.

And, by creating this group, we would have an entity that could be called upon to meet at various locations across the country as forums for Presidential events.

The President could call upon each Governor to follow his example by establishing a similar commission at the state level (i.e. Commission for a Drug Free Ohio) and each Mayor to establish a commission at the local level (i.e. Commission for a Drug Free Cleveland).

It could perform the same functions mentioned above, but obviously without the high visibility of a separate commission.

ACLU: Drug tests not helpful

FERRIDAY, La. — Mandatory drug testing for Ferriday town employees is part of a national wave of hysteria, the executive director of Louisiana's American Civil Liberties Union said Tuesday.

"Wholesale drug testing will not address Ferriday's

drug problem," said Martha Kegel of the ACLU. "Not, that is, unless Ferriday's City Hall is a bastion of drug abuse."

The Ferriday aldermen passed an ordinance Aug. 12 requiring all town employees to take random, mandatory drug tests. Anyone failing the test or refusing to take the test will be fired, said Mayor Sammy Davis Jr.

Such drug testing is becoming more common, Ms.

Kegel said. Several weeks ago, President Reagan offered a proposal for voluntary drug testing for all federal employees.

In Louisiana, New Orleans' city leaders are considering random, mandatory drug tests. A public hearing is scheduled for Sept. 4.

Baton Rouge's city officials are considering a similar proposal.

Last week, the East Baton Rouge School Board proposed a voluntary drug test for high school athletes.

The Concordia Parish School Board rejected a similar proposal several months ago.

Such programs are a dangerous violation of the U.S. Constitution's Fourth Amendment, which protects individuals against search and seizure of personal property without probable cause, Ms. Kegel said.

"You can't just line people up and test them without a reason," she said. "It concerns me when grand-standing politicians don't confer any degree of respect on the public by forcing them to submit to these tests. I would think the Ferriday employees would be angry

and humiliated.

"It's a sad commentary on the politicians," she said. "What this does is stand the whole American justice system on its head. We are supposed to be innocent until proven guilty, but with these tests you are guilty until proven innocent."

"I also want Ferriday's employees to know that the ACLU is ready and willing to offer free legal advice if they have any questions," she said.

The drug tests are an emotional re-

action to a growing problem, Ms. Kegel said.

"I'm not saying that drugs aren't a problem, but these tests are not the solution," she said. "If Ferriday was serious about fighting drug abuse they would be much better off to put the money into law enforcement and drug treatment programs."

Davis said Ferriday's decision on the drug tests had little to do with the actions of other governments.

"We have a problem in Ferriday, and that's the only wave we're riding," Davis said. "When people realize we are serious and that we are going to have these drug tests, then they are going to stop."

"There is no drug problem on the police department, but you don't wait until you have a problem to solve it," he said.

Some have questioned how Ferriday would pay for the drug tests, which range from \$5 to \$200 a person, for its 52 employees. Davis said that will not be an obstacle.

"We have a fund that has money collected from city court," he said. "It won't cost the general fund a penny."

"But we are going to have these tests if I have to pay for it out of my own pocket," Davis said. "That's definite. We're going to have the tests and take our chances with the ACLU."

Parents Be Alert !!!

The following information was brought to my attention and I feel it is important to share with you.

According to police authorities, a form of tattoo called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. It is a small sheet of white paper containing blue stars the size of a pencil eraser. Each "star" is impregnated with LSD and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can occur through the skin also, simply by handling the paper tattoo. There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse, and other Disney characters, butterflies, clowns, etc. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse wrapped in foil in a clear lock-type bag. THESE ARE ALL LACED WITH DRUGS. If you or your children see any of the above described, Do Not Handle! These drugs are known to react very quickly into your body and some are laced with strychnine. Symptoms are hallucinations, mood change and severe vomiting. Get to the hospital as soon as possible and notify the police.



First International Drug Symposium to be a preface to the book

The First International Drug Symposium sponsored jointly by the American Embassy and the Bahamian government provided the first hands-on forum for sharing ideas about the treatment of cocaine addicts who freebase. This is sometimes known as smoking cocaine in the "rock" or "crack" form.

This forum was essential, because too many psychiatrists, psychologists, and other medical professionals have refused to acknowledge the known and, I must add, historical danger of cocaine. In fact some perpetuate the myth that cocaine is OK. They reason that cocaine is so expensive that only the wealthy will be able to afford it, and they will know how to use it recreationally and responsibly. This cavalier attitude in the midst of the world's second cocaine epidemic has made it nearly impossible to convince people that cocaine kills. I hope this book will convince some doubters. Unfortunately some will only be convinced by a grave marker.

The world's first cocaine epidemic was in the 1880's. At that time cocaine was legally distributed at a low cost and was of high purity. Then, just as today, people, and even Freud, initially believed that cocaine was innocuous; a great drug without any side-effects. Cocaine was in wine, fountain drinks, and other tonics. And, as today, cocaine cost the lives of many people, including health professionals. Ultimately, society rejected cocaine.

Ignorance of the horrible legacy of the first cocaine epidemic led to the problems we face today; cocaine knows no geographic boundaries. It knows no socio-economic boundaries. It knows no boundaries for corruption, destruction or seduction.

This book is about understanding cocaine, and if used appropriately, will help the world understand that cocaine addiction cannot be conquered in isolation, and cannot be dealt a fatal blow with rhetoric. Communities of the world must recognize that all countries - producing countries, transiting countries, and user countries - are vulnerable to drug abuse.

There is much talk today about educating the young not to use drugs, yet the largest number of cocaine and marijuana users is found in people between 20 to 40 years of age. These people have made a choice and educating them, in my opinion, will be impossible without concurrent strong enforcement and a concomitant demand by society that cocaine use will no longer be tolerated.

Simply put, we must highlight the medical consequences of cocaine

use. This book does! Cocaine and other illegal drug use has become a major threat to the security of nations, a major health problem, a major threat to the tranquility of the law-abiding, civilized world. Cocaine destroys families by deteriorating interpersonal relationships and financial stability. It corrupts normally uncorruptable people.

We in this hemisphere do not need to generate more scientific data to understand that cocaine kills. It does. We know it. We must communicate it, and we are, through this book.

We must focus on the user. We must stop cocaine from killing more of us. Without the money supplied by the user, there would be no need for massive law enforcement outlays. Without the money supplied by the user, there would be no production in South America and other places. Without the money supplied by the user, there would be no corruption of governmental entities and private organizations. Without the money from the user, the cocaine traffickers would not be able to put contracts on ambassadors and kill enforcement agents. Without the money from the user, corporations would not lose billions of dollars through lost productivity and increased accidents from drug use in the workplace. Without the money from the user, banks would not be facing fines for laundering money.

We can talk about stopping the cocaine trade, but the supply will not stop as long as users are willing to pay. Society must understand the horror of cocaine and must accept the fact that the price for one small white line or one small rock can also have another price, the cost of a life.

Before any drug is made available to the public, the industrialized world requires that pharmaceutical manufacturers spend millions of dollars to prove that a drug is safe. On the other hand, illicit drugs are accepted as safe, and society becomes a guinea pig until such time as the negative health consequences are recognized by all. Little concern is given to premature deaths, aborted fetuses, wasted lives, or destroyed families. And yet there seems to be no outrage against the drug dealer or user. Yet there is total outrage against any pharmaceutical firm whose product, when misused causes one or two people to die.

Additionally, when one talks about drug abuse, it is the only health issue on which the media insists on covering both sides. Indeed, we must be wary of some press coverage. Certain journalists have complemented their coverage of the devastating effects of crack with lyrical descriptions of the crack "high." Intellectually, this is wrong. Health-wise, this is wrong. Communication-wise, this is wrong.

Democracies of the world must understand that there is a need for eradication of the drugs as close to the origin as possible. There is a need for an interdiction of the drugs. This is a need for strong law enforcement. There is a need for communication of the research data, as well as detoxification and treatment. Prevention and education, yes, it is needed, but the only solution to the problem we face today is to hold the user accountable for his or her action. Until that is done, the drug epidemic is a steamroller, rolling along inexorably toward destruction with narco-dollars providing the financial push. Perhaps the United Nations conference in 1987 will be the world forum for all to unite against drugs. But rhetoric alone will not work, because when you buy drugs, you buy terror.

This book will help you decide on which side of the aisle you sit, on the side with a philosophical view that it is everyone's right to use drugs or the side with firm convictions that drug use must stop and stop now!

- o Drug-free schools from elementary to university level;
- o Effective drug abuse treatment to tackle the health dangers posed by illegal drugs;
- o Improved international cooperation to achieve full involvement by every country in stopping illegal drugs;
- o Strengthened law enforcement to hit the drug traffickers with renewed force; and
- o Increased public awareness and prevention -- the goal on which success ultimately depends -- to help every citizen understand the stakes and get involved in fighting the drug menace.

As a lawmaker and community leader, you know the grim roster as well as anyone. Illegal drugs ruin lives, destroy families and weaken entire communities. Drug abuse is not a private matter. For the sake of our Nation, it must end.





REQUEST: Presentation of Awards

PURPOSE: The President and First Lady to present six (6) Presidential Certificates of Appreciation for contributions to reducing drug and alcohol abuse. The awards will go to three (3) individuals and three (3) corporations who have made significant and long-term contributions to the President's National program and the First Lady's Drug Awareness Campaign.

The grassroots involvement and the recipients of these awards exemplify the many private sector efforts contributing to the President and First Lady's goal of creating a drug-free generation. By recognizing individual and corporate efforts, we will encourage others to get involved.

BACKGROUND: In 1981, President Reagan said, "We need to mobilize our religious, educational, and fraternal groups in a national education program against drug abuse...This Administration will do all in its power to encourage such efforts." The President acknowledged the response of private citizens and corporations in 1983 when he said, "Drug abuse is a national problem and a target of a nationwide program.
