The President on Monday gave General Secretary Gorbachev a line-by-line after cast of Frederic Remington's "The Rattlesnake." This bronze reproduction was produced by Christine Roussel Inc. of New York City. An original Remington casting of this sculpture stands in the Oval Office at the White House.

"The Rattlesnake" depicts a cowboy on his horse which is rearing before a rattlesnake crossing their path. The 23 and one-half inch high sculpture stands on an oval wooden base. A brass plaque is engraved with the following inscription:

To
His Excellency
Mikhail Sergeyevich Gorbachev
General Secretary of the Central Committee
of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union
From
Ronald Reagan
President of the United States of America
May 1988

According to one scholar, this statue was Remington's favorite work of art -- one in which he caught at the instant of perfect balance the sweeping circular symmetry of the horse and rider. The artist's use of the lost-wax process of casting permitted small variations in each finished work, such as changing the positioning of the snake or the horse's hoofs and tail. This lost-wax process gave a clarity of detail and fineness of texture that was previously unknown in American casting.

Remington, one of America's best known Western artists, is among the President's favorite sculptors. The Oval Office casting of "The Rattlesnake" (copyright 1905 - 14th cast bronze of Remington's second series on this subject) was on display in the Diplomatic Reception Rooms at the Department of State until February 1981, when it was sent to the White House; it is on loan to the State Department by Dr. Harrison Monk of Annapolis, Maryland.

The bronze sculpture presented to General Secretary Gorbachev is a line-by-line after cast, which means exact reproduction. The after cast was produced by Christine Roussel, Inc., an art restoration firm which operates a small foundry in Manhattan and is noted for its precision replication. IN the past, Christine Roussel, Inc. has created art works for the White House, the States Department and Colonial Williamsburg.

Dave Brubeck's contributions to American music and international understanding through his recordings and concert tours have been acknowledged all over the world. Born in California 68 years ago, into a family of musicians and cattle ranchers, Brubeck's career spans more than four decades. 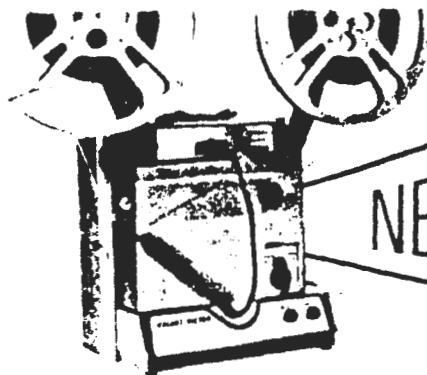

Don discovers Kathy's acting talent and falls in love with her. Lina jealously reacts by trying to ruin Kathy's career. In the end, Don and Kathy get together and Lina is exposed.

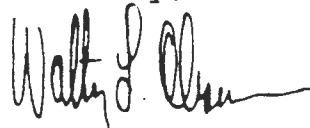

The attached press schedule for the President's trip covers the first day's travel to Helsinki. The balance of the schedule will be available during the trip. The schedules are for your planning purposes only. Event times are tentative and subject to change during the trip. Revisions to the schedule will be posted through the White House Press Office as necessary.

Facilities at event sites are not listed in the schedule because representatives of the White House Correspondents Association and the White House News Photographers Association have traveled to Helsinki, Moscow and London and have provided detailed reports to their respective organization members. Multiboxes will be provided at all Presidential speech sites and local country telephones have been ordered at all event sites. However, only the IDD telephones in White House Press Filing Centers are certain to be installed and operational.

The parking lot in front of the Base Operations building at Andrews AFB is full. Andrews AFB is arranging for press parking in a lot located 3/4 of a mile from the Andrews AFB Press Center. There will be shuttle bus transportation between that lot and the Base Operations building. Please drop off your baggage in the usual fashion, drive to the special lot (follow the signs to "Press Parking") then take the shuttle vehicle to the Press Center.

Seats in the White House Press Corps section of the International Press Filing Center in Moscow will be assigned to representatives of all newsgathering organizations traveling with the President. A detailed seating chart will be available in Helsinki.

Motorcade pools in Moscow are for protective purposes only and do not cover any events. Many are day-long pools, without access to telephones or other convenience facilities.

Payment at the Mezh Hotel in Moscow must be in hard currency - US dollars or by credit card. Rubles will not be accepted.

Due to the brevity of our stay and in an effort to facilitate baggage delivery, only one bag per person will be unloaded in London. All other bags will remain on the press aircraft.
