Dear Mr. President:

I write as Chairman of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry ("NCSJ") -- the Jewish Community's chosen instrument for the rescue of Soviet Jewry -- a cause to which you have demonstrated deep concern and leadership. As we approach the day of negotiations between the United States and the U.S.S.R. on some great issues, the NCSJ is heartened by the assurances from your Administration that it will place, as it has, the issue of Soviet Jewry on the agenda in every bilateral discussion with the representatives of the U.S.S.R.

The occasion for this letter was a visit today from Professor Martin Gilbert of Oxford University, the official biographer of Sir Winston S. Churchill, whose seventh volume will soon be published. 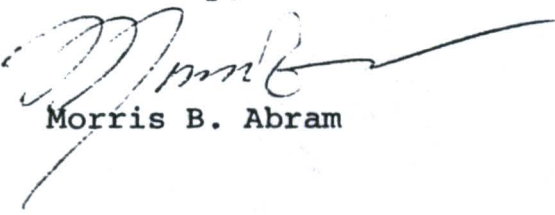

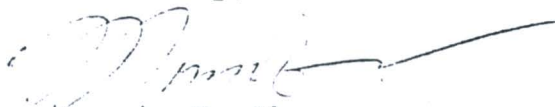

Armand Hammer has written you to pass on a message to him from Chernenko (in a letter from Dobrynin), which he seems to have the illusion is of importance. In fact, all the letter does is to endorse Hammer's idea of a non-first-use pledge -- which is in no way surprising since this is Soviet policy.

SUBJECT: Geneva Delegation and Consultations

The issue of Alliance consultations is closely related to the question of which members of the Geneva Delegation actually participate in the talks. Taking into account the concerns you have raised with us, we believe there is a best solution.

Secretary Shultz is meeting with Foreign Minister Gromyko who will have five individuals with him including an interpreter. He has invited you to join him in this effort. Both Secretary Shultz and you should be accompanied in the room by your personal arms control and Soviet specialists. Using this rationale, the American Delegation could then consist of Secretary Shultz, National Security Advisor McFarlane, Paul Nitze, Art Hartman, Jack Matlock and Ron Lehman. This rationale reinforces the case of why others are excluded. In essence, the appearance is of using a private meeting between Shultz, McFarlane, and Gromyko with their personal advisors. The above approach has the additional advantage of signaling that the White House and the President are fully engaged in the arms control process, offers a plausible explanation as to why other key players are not in the room, and will discourage continued press infatuation with the "two Richards" theme.

ACDA, OSD, JCS, CIA, and Rowny will not be pleased with such an arrangement and OSD, in particular, will make a special plea for having a representative. The alternative is either to expand the size of the group on the American side or drop Nitze, Hartman, Lehman or Matlock. In addition, Rick Burt has argued that he must be in the meeting because he will be doing consultations with the Allies.

On consultations, we recommend that both Paul Nitze and Ed Rowny go to the NAC. This would continue to symbolize to the Allies our continued consultation practices and the separation between START and INF, and would defuse press stories focused on personalities. We believe that Rowny is right in that consultations with Allies should include in each capitol someone who is in the room with the Russians. Rather than bring Rick into the room for that purpose, we recommend instead that Matlock, Lehman or Hartman join Nitze in doing consultations. To ease interagency concerns, a

representative from ACDA or OSD can take part in some or all of the consultations. One option would be to have Paul Nitze do all of the consultations accompanied by Rick Burt and someone from OSD and ACDA. Another option would be to divide capitols with Nitze and perhaps, Perle, going to London, Brussels, and Bonn, with Burt and Matlock, Lehman, or Hartman going to Paris, Rome, and The Hague. Other combinations are possible. Our recommendation is that you not become involved in Alliance consultations now. Instead, we would recommend that you return with Secretary Shultz to brief the President and then return to Europe in late January as part of a carefully orchestrated series of meetings in key capitols.

You need not and probably should not reveal the makeup of the Delegation until the last possible moment. Nevertheless, pressures will build in the next few days for decisions on who will do Alliance consultations. You can best protect your options by broadening the number of participants in the consultations beyond Paul Nitze and Rick Burt.

That you make every effort to characterize the meeting as a private session between Shultz, McFarlane and Gromyko, supported by their personal experts.

TALKING POINTS FOR GROMYKO

-- We have learned that Mr. Gorbachev is thinking of travelling to the United States on a private visit in March or April.

-- We are delighted that Mr. Gorbachev intends to visit the United States, and we would like to invite him to come to Washington for discussions while he is in the country.

-- If Mr. Gorbachev would prefer to travel on an official invitation, we would be pleased to arrange one. He could, for example, come to Washington officially, then travel to other parts of the country as the guest of his private hosts. Or, if he prefers, the entire trip could be official. The Vice President, for example, would be happy to issue an invitation.

-- So please let Mr. Gorbachev know that he is welcome to come in whatever capacity he finds most convenient. Just let us know what he would like and we will be pleased to work out the details to his satisfaction.

-- The President also asked me to reiterate the private comments which he asked you to convey to Mr. Chernenko in September about his interest in meeting whenever Mr. Chernenko thinks that will be useful. We trust you will indicate to us Mr. Chernenko's desires in this regard.

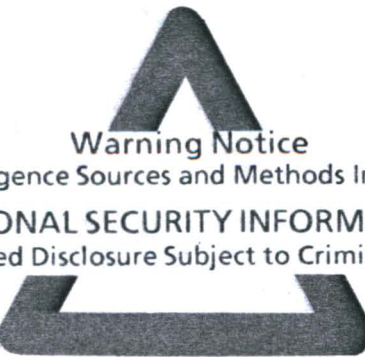

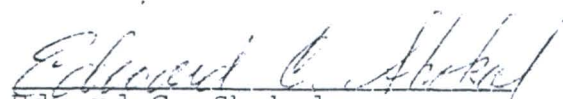
The people who made these tapes did so because they want to do their "most" to keep the USA a country of free people. The background and experience of these people is covered in the attached sheets and in the tapes.

SUBJECT: Review and Summary of Shokal Tapes

The four tapes sent to Bud McFarlane by Edward Shokal have been reviewed by the Crisis Management Center. The information contained in these tapes has apparently been prepared by a group of concerned citizens for civic groups (Lions Club, Rotary, etc.) which have no expertise in Soviet affairs or international relations. Much of what is presented is basic background information designed to alert the audience about the threat of communism.

There are no new ideas or thoughts about U.S.-Soviet relations that are not already well known by Bud and NSC staff members. Essentially, it is an effort by people outside of the government to prepare their version of an intelligence briefing, without having access to classified information. The result is somewhat superficial, inaccurate, and overstated, as might be expected.

There is no need to disseminate these tapes to other agencies or individuals.

SUMMARY OF KEY POINTS, SHOKAL TAPES

1. Dave Sullivan: "Soviet Treaty Violations"

Sullivan argues that the Soviets have been unreliable in honoring arms agreements in the past and should not be trusted in the future. He contends that the Soviets have violated nearly half the arms control agreements they have signed since 1958. He then recounts the points raised in DOD's Soviet Military Power. Because the Soviets enjoy strategic superiority and cannot be trusted to honor agreements, Sullivan concludes, the U.S. should not negotiate with the Soviet Union to limit nuclear weapons.

2. Steve Gilbert: "U.S.-Soviet Relations"

Gilbert contends that relations with the Soviet Union have always been bad and probably always will be. He cites historical, geopolitical and ideological factors which have always prevented close bilateral relations. He also believes that the Soviets have been able to achieve nuclear superiority and contends that "if not for the U.S., the Soviet Union would rule the world."

3. Angelo Cordillo: "Soviet Military Threat to the U.S."

Cordillo contends that the race for offensive weapons is already over and the Soviets have won. He claims that the race is now over defensive systems, and the U.S. cannot afford to fall behind. He argues strongly for SDI and believes that we must defend against all possible Soviet attacks. He also feels that the President understands the need for defensive systems but is being out-manuevered by the U.S. bureaucracy.

4. Sam Dickens: "Russian Military Presence in Central America"

Dickens contends that the USSR is succeeding in Central America and calls for an increase in U.S. aid and military support. He argues that the U.S. cannot afford to allow Central America to become communistic because of its close proximity to the U.S. and its geopolitical importance.

Samuel T. Dickens is the Director for Inter-American Affairs and Editor of Radio Free Americas for the American Security Council. Radio Free Americas is a Spanish language radio program, broadcast in Central and South America and in ten major U.S. cities.

Born in Argentina to American parents, Sam Dickens spent 12 of his first 19 years in South America. He graduated in 1951 from the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, New York. He has a Master of Science Degree in Public Administration from The George Washington University and is a graduate of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and the Air Command and Staff College.

After graduating from West Point, he joined the United States Air Force, where he served for 33 years. His assignments included combat tours in Korea and Vietnam. In Vietnam he commanded a fighter squadron in close air support operations. He has also served as a Flight Commander with a British Royal Air Force fighter squadron, been a Company Officer at the U.S. Naval Academy and performed various flying instructor duties. His last assignment in the Air Force was as Chief, Western Hemisphere Division, Directorate of Plans, Headquarters USAF in Washington, D.C. This was a policy formulation assignment providing recommendations to the Chief of Staff, USAF, on political-military affairs dealing with Canada and Latin America. He represented the Air Staff in the United States-Spain government negotiations conducted during 1975 and has served in Spain as assistant Air Force Attache, Base Commander, Director of Operations of an F-4E "Phantom" fighter wing and Special Assistant to the Joint U.S. Military Group Commander for U.S.-Spain joint discussions.

Since leaving the Air Force he has dedicated himself to promoting U.S. public understanding of the serious challenges facing the United States in the Caribbean and Central America. An expert on Latin American issues, Sam Dickens is frequently called upon to lecture to many audiences in the United States and abroad. He has testified before the Kissinger Commission on Central America, the Republican Study Committee, and the House Sub-Committee on Inter-American Affairs. He has also appeared on several radio and television talk shows hosted by such well known media figures as Mike Douglas and Pat Buchanan.

He has made several trips to Central America in the past years, most recently to El Salvador to observe the May Presidential elections. While in El Salvador he met with then candidates, Jose Napoleon Duarte and Roberto D'Aubuisson. Currently, Sam is producing a video tape updating Attack on the Americas, which probes the causes of the unrest in Central America and explains the reasons why Americans must be concerned with this situation.

Dear Jack:

Thank you so much for taking me to lunch at the White House the week before Christmas. I appreciated the chance to hear your views on the current state of US-Soviet negotiations and to discuss with you my impressions from my recent trip to Moscow.

After talking with you, Ron Lehman and several others at the Pentagon, I was left with the impression that perhaps the best chance for seriously pursuing crisis control measures with the Soviets would be:

1. For the US to show interest in some of the principles enunciated by Chernenko in his March 3 speech, particularly the first one "not to allow situations fraught with the danger of nuclear conflict. If such a danger arises, to hold urgent consultations to prevent a nuclear conflagration." The US might suggest setting up a working group under the rubric of this principle to explore ways of strengthening joint capabilities in this domain.
and/or
2. For the Soviets to respond to President Reagan's proposal for regular meetings between defense ministers. One item on the agenda for the first meeting and subsequent ones might then be various crisis control measures such as the JMCL, an Incidents in the Air Agreement, and the like.

In today's warmer climate, I hope the useful dialogue on crisis control that the Administration has begun will continue and grow.

I would also like to take this opportunity to invite you to Harvard to speak to a small seminar or two. Let me give you some dates and perhaps you can pick one, on the understanding of course that, given the dictates of your schedule, it must remain somewhat uncertain. My proposal would be that you might fly up in the early afternoon and come to the seminar of the Avoiding Nuclear War Project led by Graham Allison, Joe Nye and Al Carnesale. Following that, we would have a dinner in

your honor with a small group of people. This would enable you to make the last flight to DC, or if you like, we would be happy to put you up at the University's Faculty Club. Possible dates are March 13, April 10, and April 24. I look forward to hearing from you on what would be convenient.

I hope you had a very merry Christmas with your family and I wish you a Happy New Year. Please give my very best to your wife.

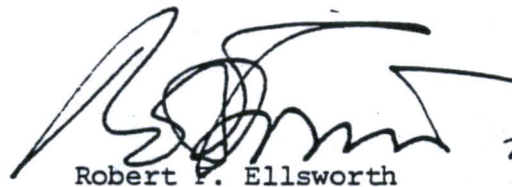

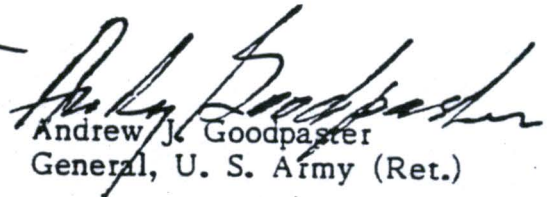

Thank you for your letter of November 20 concerning criticism of the U.S by Warsaw Pact journalists stationed in this country.

Our country has always stood for the free and unfettered rights of journalists to express their views, no matter how repugnant those views may be to us. For that reason, we have never expelled a Communist correspondent or denied a visa on the basis of what that person has written about the U.S. In any case, U.S. immigration laws would not permit us to refuse a visa to someone solely on the grounds that we dislike the way in which he covers the U.S.

At the same time, we have vigorously supported the right of American journalists to practice their trade in Eastern Europe without reference to the content of their writings.

I thank you for communicating your views to me on this matter.

Members of Pomost are disturbed to learn that Dusan Rovensky, a U.S. correspondent for the Czech Communist newspaper, Rude pravo, is using his base here to propagandize against the U.S.

Several instances of his writing have come to Pomost's attention and they clearly follow the "party line" at every step. For example, members of the American Navy are accused of strangling the "revolutionary movement" in South America, and of murdering in Vietnam and Beirut.

Pomost believes that a glaring imbalance exists when journalists from Soviet Bloc nations are allowed to lambast the U.S. at every turn, and to travel throughout the U.S. with relative freedom, while American journalists in Prague, Moscow, East Berlin, etc., are highly censored and restricted.

This situation calls for the principle of reciprocity to be put into effect. In other words, Soviet Bloc journalists who slander the U.S. and write pure propaganda should be denied visas as long as their American counterparts are hindered from reporting fully and freely on the real state of oppression in the world, or that which exists behind the "Iron Curtain" and elsewhere in totalitarian states.

Pomost appreciates your calling this serious matter to the attention of the appropriate U.S. officials.

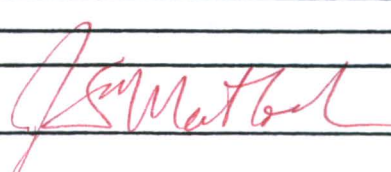
