SPOT COMMENTARY: Gorbachev Named Funeral Commission Chairman

TASS announced this morning that Party Secretary Gorbachev has been named to head the commission for General Secretary Chernenko's funeral, scheduled for Wednesday. The announcement came less than an hour after the Soviet media officially announced Chernenko's death. According to Yugoslav media, the Central Committee is now meeting to name a successor.

Comment: The naming of Gorbachev to chair the funeral commission is a strong indication that he will succeed Chernenko as General Secretary. Both Andropov and Chernenko chaired the funeral commissions of their predecessors. Gorbachev was named to head the commission with unusual swiftness. Six and a half hours elapsed between the official announcement of Andropov's death and the naming of his funeral commission. Andropov was named to head Brezhnev's funeral commission four and a half hours after the death announcement.

The rapid pace of events so far suggests that a successor will be named promptly, possibly within the day, but at least by tomorrow. Both Andropov and Chernenko were named to the top post prior to the funeral.

WHITE HOUSE STATEMENT

The President has sent a message of condolence to Acting Head of State, Vasiliy Vasil'yevich Kuznetsov, on the death of Chairman and General Secretary Konstantin Ustinovich Chernenko. In his message, the President reaffirmed his commitment to peace and to working for a cooperative relationship with the peoples of the Soviet Union and the Soviet government. The President called upon the Soviet leadership to seize the opportunity offered by the negotiations about to begin in Geneva to make progress toward our shared goal of eliminating nuclear weapons from the face of the earth.

In our relations with the Soviet Union, the United States has three basic goals: to reduce significantly the unacceptably high numbers of weapons which now exist; to eliminate the use and the threat of force in international relations; and to develop greater trust and confidence in our relations with the Soviet Union overall. Our nations share an interest in the development of stable and constructive relations for the long term.

We believe that the problems which exist in U.S.-Soviet relations can be resolved and that progress is possible in the near term. We cannot achieve progress single-handedly, but we will do our part to bring it about. The United States hopes to work with the Soviet leadership to build on common interests in order to help create a better and safer world.

STATEMENT BY SECRETARY OF STATE SHULTZ

The President has sent a message of condolence to the Soviet leadership on the death of General Secretary Konstantin Ustinovich Chernenko, and I have sent a similar message to Foreign Minister Gromyko.

The problems which engage our two countries are many and complex. They will not be quickly or easily resolved. But they must be resolved peacefully, and progress is possible in many areas.

Our negotiators in Geneva are about to tackle the critical issues of reducing nuclear weapons and advancing toward the ultimate goal of eliminating them from the face of the earth. We want to work with the Soviet Union to avoid miscalculation and help reduce the threat or use of force as a solution to tensions in troubled areas of the world. We want to work with the Soviet Union to resolve problems in our bilateral relationship to mutual benefit, and build greater trust and confidence in the way we deal with each other.

Our goal is a more stable and constructive relationship between our counries for the long term, and our policy toward the USSR will be patient, consistent and realistic. Opportunities for genuine peace and for progress in US-Soviet relations exist, and we will do our part to bring that about. We would like to count on Soviet willingness to work with us to that end.

- We note the passing of Chairman Chernenko and I am sending condolences to the Soviet leadership.
- We will deal with the new Soviet leader with an open mind and will continue to make every effort to improve our relations and lower the levels of nuclear arms.
- o I am pleased that the negotiations in Geneva will open as scheduled.

We're ready

- Lots of hard preparation has been done.
- We have concrete, constructive proposals; will be interested in Soviet ideas; will be flexible; hope Soviets are equally prepared for serious give and take.
- Will be a long and hard process -- patience, strength, and Allied unity are required.
- We are realistic about differences between ourselves and the Soviets. While pursuing arms control, we will also press for progress in regional, bilateral and human rights issues.
- I cannot go into details of our negotiating positions or hypothetical tradeoffs, as we want to respect the confidentiality of the negotiating process.

The New Talks

- Short-term: priority is to reduce US and Soviet offensive nuclear forces -- systems which exist now and which threaten entire populations.
- Medium-term: if research bears out, discuss how US and USSR can move away from relying solely on threat of nuclear retaliation toward greater reliance on defenses which threaten no one (the morally preferable approach).
- Cong-term: goal is the ultimate elimination of nuclear weapons.
- As we negotiate for nuclear arms reduction, we need to bear in mind the necessity of remaining firm in our resolve to maintain an adequate deterrence to war. Our negotiating flexibility must be coupled with firmness and resolve if it is to be effective in producing the outcome we all desire -- radical reductions in nuclear weapons as a step toward the ultimate goal in eliminating them.

You will have seen the report

indicating that,

Chernenko had died but the news was being withheld until after the holiday (International Women's Day). (The motivation cited is plausible, since this is a big holiday in the Soviet Union and is considered a joyful one.)

There is, however, no other indication that Chernenko has died, except for an alert originating with BBC, which could have been asked to monitor broadcasts by the UK government on the basis of the same report that we have. If the Soviets have decided to withhold the information for a day, however, one would not expect to see indications in the media, and as of noon today there have been no signs of unusual programming. More significant perhaps is the report that the Shcherbitsky delegation here has done nothing to alter their travel plans. (It is virtually inconceivable that Shcherbitsky would not be notified if Chernenko had in fact died.)

Fritz Ermarth, the Agency's NIO for the Soviet Union, believes that there is no more than a 50/50 chance that the report of Chernenko's death is correct, and I concur.

However that may be, this report serves as a reminder that we may very well be faced with Chernenko's death without advance notice. Therefore, the question of whether or not the President attends the funeral will arise once again. While we cannot anticipate all the particulars which may be relevant at the time the event occurs, it would probably be prudent to discuss the matter with the President.

It seems to me that arguments for and against the President's attendance are fairly evenly balanced, and I would not be inclined to come down hard on either side. On the positive side one can say that our relations started to be more civil under

Chernenko than under his predecessors, and also that without a KGB background Chernenko is marginally more savory than Andropov was. This makes it somewhat easier for the President to be seen honoring him. The President's attendance at the funeral would also disarm those critics who accuse him of not doing enough to communicate with the Soviet leaders.

On the other hand, there are no strong substantive reasons for him to go. The precedent has already been established for the Vice President to do this duty, and there will certainly be no offense if he goes once again. Any conversation the President would have with a successor would necessarily be short, and there are arguments for waiting until a more substantive summit can be arranged.

If the President is interested in considering attendance at the funeral, we should give some thought to how the trip and announcement should be handled in order to maximize the advantages. Obviously, we should do so in the most discreet fashion.

Recommendation:

That you encourage the President to consider what his position should be in regard to attending Chernenko's funeral, and if he is inclined to go this time to let you know so some very discreet contingency planning can be done.

Soviet Politburo members minus Chernenko and Romanov, appeared at a meeting yesterday in the Bolshoy Theater in honor of the holiday. It is not unusual for ceremonies to be held on a day other than the actual holiday.

Moscow media are following scheduled programming, with features devoted to the holiday.

Shcherbitskiy delegation here in Washington have displayed no unusual activity thus far.

Comment: In the last two cases, the Soviets announced the death of the Soviet leader in about 24 hours. It is possible Chernenko might be dead and the Politburo is withholding the news. If Chernenko really is dead, we believe the Politburo will not withhold the news much longer. With each hour that passes without information, the story becomes more unlikely to be true.

CHERNENKO FUNERAL

Should President attend?

PROS

- -- Atmosphere of relations has improved somewhat.
- -- Chernenko has no KGB background.
- -- Would demonstrate President's desire to deepen contacts and solve problems.
- -- Would be welcomed in Europe.
- -- Gorbachev seems likely to be named Gen.Sec. and it would be useful to meet him early on.
- -- Attendance would undercut Soviet propaganda that President is hostile to Russians as people.
- -- At least <u>some</u> important allied leaders are likely to be there; it now appears 95% certain that Thatcher will go and it is most likely Kohl will go. Mitterand has not yet decided -- would probably go if President does.

CONS

- -- No compelling reason to do things differently this time.
- -- In setting funeral so early (Wednesday), Soviets may intend to discourage high-level attendance.
- -- Logistics will be difficult; departure required tonight or early tomorrow.
- -- Meeting with Gorbachev would necessarily be very short.
- -- Some in U.S. would criticize as indicating overeagerness to reach agreements.

NOTE

If President is inclined to go, we should not be too hasty in making a public announcement. We should take time to check discreetly with Soviets to make sure his attendance would be welcomed. Also, Allied leaders would doubtless welcome a "heads up."
