

SUBJECT: Letter to Chernenko

Robert Kimmitt has requested the Department's comments on a re-drafted letter from the President to Chairman Chernenko provided by the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee (LAOOC).

We have no objection to the text furnished by the White House.

However, we believe it is unusual for a non-U.S. citizen, heading a non-governmental international organization, to carry such a message. Nevertheless, we defer to Peter Ueberroth's judgement that such a message will be helpful in the special circumstances of the 1984 Olympics and that IOC President Samaranch is willing to convey it. We suggest that the White House confirm Samaranch's willingness to carry this letter before it is turned over. We also request that the U.S. Government be informed whether, and when, the letter is actually delivered.

As I said during our meeting, the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee has the full support of the United States Government in making preparations for the games. The United States is totally committed to upholding the Olympic Charter and fulfilling its responsibilities as the host nation of the games.

The Olympic games should not be used for political purposes. Athletes and Olympic officials of all countries will find a warm welcome in Los Angeles and will be treated equally and without discrimination, in accord with the Olympic Charter and Olympic spirit.

I have instructed agencies of the federal government to cooperate fully with Olympic and local officials to ensure the safety of all participants. We want to create a hospitable climate in which all participants can perform to the best of their ability.

I consider sport to be one of the finest opportunities for people of all nations to come to know and understand each other. The International Olympic Committee deserves the support of all governments

in arranging the premier sporting event for athletes of all nations. I am looking forward personally to seeing the outstanding athletes of the world marching behind their flags on July 28.
