## Issue

Whether to visit Ireland and/or France on your way to the London Summit next June.

## Discussion

George Shultz has spoken to French Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson about the possibility of you stopping briefly in France on the way to the Economic Summit, which currently is scheduled to take place in London on June 7-9. This suggestion was made initially, via Evan Galbraith, by the French D-Day Commemoration Committee which is organizing major ceremonies in Normandy commemorating the 40th anniversary of D-Day on June 6. President Mitterrand and the French government hope that you will join the Normandy commemoration.

Mike Deaver opposes a Normandy stop. He sees no benefit in it and would prefer that you stop in Ireland. While we do not wish to overtax your schedule, George believes, as do I, that a stop in both Ireland and France would pay dividends. A visit to Ireland would mark a return to your ancestral home and be popular here and in Europe. A visit to France would solidify our relations with the Mitterrand Government in advance of the Summit and would mark this major D-Day anniversary in a meaningful way.

Should you decide to visit Normandy, there will undoubtedly be pressures for you to stop elsewhere on the European Continent; we could fend off such requests without much difficulty. Should you go, we would have to work closely with the French to ensure that the Normandy D-Day celebration focuses on reconciliation among Europeans as opposed to the liberation of France, which could touch a sensitive nerve in Germany.

For preliminary planning purposes, to go to both France and Ireland, you would have to depart Washington on June 4, spending June 5 in Ireland and most of June 6 in Normandy. Under this program you would spend the night of June 6 in London for a fresh

start at the Economic Summit, which kicks-off on June 7. If you forego France, you could depart Washington on June 4 or 5, depending on how long you stay in Ireland. A direct trip to London would of course permit a later departure.

The D-Day Commemoration Committee has been urging, via Ambassador Galbraith, that the President make a quick visit to France in connection with the 40th anniversary of the D-Day landing in Normandy. On the margins of the NATO meeting, Secretary Shultz raised with Claude Cheysson the possibility of a Presidential stop-over on his way to the London Summit. I assume the Secretary had already discussed this possibility with Deaver and/or the President.

Today Shultz sent you a message (Tab A) indicating that Cheysson had checked with Mitterrand and he would be happy to receive the President in France on June 6 for ceremonies commemorating D-Day.

It appears that Shultz has gotten out in front of at least the NSC on the possible visit to France. While a visit could provide a number of pluses there are other aspects that need to be considered. Deaver reportedly has another stop (Ireland) in mind. A visit to France could increase pressures for the President to stop elsewhere on the Continent. Furthermore, a visit to France in connection with D-Day would have to be carefully handled with regard to Germany. Should such a visit take place, we would need to work with the French to ensure that it is not characterized as a celebration of liberation. We would need to place the accent on the visit as a symbol of reconciliation.

Raymond Barre, Former Prime Minister of France

The Department recommends that the President meet with Raymond Barre, former Prime Minister of France and current prominent opposition figure, during Barre's visit to the United States, January 9-13, 1984. Such a meeting would be consistent with the Administration's policy of meeting with major opposition figures of allied countries. The President has already seen the other two prominent members of the French opposition, Paris Mayor Jacques Chirac and former President Valery Giscard d'Estaing.

Ambassador Galbraith has strongly recommended the President receive Barre, considering him to be a lively and important interlocutor. Barre is currently France's most rapidly rising opposition figure and in the last month has become a serious contender for the Presidency. The Department feels that the President would find a meeting with Barre to be both interesting and informative.

Barre will travel first to New York to speak before the Council on Foreign Relations. He plans to spend the latter part of the week in Washington meeting with Secretaries Shultz, Weinberger and Regan. He would prefer to schedule his Washington appointments for January 11, 12, and 13, but would adjust his schedule so as to be available for a meeting with the President any time the week of January 9-13.

We have received two formal and one verbal request from State for appointments/meeting with the President in January. The three, all of which have merit, are: Dutch Prime Minister Lubbers, French opposition leader Barre, and (by telephone) Italian Foreign Minister Andreotti. We expect State to formalize the Andreotti request this week.

As Ty noted last week, we have suggested that State consolidate these new requests into its overall list for the first half of 1984 that you previously requested. However, State seems to feel that these "office calls" or short meetings fall outside of the purview of that directive.

Since we don't want these visitors to fall prey to bureaucratic bungling (they, particularly Andreotti and Lubbers, deserve appointments) we need to establish guidelines quickly for the submission of requests that do not fall under the rubric of "State" or "Official Working" visits.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That you sign the memorandum at Tab I to Hill, making it clear that State should incorporate these sorts of visits into its list for the first half of 1984.

Subject: Appointment Request for the President:

Raymond Barre, Former Prime Minister of France

The Department recommends that the President meet with Raymond Barre, former Prime Minister of France and current prominent opposition figure, during Barre's visit to the United States, January 9-13, 1984. Such a meeting would be consistent with the Administration's policy of meeting with major opposition figures of allied countries. The President has already seen the other two prominent members of the French opposition, Paris Mayor Jacques Chirac and former President Valery Giscard d'Estaing.


Ambassador Galbraith has strongly recommended the President receive Barre, considering him to be a lively and important interlocutor. Barre is currently France's most rapidly rising opposition figure and in the last month has become a serious contender for the Presidency. The Department feels that the President would find a meeting with Barre to be both interesting and informative.

Barre will travel first to New York to speak before the Council on Foreign Relations. He plans to spend the latter part of the week in Washington meeting with Secretaries Shultz, Weinberger and Regan. He would prefer to schedule his Washington appointments for January 11, 12, and 13, but would adjust his schedule so as to be available for a meeting with the President any time the week of January 9-13.

The United States has suggested an early meeting of representatives of major nuclear supplier countries to discuss ways of strengthening nuclear safeguards and other measures to prevent the proliferation of nuclear weapons. We have received positive responses from virtually every government, except France. We would like to convene the meeting during the latter part of January 1984. While we may continue to differ over the question of comprehensive safeguards, we believe it is important to at least discuss our differences with fellow suppliers to see if we can make some headway on this or other important related issues. Ambassador Kennedy has been in touch with his counterparts in the French government on the subject of a meeting, and I understand that our request is now under active consideration. We attach great value and importance to French participation, and it is for that reason that I take the liberty of personally alerting you to this situation.
