Dear Mr. Jakupko:

I am replying to your November 12 letter to President
Reagan requesting that he raise the issue of Soviet violations
of human rights of Soviet-born members of the Hare Krishna
Movement during his discussions with Soviet General Secretary
Gorbachev.

The U.S. Government has consistently condemned Soviet unwillingness to respect basic human rights. These measures are contrary to the human rights provisions of the Helsinki Final Act. We have strongly called for the Soviets to comply with their commitments in that agreement. We have made it unequivocally clear in virtually every high-level meeting with Soviet officials that their human rights violations are a serious obstacle to improved U.S.-Soviet relations. We will continue to insist the Soviets live up to their international commitments, including the Helsinki accords.

The Soviets agreed in the Joint Statement to the importance of resolving humanitarian cases in a cooperative spirit.

Please accept my best wishes. Enclosed you will find some material that seriously challenges the Soviet General Secretary, Mr. Gorbachev's recent statement in France, wherein he stated that there are no human rights violations in the Soviet Union.

Through the efforts of the Hindu Alliance of America, we held a press conference on October 24th at the National Press Building and then a follow-up conference at the Senate Dirksen Office Building, at which Mr. Valentin Yurov, a Russian dissident addressed the audience, detailing some of the injustices that are being committed there. Mr. Yurov was recently released from the Soviet Union after his Swedish fiance performed a 21-day hunger strike outside the Soviet Embassy in Stockholm.

Mr. President, we presently have documented accounts of more than twenty Soviet-born members of the Hare Krishna Movement who are confined and tortured in Soviet prisons, mental hospitals and labor camps. There are thousands more who have to worship God in great fear. We want to get these persons released and we are asking for your help to bring this issue to light.

We feel strongly, that not only will your intervention greatly help our members, but it will help the situation of all those persecuted for their beliefs in the Soviet Union.

We are sure, Mr. President, that the one and a half million Indian and Western-born Hindus living in America, will greatly appreciate your speaking out for the right of their brothers and sisters to freely worship God in the U.S.S.R. Needless to say, those followers in the Soviet Union will be eternally indebted to you for your help.

Dear Mr. Gorbachev,

In a few weeks, the leaders of the two most powerful nations of the world will meet. This summit meeting has enormous implications for the future of this planet. As the General Secretary of the Communist Party of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, you, Mr. Gorbachev, obviously have a deep, abiding responsibility to the people of your nation and the rest of the world.

We, the undersigned, represent a deep concern for the basic human rights, the hopes and the aspirations of more than four million practicing Hindus in Europe and North America.

It has been brought to our attention that many members of the Hindu faith living and working in the Soviet Union are being severely persecuted for practicing the faith of their choice in your country.

This letter specifically concerns the fate of 20 Soviet citizens, members of the International Society for Krishna Consciousness, (ISKCON), more popularly known as the Hare Krishna Movement. The Hare Krishna Movement is a bonafide, orthodox, and essential branch of the world Hindu faith. The condition of these Soviet citizens is currently both desperate and tragic. Their names are as follows:

- 1. Musatov, Alexei Arturovich mental hospital
- 2. Pinyayev, Anatoli Fedorovich mental hospital
- 3. Lerner, Yevgeni Emmanuilovich labour camp
- 4. Eisurovich, Boris Aleksandrovich labour camp

- 5. Levin, Alexander Victorovich labour camp
- 6. Zuev, Sergei Vasilievich labour camp
- 7. Kiseleva, Olga Hamidovna labour camp
- 8. Kritski, Vladimir Georgevich labour camp
- 9. Kustrya, Vladimir Alekseevich labour camp
- 10. Samoilova, Valentina Petrovna labour camp
- 11. Baida, Aleksei Mikhailovich labour camp
- 12. Priborov, Sergei Aleksandrovich labour camp
- 13. Fedchenko, Yuri Alekseievich labour camp
- 14. Sukhova, Valeriya Alexandrovna labour camp
- 15. Koltashev, Mikhail Matveyevich labour camp
- 16. Didzhevadze, Jakov Emelyanovich prison
- 17. Janashvili, Rafael prison
- 18. Kasyan, Sergei Martinovich mental hospital
- 19. Dagis, Saulyus Lenginovich mental hospital
- 20. Akopyan, Arik 1-1/2 years of probation with engagement in forced labour.

These 20 individuals are being punished by your government simply for practicing the religion of their choice. We have studied the whole situation very carefully for a long period of time and are convinced that the Soviet government's treatment of these individuals is a flagrant violation of the Soviet government's Constitutional guarantees of freedom of religion. These rights, are encompased by articles 50,52 and 56 of the Soviet Constitution as well as in Articles 18 and 19 of the United Nations International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, ratified by the U.S.S.R. in 1973, and in Section 1 (a)VII of the Helsinki Accords on Security and Cooperation in Europe.

For years, the Hindu people from all over the world have been sending letters of protest about this to the former General Secretaries of the U.S.S.R. and to the Soviet Ambassadors in their countries. But not a single reply has been forth coming.

It is our firm conviction therefore, that your government has severely abused article #227 of the Criminal Code of the Russian Soviet Federated Socialist Republic, by persecuting and harassing these innocent citizens beyond the limits of common human decency. Some of these citizens have been beaten, coerced into giving false testimony against one another, heavily drugged, and denied proper nutrition. They have been unfairly, unjustly, immorally, and illegally incarcerated in prisons, mental

hospitals and labour camps throughout your nation. Often they are confined in a region far from their home making it difficult, if not immpossible, for friends and relatives to visit them. One among them, Olga H. Kiseleva, a pregnant mother with two young daughters, was arrested and sentenced to four-and-a-half years in a labour camp in spite of her pregnancy. Her child was born in the prison and she was allowed to see the infant for only one hour a day. In its eleventh month of life, Olga's baby daughter, Marika, died in the labour camp.

Another Hare Krishna devotee, Mr. Anatoli Pinyayev was, on more than one occasion, taken away without any court sentence, to psychiatric clinics. He had previously been treated at Moscow's Psychiatric Hospital No. 5 with the drug Galoperidol. Now, he is imprisoned at the Special Psychiatric Hospital in Smolensk where the conditions and food are very bad and he is regularly administered heavy and prolonged doses of neuroleptiks such as galoperidol, which causes him great suffering. He is not treated for the side-effects of these drugs and as a result his whole body is swelling up and his normal' alert mental condition is deteriorating. During his confinement last year, his wife asked the clinic doctor when he would be freed. The doctor replied that "Anatoli's view of the world would not be easy to cure quickly."

A third devotee, Mr. Vladimir Kritski, was re-sentenced to an additional four-and-a-half-year prison term while serving his original five-year sentence. The official reason given for his second sentence was "preaching his religious beliefs to his fellow detainees."

The Hare Krishna devotees follow four regulative principles: they refrain from liquor and drugs; they do not gamble; they do not indulge in illicit sex; and they do not eat meat, fish or eggs (they follow a vegetarian diet). It seems then, most ironic and hypocritical, that such severe punishments (as are listed here) be meted out to such morally and well-adjusted persons as these Hare Krishna devotees, especially at a time when alcoholism and illicit sex are recognized as serious social perils within the Soviet Union.

Other important principles followed by these devotees are: praying to the Supreme Lord, Krishna through the recitation of His names, and discussions of the philosophical tenets found in the world's oldest book the Bhagavad-gita. The Bhagavad-gita, the book of truth for these Krishna devotees, is also the Holy Scripture for over 650 million Hindus in India and worldwide.

The Soviet Union, as the neighbor of our motherland, is well aware that the principles for which the Hare Krishna devotees in the Soviet Union are being persecuted and punished today are actually the teachings of one of the world's oldest religious

traditions. The growth and purity of the Hare Krishna Movement in India and throughout the world, has given Hindus all over the world, renewed inspiration to follow their faith more enthusiastically. The Late Prime Minister of India, Lal Bahadur Shastri, had this to say about the founder-acarya of the Hare Krishna Movement: "His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada is doing very valuable work and his books are significant contributions to the salvation of mankind."

We, therefore, respectfully demand that all 20 individuals mentioned above be immediately released from confinement in prisons, mental hospitals and labour camps. We further demand that these individuals be allowed to leave the Soviet Union with their families so that they may freely practice the religion of their choice as is their constitutional right.

Your immediate attention to this matter would be appreciated. We trust that this letter, unlike those mentioned above, (that were sent to Soviet Embassies and to the Kremlin previously), will be responded to. We eagerly await your reply and hope to hear from you by the 31st (thirty-first) of November, 1985.

We request the enclosed list of members of the Hare Krishna Movement be released from their imprisonment and that they, and their families, be allowed to leave the Soviet Union to freely practice the religion of their choice.

I have also enclosed extensive information about each of those imprisoned members of the Hare Krishna Movement and a brief history of the Movement in the U.S.S.R.

THIS LETTER HAS BEEN RETYPED FOR CLARITY

Moscow 12 February 1985

Dear Prime Minister Gandhi:

This letter to you is being written by a group of devotees of the Supreme Lord Shri Krishna, who live in the U.S.S.R.

Perhaps it will be a surprise for you to learn, that there are devotees of Krishna in Russia. Indeed, who could think some ten years ago, that the name of Krishna, the sublime philosophy Krishna taught in the Bhagavad-gita and the entire Vedic spiritual tradition would become dear to a rapidly increasing number of people in the Soviet Union. In big and small Russian cities beginning with Moscow and Leningrad, industrial centres like Siberia, the Ukraine, Armenia and Georgia, in the Baltic Rupublics and in republics of Soviet Asia, as well as in other republics, men and women of different nationalities and occupations are taking to the ancient spiritual practice of Vaishnavism. We consider this philosophy and practices to be the most valuable gift we have ever received during our lives.

Here in the Soviet Union, we feel eternally indebted to a great representative of Indian spiritual culture, His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada, a man whose life, works, and devotion to Lord Krishna became the source of an ever-increasing, remarkable influence upon the Western civilization. In the long run, the present spreading of Vedic spiritual tradition, that is widely known now as the philosophy and practice of Krishna Consciousness, will contribute to a deeper mutual understanding between the peoples of our countries, giving a powerful new impulse to the development of the cultural ties between India and the U.S.S.R.

Unfortunately however, the followers of the Vedic spiritual tradition, known as the Hare Krishna devotees, are, to say the least, having a difficult time in the Soviet Union. While Soviet scholars continue their studies in the field of Indian culture and philosophy, discussing from a merely academic point of view, to actually accept this invaluable heritage, or to follow the teachings of the great Vaisnavas in everyday life, is declared an outlaw, criminal activity, subject to severe punishments. In the last few years, quite a large number of people practicing Krishna Consciousness were put on trial on the grounds of organizing an unlawful religious group that endangered the physical and mental health of their followers. To prove that accusation, the authorities use the practice of forcibly putting devotees into mental hospitals, where they are given psychopharmacological drugs, that actually endanger one's health as a result of prolonged intoxication. The story of persecuting Krishna's

devotees in violation of their rights guaranteed by the Soviet Constitution is rich with examples of the most brutal treatment, apparently aimed at intimidating the Vaishnavas and all of those people who are interested in Krishna in our country. This practice of intimidation begins when authorities attempt to get suitable testimonies from devotees against each other. It continues during the trials where devotees have been given sentences varying from 1 to 4-1/2 years of labor or forcible treatment in mental hospitals. Nothing is rejected in order to make devotees fearful, to force them to abandon their spiritual life.

One of the most abominable examples of such behavior is the story of how a young woman, Olga Kiseleva, was punished. She was arrested during her pregnancy. Neither this fact, nor the fact that she already had two little children, were taken into consideration. On the eve of the delivery of her baby, she was severely beaten by her cellmates. They struck her head against the wall paying no attention to the possible consequences for her and her future child. Shortly after that, she was put on trial. The court sentenced her to 4 years in a labor camp, the maximum term of punishment in such cases. The farm where Olga Kiseleva lived, together with her husband and two children, was confiscated; so the children were punished together with their mother. Olga's third child, a girl, was born in jail, and she was allowed to see the infant for only one hour a day.

The list of those already serving their sentences along with Olga Kiseleva are as follows: Sergi Kurkin and Vladimir Kritski were arrested in 1981. Yevgeni Lerner, Sergei Zuev, Aleksander Levin and Boris Eisurovich also received sentences varying from 1-1/2 to 4-1/2 years in labor camps; Aleksei Musatov and Anatoli Pinyayev who were put into mental hospitals with authorities not saying when they will be released (these last five devotees and Olga Kiseleva were arrested in 1983.)

Recently the devotees of Krishna here have had new trouble. In the south of our country, where a large group of devotees live, several searches and arrests were made. They moved there from the large towns in hopes of having less conflicts with the authorities. During October 1984, the following devotees were Yuri Fedchenko, Vladimir Kustrya, Aleksei Baida, Sergei Priborov and Valentina Samoilova. Sergei Priborov was reported to be hiding after he learned that the authorities wanted to arrest him also. The latest news that we learned about him was that the authorities managed to find him and put him in a mental hospital. We also learned that Yuri Fedchenko was beaten by the police officers after he had refused to let them make a search of his home because they had no official documents to permit them to do so. Aleksei Baida was also beaten by police representatives. one can expect a trial for these devotees in the near future, and we do not know what sentences are prepared for them.

We must add that those devotees who are not incarcerated are still deprived of their freedom. They cannot worship together and they cannot lead a normal devotional life, a right that the Constitution of the U.S.S.R. officially guarantees to the citizens of our country. Even the participation of children in the religion of their parents is considered unlawful and the parents may be punished for teaching their children spiritual philosophy and instructing them in the practice of the spiritual life that they lead themselves.

Never before have we asked the leader of another nation to try to help us with the difficulties we have here. We continued to hope that the authorities would understand that members of our religion must be given the right to religious freedom which is officially guaranteed to all Soviet citizens by the Soviet Constitution. Our aims and desires are concerned with spiritual life, not with politics. So there is no reason to regard the devotees of Lord Krishna as political enemies. Our patient behavior and the fact that we have never made public protests were used against us to persecute us in the most brutal and uncivilized manner. The latest arrests have shown that the authorities are not going to change their attitude towards the Vaishnavas in this country. Accusations put forward against the devotees at trials are so unjustified and artificial that they forced one of the lawyers to make remarks rarely heard in Soviet courts.

At a trial that took place last year, the lawyer began her speech with the following words, "Let me remind the court that we are not living in the times of Stalin now." With this phrase, she meant that false accusations and ungrounded sentences were common in the Soviet courts during that time. Arrest and searches in the homes of devotees, the practice of intimidating them during the interrogations are common and are violations of our human rights. Our spiritual master, His Divine Grace Harikesa Swami Visnupada was forced to leave the Soviet Union within 24 hours when he was here the last time in March of 1980. An article in the Soviet weekly magazine, "Nedelya," tried to defame him by saying that he is a C.I.A. agent, an accusation so absurd that it is even ridiculous to discuss it. The Soviet Press also published many articles trying to defame the devotees in this country and the accusations that were always completely absurd and unjustified.

Further, the devotees are not allowed to present their views in the press to complain about the way they are treated. No one will learn from the press about the fate of Olga Kiseleva or about the beating of Yuri Fedchenko just because he didn't want to let the police officers make an illegal search of his home.

That's why we decided to write this letter to you and humbly ask you to help us. Of course we understand that a problem like this is a delicate one because the U.S.S.R. is a country friendly to India. But, on the other hand, one may hope that for this very reason, your voice, your opinion, cannot be just ignored by the

Soviet leaders. If you can address the Soviet head of State, Mikhail Gorbachev, this could change the fate of those awaiting trial, as well as the whole situation of the Hare Krishna devotees (Vaishnavas) in the U.S.S.R. It is only the extremely unjust treatment enacted by the State's representatives upon us and their cold determination to deprive us of the very essence of our lives—devotional service to Lord Krishna—that we are compelled to take such an unprecedented step, as to address you.

Prime Minister Gandhi, if there is anything you can do for us, please, please try to do that.

We are grateful to you for any kind of help you can provide to stop this improper treatment. We confidently believe that if you attempt to help us in this way, you will surely succeed. Please accept our most humble obeisances and respects. Hare Krishna.

Just as this letter was completed, we received grave news. Olga's third daughter, Marika, born in prison, died at the age of eleven months in a labor camp in Mordovia. Please try to help Olga join the surviving members of her family, her two little daughters and her husband, Rein Metaniin.

We also learned that Vladimir Kritski was put on trial for a second time. After two years in the labour camp, he was allowed to serve the remaining two years of his sentence in exile in a small Siberian town. There he continued to preach and some new friends appeared, eager to hear about the Vedic culture and philosophy. But, the authorities there learned about that. He was arrested again and was sentenced to another five years of labour camp. After that he will have to serve the remaining two years of exile from his previous sentence. The complete term of his punishment will be nine years simply for being a devotee of Lord Krishna and teaching the message of Lord Krishna to others. When he heard the court's decision at the end of the trial, he said that he had nothing to lose by continuing to preach to people in the labour camp.

And finally, we have just heard that Anatoli Pinyayev is in a Special Psychiatric Hospital in Smolensk and is being administered drugs to alter his consciousness to force him to give up his belief in Lord Krishna. The drugs are taking their toll on him. His whole body is swelling up and his mental condition is

deteriorating.

Please, Prime Minister Gandhi, help these suffering devotees of Lord Krishna. We desperately need your help.

Dear Mr. Struve:

I have been asked to respond to your recent letter to National Security Adviser Robert McFarlane concerning the tragic fate of Raoul Wallenberg. The President, the Department of State, and Congress share a strong concern about the fate of Mr. Wallenberg. The U.S. Government takes every opportunity to make this concern known to the Soviet authorities.

Reflecting our interest in this case, President Reagan signed into law in October, 1981 a bill conferring honorary U.S. citizenship upon Raoul Wallenberg. Honoring Mr. Wallenberg in this fashion was an important symbolic act. Then, as now, it made the Soviets and the world aware of our great admiration for his courage and dedication to humanity. In addition, it stressed our abhorrence for his unjust and illegal punishment by the Soviet government.

To emphasize further our dedication to resolve the mystery of Mr. Wallenberg's fate, we raised his case with the Soviets through diplomatic channels after he was made an honorary citizen. To date the Soviets have not responded. Our efforts to find answers to the questions surrounding Mr. Wallenberg's case, however, will continue until the Soviets provide a full and satisfactory clarification of their involvement in the issue.

We have pressed our efforts both in bilateral meetings and international forums, such as the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe (CSCE) Review Meeting in Madrid and the U.N. Human Rights Commission. In 1982, the U.S. Representative to the U.N. Human Rights Commission urged the Soviet Union to make a "humanitarian gesture which would contribute to universal good-feeling, namely a renewed search and full report, which may lay questions to rest; or else in the best of all possible outcomes, result in the discovery of the whereabouts of a man who stands among the heroes of our time." At a February 1983 session of the Commission, the U.S. Alternate Representative again raised the issue of Raoul Wallenberg, whom he termed "one of the genuine heroes of World War II, and one of the war's most noble spirits."

Mr. Guy Miller Struve Davis Polk and Wardwell 1 Chase Manhattan Plaza New York, New York 10005 We continue to work closely with the Swedish Government to investigate reports that Mr. Wallenberg might still be alive. Thus far we have been unable to substantiate this information.

Nevertheless we continue to support a cooperative effort with the Swedish Government and other interested parties to shed light on the regrettable lacunas in the case of this brave man.

On January 17, 1985, President Reagan issued a statement marking the fortieth anniversary of Raoul Wallenberg's disappearance and commemorating his "heroic deeds in saving thousands of Hungarian Jews." In his statement the President said, "We will continue to insist that the Soviet Union has a moral obligation to answer, once and for all, the questions we have about his fate."

President Reagan discussed the full range of issues bearing on U.S.-Soviet relations, including human rights, during his November meeting with General Secretary Gorbachev. As we prepared for that meeting, we welcomed hearing your views.

We represent the plaintiffs in the above-entitled action, who are, respectively, the half brother and legal guardian of Raoul Wallenberg. Although the action also seeks declaratory relief and damages, its fundamental purpose is to secure the release of Raoul Wallenberg if he is still alive (or to secure the release of his remains and a full accounting for his fate if he is dead).

On October 15, 1985, the United States District Court for the District of Columbia granted a default judgement in favor of the plaintiffs in the action. decision, the Court found that while there is insufficient evidence to support a definitive finding as to whether Raoul Wallenberg is presently dead or alive, the evidence rebuts the claim (which the Soviet Union has made since February of 1957) that Wallenberg died in July of 1947.

NOVE O BOS

Plaintiffs do not view the lawsuit as an end in itself. Its fundamental objective, as stated above, is the release of Raoul Wallenberg. If this purpose could be achieved by any means, plaintiffs would be more than willing to discuss the speedy resolution of the remaining aspects of the litigation. In this connection, I am sure it has occurred to you that the Soviet Union now has a General Secretary and a Foreign Minister who have no prior public identification with the Soviet Union's actions in relation to Raoul Wallenberg. It would seem that there are few actions which the Soviet Union could take which would have a more positive impact upon Soviet-American relations than the release of Raoul Wallenberg and a full and frank accounting for his fate. If such a result could be brought about -whether by the raising of this subject in the forthcoming summit discussions or otherwise -- plaintiffs would be pleased to cooperate in such efforts.

The forthcoming summit presents a rare -- and perhaps final -- opportunity for the United States to raise the issue of Raoul Wallenberg's freedom with a new generation of Soviet leaders. If we can be of any assistance to you in taking advantage of this opportunity, we are, of course, at your service.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

Thank you for your letter of November 18 to Director Wick, who is out of the city. You asked for our comments on S. 1847, proposing a "Samantha Smith Memorial Exchange Program." As the President reported to the Congress upon his return from Geneva, the Administration shares with the bill's sponsors a strong interest in increasing the number of people-to-people contacts -- especially among young people -- between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The President has spoken of his interest in a broad range of exchange programs in addition to those specified in the exchanges agreement just signed in Geneva. We expect that the Administration, in consultation with the Congress, will move quickly to develop and negotiate with the Soviets a number of programs involving both Soviets and Americans, particularly in view of the traditional Soviet reluctance to allow large numbers of Soviet youth to participate in such programs. The Samantha Smith Memorial Exchange Program, as proposed, is directed primarily at American students who would travel to the Soviet Union for area and language studies. We hope that such an effort will be only one aspect of expanded exchanges with the Soviet Union and would prefer that it develop as part of the broader expansion of contacts.

The President has also spoken of his intention that expanded exchanges would be truly "people-to-people," involving the American private and voluntary sectors that are a critical component of successful exchange programs. There are already a number of privately sponsored exchange programs with the Soviet Union similar to those envisioned in the proposed legislation. We believe it important that Federally supported programs be designed so that they will not displace these ongoing private efforts, or other private activities that will develop as a result of heightened interest in U.S.-USSR exchange programs.

Finally, Section 3 of the bill would add yet another earmark to the Agency's Fiscal Year 1986-1987 Authorization Bill. Given the number of earmarks already in the Authorization and the fact that the appropriations process is moving to reduce the amount available for exchange-of-persons programs from the levels originally authorized, this provision would be a disservice to the Agency's other programs. In view of our substantive concerns, which we believe can only be addressed through thorough program development and negotiation, we view this proposed further earmarking, at best, as premature.

Having stated our concerns about specific features of the bill, let me reiterate our strong support for its general intent -- to increase significantly the number of people-to-people exchanges with the Soviet Union. We are hopeful that progress in developing such exchanges will be rapid and enjoy the full support of the Administration, the Congress, and the Soviets.

United States-Soviet Summit in Geneva

Remarks on Arrival in Geneva, Switzerland. November 16, 1985

President Furgler, I would like to extend to you and to the Swiss people my appreciation for helping to make possible the coming meetings between representatives of the United States and the Soviet Union.

Nancy and I are delighted to be in this magnificent city on the shores of Lake Geneva. On behalf of the American people, thank you for your warm and friendly welcome. Mr. President, it is fitting that the meetings of the next few days should take place on Swiss soil, for Switzerland has long been a leader in the search for peace and the defense of human freedom. Again and again, you have provided your territory for international meetings and your good offices in the mediation of disputes. It was the Swiss who founded one of the great humanitarian organizations of our time, the International Red Cross. And it is Switzerland that often represents the diplomatic interests of other nations, including the United States, in lands where these nations have no formal diplomatic relations of their own. Indeed, in your unshakable commitment to independence, democratic government, and human rights, the Swiss Confederation in itself serves as an example to all the world.

The motto on the Great Seal of the United States, Mr. President, is "E Pluribus Unum"—Out of many, one. Well, here in Switzerland, a country of rich religious, cultural, and linguistic variety you practice just

so he unity in diversity. Permit ments and that our two equations are best I tog them by family ties. As early as 1562 a Saist citizen appeared in Florida, and in 1670 a Swiss settlement was established near Charleston, South Carolina. Ever since, Americans of Swiss descent have picheered and led the development of our nation.

Today Swiss Americans number in the hundreds of thousands, and I would be remiss if I failed to express their affection for you, their Swiss cousins. Indeed, just last month the good will of the American people toward the Swiss was formally expressed in a joint resolution of the Congress of the United States. And recently, Mr. President, Boston University awarded you an honorary doctorate of laws.

In your acceptance address, you stressed the obligations incumbent upon the West to defend its values and its way of life. "It is," you said, "part of the definition and vocation of the human being to be free." Well, Mr. President, each in its own way, our two nations stand at the forefront of this struggle for liberty; each stands determined to defend the freedoms of its own people and to advance the cause of freedom throughout the world; and each rests confident in the knowledge that freedom will endure and prevail.

It is to make certain that this great work on behalf of human freedom can go forward in peace that I have come here today. As I stated last month before the United Nations, I'm convinced that American-Soviet relations need a fresh start—a genuine give-and-take on regional conflicts, on human rights, and on the reduction of arms. American and Soviet differences on these matters run deep. Mr. Gorbachev and I cannot surmount them in only 2 days, but I'm here in the fervent hope that on behalf of all the people of the world, we can at least make a start.

President Furgler, once again, to you and the people of Switzerland, our friendship and our deepest gratitude.
