PERCEPTIONS OF THE GENEVA MEETING

Working for a Safer Future

The President seeks to build the foundation for peaceful and constructive relations with the Soviet Union. This will require a long-term, sustained effort. It must be based on the principles of fairness, reciprocity and honest fulfillment of all agreements.

Soviet Behavior: The Roots of Tension

The use or threat of force by the Soviet Union and its proxies is an underlying cause of Soviet-American and world tension. The President is determined to defend the United States and its Allies. The USSR must cease using arms and force to expand its influence if tensions are to diminish.

Leading from Strength

The President's hand is strong: he has reversed the decline in American strength and has a robust economy, a united public and strong alliances behind him. He is able to defend us whatever the Soviets do. But he wants more: he wants to lower arms levels, reduce tensions and create a more cooperative relationship with the USSR.

Promoting Democratic Ideals

The President will speak out for democracy, freedom, justice and decency everywhere since these values are the surest foundation of a just and peaceful world in the future. He does not attempt to impose our political or economic system on others, but will insist that the Soviet Union also refrain from attempts to dominate others.

Probing Soviet Intentions

We can have a more cooperative relationship with the Soviet Union only if the Soviet leaders also want it. The Geneva meeting will determine whether there has been a change in Soviet policy or only in Soviet style.

Realistic but Determined Effort

The President is preparing seriously for the meeting in Geneva. He has no illusions about the profound differencies in our philosophies and societies but will go the extra mile for enduring peace and a safer world. He will bring creative and ambitious ideas to the meeting. His efforts will not end when the Geneva meeting is over. He is in this for the long haul.

Dear Bud:

Over the years, our interests have been served well by three publishers that I have had occasion to meet with a number of times: Rupert Murdoch, Sir James Goldsmith and the late Axel Springer. I think the President's upcoming meeting in Geneva offers us an excellent opportunity to reward their papers for the good reporting job they have been doing on the U.S. and, at the same time, use them to communicate our message to the two million, or so, European readers they serve.

I suggest that you ask the Public Diplomacy Team to add The Sunday Times, L'Express and Die Welt to their file of requests for Presidential interviews prior to his departure for Geneva. We would recommend that either: 1) the three bureau chiefs receive a personal interview with the President, if his schedule permits; 2) written questions with answers issued in the President's name and a brief photo opportunity to personalize the interview; or 3) only written questions and answers.

Following are details on the newspapers and their Washington correspondents:

--John Connell, Washington Bureau Chief for THE SUNDAY TIMES, Great Britain, (628-4310). Prior to his replacing Henry O. Brandon in Washington two years ago, Connell was the Defense Correspondent for THE TIMES. He is considered a very bright, balanced reporter with a good knowledge of his subjects. THE SUNDAY TIMES has a circulation of 1.4 million, and is the country's most popular, quality Sunday newspaper. It offers extensive U.S. coverage and is generally sympathetic on U.S. issues. In 1981, it was sold by the Thomson Organization to Rupert Murdoch.

--Fritz Wirth, Washington Bureau Chief for DIE WELT, West Germany, (229-1439). Wirth replaced long-time U.S. Correspondent Thomas Kielinger last year in the Washington bureau. Wirth is considered to be a responsible and professional journalist with an excellent understanding of U.S. political/security issues. DIE WELT, published daily in Bonn, has a circulation of about 210,000. It is characterized as one of the three principal national dailies in West Germany. It is conservative, with a positive attitude toward the U.S. DIE WELT is considered the "flagship" of the late Axel Springer's publishing empire.

--Henri Pierre, Washington Bureau Chief for L'EXPRESS, France, (229-0845). Pierre replaced Henri de Bresson two years ago. Pierre has been based in Washington a number of years, with one French paper or another. He also strings for LE MONDE when the regular correspondent

is on vacation. He is a responsible, seasoned journalist. L'EXPRESS is independent, conservative, published in Paris on Fridays with a circulation of about 543,000. Its coverage is basically favorable to the U.S. Sir James Goldsmith has had part ownership of the paper since 1977.

This request has the backing of the public affairs officers at the embassies concerned, and of the appropriate State and USIA desk officers.

Our Foreign Press Center in Washington will be in contact with the Public Diplomacy Team concerning this request.

President's U.N. (23 October) Speechwriters are working on the speech but have not recieved any recommended talking points or major themes from the NSC, State or the UN. We need to task State, Ambassador Walters, and Matlock/Cobb to develop recommended themes/talking points immediatly. Speechwriters should be tasked with incorporating the recommended points and developing a first draft by October.

President's Bilaterals with Allies at the UNGA: State should be tasked with recommended talking points to NSC by 18 October. Talking points and cards should be included for the President's lunch with the Summit Seven.

President's Radio Talks: Speechwriters are currently drafting the Radio Talks. We need to develop a list of recommended topics and have have someone (Rod McDaniel) develop talking points and themes for each radio address.

Consultations with Congressional Leaders: Several formal and informal sessions are planned. Lynn Sachs should be tasked with drafting a one page strategy for the President and providing all necessary briefing papers/talking points to McFarlane.

Other Taskings:

- o Mandel was tasked with developing a theme paper, has it been sent out to our overseas posts?
- o Mandel/Korengold were tasked to provide one page fact sheets on US-Soviet issues, status?
- o Steiner was tasked to develop a short fact sheet on U.S. arms control proposals which we have tabled at Geneva, status?

Dear Mr. President:

Last May my Embassy sent a request to the White House asking that you take part in an interview with BBC radio. The interview was to have dealt with your aspirations for a more peaceful world and how you seek to lower the level of East-West tensions. The broadcast would have been heard throughout the United Kingdom as well as worldwide. For whatever reason the request was turned down.

I believe that such an interview would provide you with an opportunity to share with BBC listeners around the world what you hope to achieve in the arms control arena and how you believe US-USSR relations can be most effectively approached.

As I have mentioned on previous occasions, there is here in the U.K. and Europe a mood of suspicion and anxiety about our commitment to meaningful arms reductions and our willingness to engage in productive talks with the Soviets both at the arms control negotiations and at your forthcoming November meeting with General Secretary Gorbachev. A statement from you in your own words would, I believe, go far to easing these concerns and dispelling mistrust. So far, the pre-Summit limelight has shone mostly on Moscow's new leadership. The BBC request offers us a unique opportunity to shift that focus in your direction with words aimed directly at our European partners.

I therefore urge that you reconsider the BBC request. Should you agree, the BBC would like the interview to take place at the earliest possible occasion, preferably this week or next. It would last no longer than 15 or 20 minutes, and they assure us that they would give the interview extraordinary prominence to assure maximum possible exposure.

I was with Bud this past Saturday when he briefed the Prime Minister on your meeting with Shevardnadze and the contents of the Gorbachev proposal. We obviously have our work cut out for us, and this BBC radio interview I believe will be most helpful.

Carol joins me in sending you and Nancy our love and very best.
