- I. PURPOSE: To assess the changed environment in Korea and develop policy guidance for the eight months leading to President Chun's planned departure from office. We need to plan ways to keep the current process moving toward accommodation. Korea must construct the elements vital to a functioning democracy, yet strong internal and external forces will resist political progress. There are significant gaps in our knowledge to be identified so as to improve the reporting from the field. We also need to reinforce the message that the U.S. Government speaks with one voice to the Korean people, government, and military.
- BACKGROUND: The ruling party's surprise decision to reverse course and offer direct elections for president has transformed the Korean political environment... for the moment. Radical elements have been divided from the moderate opposition and a first step to real dialogue has been taken. Our policy counseling restraint and compromise was a factor. This did not begin just yesterday, it began with your speech to the Korean Parliament in 1983. The U.S. has been given credit by opinion leaders here and abroad. The issue is how to sustain this momentum.

The miracle of last week can still be destroyed. Korea lacks many of the institutions that sustain the democratic process, such as an independent judiciary, strong parties, and local elections. The word compromise has negative connotations in Korean, and politicians tend to adopt intransigent positions.

Between now and next February, the Korean political agenda will throw up many hurdles. The opposition must sort out its leadership and overcome deep factionalism. It must then reach agreement with the government on the shape of a new constitution and the rules for direct presidential election, all within a few months. The military must be persuaded not to intervene in this process; the opposition must act with restraint toward the military. The voters must overcome their provincialism and suspiciousness and accept the results of the election. The radicals must be kept isolated.

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A refusal to compromise, new cases of official torture, the fate of political prisoners, coup plotting -- any of these could derail the process. We need to identify what we do not know and task the agencies to come up with the information. The media frequently tell us, moreover, that our military and civilian officials are reading from different scripts on Korea. I don't think this is the case, but we must show that it is not so through consistent behavior.

Our basic policy message needs to be reinforced during this period of widespread attention to Korean developments. The North should not mistake internal debate and compromise for weakness. Politicians and the military in the South will face disastrous domestic consequences if they allow themselves to resort to the old methods of force and confrontation. The government and opposition are moving toward moderate middle ground; our job is to keep them there.
