I understand that you have agreed to meet today with Alan to discuss "international issues." You will probably want to provide him a review of the Geneva negotiations and our strategy for maintaining momentum in these negotiations. You will recall that Jack Matlock already gave an excellent summary of the talks to the Canadians in Ottawa last week.

Alan, of course, will want to take this opportunity to raise other issues with you, most importantly the President's trip to Canada in March. Our preparations to date are excellent, as Alan knows, and the two-day visit in Quebec will go well. Still, in order to show his access in Washington, he will want to wire Ottawa, following his meeting with you, that he laid down certain markers with the Administration. It would be very helpful if you could tell him that he ought to pursue questions relating to the visit with Jim Medas at State and myself.

Should Canadian-US relations come up, suggested talking points are at Tab A. You may also ish to peruse Mulroney's letter and the President's reply, which I have highlighted at Tab B (note: Alan has not yet seen the President's reply.

President's Trip to Canada: Highly pleased with preliminary plans. President and Mrs. Reagan are really looking forward to visit.

- -- We are conducting a major policy review on US-Canada ties to identify issues which may lend themselves to agreement in connection with the President-Prime Minister meeting. The second phase will address long-range strategy.
- -- As this policy review moves forward, our governments should stay in touch.

President/PM Letter: The President's response to the PM's letter will be delivered today. President was impressed with evident sincerity of Mulroney letter -- they seem to have an extraordinarily excellent rapport.

Recent Changes in Canadian Energy and Investment Policies: While we welcome these changes, we see them as having been done primarily for Canada's own interests. You should not expect grand gestures from us during the President's visit just to appear responsive to recent Canadian changes. We are, however, seeking ways to inject substance and forward movement into the March meeting.

Acid Rain: While our policy is under constant review, it would be misleading for the Canadians to think that the Administration is on the verge of a significant change in its policy on acid rain.

-- It would appear to be in the interest of both countries not to let this difficult issue mar the success of President Reagan's second visit to Canada.

Defense Spending: We particularly welcome Prime Minister Mulroney's commitment to strengthen Canada's armed forces.

-- Given the low percentage of GNP now being spent on defense, we would like to see a sustained surge to bring Canada in line with other NATO countries. We all face economic constraints, but we all need to do more. In light of Canada's recent spending record, it appears to us that three percent real growth per year is not enough.

Dear Brian:

I appreciate receiving your thoughts on our March meeting, and agree that we should try to make substantial progress with the major items on our bilateral agenda.

As a result, I have directed a priority review of Canada-U.S. relations, specifically charged with examining issues to be addressed at our upcoming meeting. Your suggestion that we use the weeks before our meeting to try to resolve some of the current irritants is excellent, and as this review moves forward, our officials will consult with their counterparts in your government.

I agree with your proposal to focus our March meeting on arms control, trade, defense, and the environment. With respect to arms control, we should have a clearer idea by March of the seriousness with which the Soviets are prepared to resume negotiations. In the meantime, I would be very interested in your thoughts on how we might proceed based on the discussions between Secretary Shultz and Foreign Minister Gromyko.

I share your view that our two countries would greatly benefit by a sense of expanded cooperation in our trade and investment relations. With regard to trade, I understand you are currently conducting a review of Canadian policy options. As that process continues, I believe it would be useful for us to signal our mutual commitment to improving trade and investment conditions on both sides of the border. A declaration of the kind you have suggested may, indeed, be the most appropriate and timely way to demonstrate commitment.

Your pledge to enhance the Canadian contribution to our common defense is most welcome. I would also be very interested in hearing how your defense policy review is progressing, and what areas you will stress in your defense improvements. As you suggest, I think we can move toward an agreement on a new North Warning System which you and I could announce at our meeting. I would also like to discuss ways in which we can address the urgent requirement to upgrade NATO's conventional forces. Finally, I share your view that enhanced cooperation in defense procurement is a worthy goal, and I understand that a number of recent exchanges of information have contributed to progress in this area.

With regard to the environment, and specifically acid rain, you know that I have ordered a sharp increase in funding for research. But many key questions remain unanswered, and until they are, we are not prepared to undertake the very heavy expense of percentage reductions in sulphur dioxide emissions. But this decision remains open to future review and does not rule out greater cooperation in the area. I intend to have this subject further explored during the policy review I mentioned earlier.

There are other topics which might fruitfully be addressed in March, either by you and me or during a separate meeting between our foreign and other ministers. For example, we would be interested in discussing Pacific Basin initiatives, as well as hearing about your government's emerging policies in other geographic areas. An exchange of views on the upcoming Bonn economic summit might be worth-I would suggest that we also review the problem of leakage of militarily significant technology to communist countries and the steps both our countries are taking to prevent this. you know, the United States is strongly urging the establishment of the Military Experts Group during the COCOM High-Level Meeting in February. Finally, in science, we might consider a possible public announcement of Canada's interest in participating in NASA's space station project.

Nancy and I look forward to seeing Mila and you in the Vieille Capitale. You know the city well from your student days, of course. I think it is entirely fitting that we are meeting in a city which has played, from the days of Champlain to today, such a central role in Canadian and Canadian-American history.



Attached at Tab I is a report on Fidel Castro's purported views on Ronald Reagan, conveyed to me through a rather unique, circuitous route.

, met with Fidel Castro earlier this month, presumably in Managua. He reported his conversation to PM Mulroney, who asked Paul Robinson to convey the information to you through me orally, and cautioned against transmitting it via a diplomatic note. Mulroney indicated that,

Ray Burghardt comments that Castro obviously is engaged in a major "peace offensive." In the past three weeks, he has made similar remarks to the Contadora foreign ministers (at Ortega's inauguration) and to Congressman Bill Alexander. Ray speculates that Castro's motives are: (1) He wants to use the Mariel agreement to create "momentum," leading to talks with us on other issues; (2) he knows that U.S.-Cuban talks could replace and even surpass Manzillo in creating anxiety among our Central American friends; and (3) he recognizes the long-term problems of the Sandinista regime and still hopes for a negotiated solution which would give Managua time to consolidate. Nothing in Castro's remarks to any of his interlocutors suggests any willingness to make the kinds of concessions affecting the Sandinistas, the FMLN or dos Santos which would satisfy the U.S. at the expense of Castro's revolutionary credentials.

# CASTRO VIEWS ON PRESIDENT REAGAN:

A senior Canadian politician met with Fidel Castro (January 1985) and reported that the Cuban leader indicated that:

- -- President Reagan was greatly underrated as a leader.
- -- He has demonstrated greater openness than JFK.
- -- He has an extraordinary sense of history.
- -- Perceptible progress in Cuban-American relations has been achieved, principally on immigration.
- -- Castro disparaged Soviet arms supplies and was "dispassionate" on Soviet-U.S. arms control talks.
- -- He indicated that Cuban involvement in Nicaragua would focus on medical and educational work; he would keep only a "handful of troops there," he would "not send others," and noted that the Sandinistas "don't want any more Cubans."

The Canadian noted that Castro was more favorably disposed to him than previously, and indicated the meeting was positive and cordial.



Once again I have the honor to report to you about the deliberations of the Canada-US Permament Joint Board on Defense, which held its 169th meeting November 15-16 in Ottawa.

The meeting was the first since the election in Canada of Prime Minister Brian Mulroney. Both sides began by noting the extremely auspicious start which your own September 25 meeting with Mr. Mulroney provided for relations between our two governments. Clearly there is an opportunity for improving the already close ties which already exist between our countries, and the Board believes it has a role in that process.



Another issue on which I have reported in the past is the problem of ensuring more equitable treatment for US non-diplomatic military personnel in Canada. I am pleased to advise you that the Canadian section of the Board presented a proposal, at the Ottawa meeting, which should go a long way toward resolving this issue.

This would represent a significant step in making our joint defense of the North American continent more responsive to the

changing threat from aerospace attack.

- FOLLOWING CONSULTATIONS WITH EMBASSY OTTAWA, THE FOLLOWING PRESS GUIDANCE WAS DEVELOPED:
- WHAT IS THE U.S. GOVERNMENT RESPONSE TO THE JANUARY 25 LE SOLEIL STORY ALLEGING THAT WASHINGTON HAS MISGIVINGS ABOUT A LEVESQUE/REAGAN TETE-A-TETE?
- THERE IS NO TRUTH TO THE COMMENTS IN LE SOLEIL PURPORTING TO DESCRIBE THE CLIMATE IN WASHINGTON SURROUNDING ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE PRESIDENTS VISIT TO QUEBEC.

President Reagan telephoned Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney on Friday, January 25, 1985 to express his appreciation for recent Canadian statements of support for the U.S. approach to strategic deterrence and East-West relations. The discussion was very cordial and personal. (8)

The President emphasized that he wanted to express particular appreciation for recent comments by the Canadian Foreign Minister, Joe Clark, endorsing our Strategic Defense Initiative. We were very pleased, not only with Mr. Clark's endorsement, but with his wider acceptance of U.S. foreign policy positions. We were, the President noted, pleased to learn that it reflects official Canadian thinking. (8)

Prime Minister Mulroney told the President that he wanted the statement to be made in the House of Commons so that there will be no doubt where the Canadian Government stood on this issue. The Prime Minister noted that he convened a special Cabinet meeting earlier in order to secure the backing of his Ministers. Following that, he then drafted a statement indicating Canadian support of the U.S. SDI, in particular its focus on research and development. Minister Clark then defended it in Parliament against both opposition parties, who, as expected, strongly opposed the endorsement. (8)

Prime Minister Mulroney also noted that in his recent discussions with Lord Carrington, he (the PM) confirmed Canada's commitment to the NATO Alliance. Later, Lord Carrington made public statements in Canada, supporting the Government's position, that were very helpful. Carrington told Mulroney that Canada's forthright support of the Alliance would contribute greatly to increasing NATO solidarity. (S)

The President replied that he knew it took considerable political courage to take such a forthright stand. Knowing the political situation in Canada, the President indicated that we really appreciated this courageous position. He added that the U.S. and Canada have a very amicable relationship now, one in which neither side shouts aloud its differences. However, he joked that he and the PM would have differences, considering that they were both of Irish descent, but believed that they could continue to discuss these in a productive manner. (S)

The Prime Minister noted a recent poll gave his Administration a 54% approval rating, for which he received congratulations from his colleagues. But, the PM noted, President Reagan is receiving a 68% approval, indicating that he (the PM) was not doing all that well. The President replied that that may be true, but the PM should remember that he (the President) had had two cracks at it. (%)

The Prime Minister then turned to economic policy. He noted that he made a recent New York Times article on "Reaganomics" mandatory reading for the Cabinet. The thrust of the article was that the economists in Washington were wrong and the President correct all along. When the New York Times admits it, it indicates that the President has really made progress. This could mean that Canadian economists also are wrong. (8)

The Prime Minister said he would inform Minister Clark of the President's call with pleasure, and expressed the Canadian Government's appreciation. PM Mulroney noted that he looked forward to further cooperation in the development of North America, and to their meeting on St. Patrick's Day. The two leaders exchanged pleasantries and said goodbye. (8)

Preparations for the Quebec meeting between the President and Canadian Prime Minister Mulroney have reached the stage where we believe a meeting of the National Security Council is warranted.
