She talked to her mother-in-law in Moscow...just a little while ago. The mother-in-law has had no news and thinks that something very bad has happened to her son in prison. Anatol's mother hasn't seen him for a year, has had no letters for four and a half months.

This week she tried very hard to be received by some Soviet authorities responsible for that and they would not see her -- and no answers on questions about her son.

Next week, Monday, she will try to go to the authorities again. She wants very much to see her son and writes many letters to the authorities asking to be given permission to see her son to be sure he is alive. She thinks it is important now to find out if he is alive and where he is since on July 13 he should have finished is solitary confinement sentence.

Avital says that he had never suffered such symptoms before; it is the effect of nine months (!) of solitary confinement, which is due to terminate in early November. Attached at Tab II is a letter from Norma Holmes, EU Wireless Editor (International Communication Agency), to the President recommending the issuance of a commemorative stamp of Raoul Wallenberg. Her suggestion is most timely and worthwhile, but not feasible. According to the criteria set forth by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee (U.S. Postal Service), which reviews and judges all stamp proposals, a stamp can honor a person but only if that person has been dead for ten years. Given the controversy centered on Wallenberg's whereabouts, the issuance of a stamp would suggest we believe Wallenberg to be actually dead. Clearly, her proposal should not be endorsed.

I have drafted a letter at Tab I from you to Ms. Holmes thanking her for her suggestion and explaining why you deem her proposal inappropriate.

Dear Ms. Holmes:

Thank you for your letter of September 21 to the President recommending the issuance of a commemorative stamp of Raoul Wallenberg.

The President and I fully share your concern about the tragic fate of Raoul Wallenberg. As you know, the Administration has participated actively in a broad international movement to commemorate this remarkable hero, to underscore recognition and admiration of his brave and humanitarian contributions, and to focus public attention on one of the most outlandish Soviet human rights violations.

Your suggestion is a particularly timely and worthwhile endeavor, but unfortunately not feasible. According to the criteria set forth by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee (United States Postal Service), which reviews and judges all stamp proposals, a stamp can honor a person but only if that person has been dead for ten years. Given the controversy centered on Wallenberg's whereabouts, the issuance of a stamp would suggest we believe Wallenberg to be actually dead.

Your expressed concern and worthy suggestion are most appreciated.

Dear Mr. President:

The European wireless file of USICA {U·S· Information Agency} has carried several stories in recent months of Raoul Wallenberg, including recent actions of the Congress to bestow American citizenship upon him.

October 25 marks the 25th anniversary of the Hungarian revolution. While recognizing the delicacy of the situation it would be remiss not to suggest that consideration be given to the issuance of a commemorative stamp of Wallenberg.

Where stamp art and design are involved, production of commemoratives in the past can take months. Yet a photographic stamp could be most effective and less costly, and might yet be produced in the five to six weeks remaining.

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Additionally the psychological effect of such an act might also be a factor in determining Wallenberg's whereabouts.

Time is such a critical element in this matter if it is to be done and with other Agencies to be considered. I have simply relayed this to your staff for whatever worth it may be.

Attached at Tab II is a letter from Norma Holmes, EU Wireless Editor (International Communication Agency), to the President recommending the issuance of a commemorative stamp of Raoul Wallenberg. Her suggestion is most timely and worthwhile, but not feasible. According to the criteria set forth by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee (U.S. Postal Service), which reviews and judges all stamp proposals, a stamp can honor a person but only if that person has been dead for ten years. Given the controversy centered on Wallenberg's whereabouts, the issuance of a stamp would suggest we believe Wallenberg to be actually dead. Clearly, her proposal should not be endorsed.

I have drafted a letter at Tab I from you to Ms. Holmes thanking her for her suggestion and explaining why you deem her proposal inappropriate.

Raoul Wallenberg, a Swedish diplomat, is credited with saving the lives of over 100,000 Jews in Hungary at the end of World War II. In 1945, he was arrested when the Russian Army occupied Budapest. Thereafter his whereabouts became unknown for years. In 1952, the Soviet Union announced he was dead; however, reports from various witnesses have indicated Wallenberg has spent time in Soviet prisons and is still alive.

The Administration has participated actively in a broad international movement to commemorate this remarkable hero and focus public attention on one of the most outlandish Soviet human rights violations. Recently, the U.S. Congress passed a bill granting honorary citizenship to Wallenberg.

Mrs. Holmes' suggestion is thus a most timely and worthwhile endeavor. Your endorsement of the proposed commemorative stamp would clearly underscore our recognition and admiration of Wallenberg's brave and humanitarian contributions. However, as there is no discernible connection between Wallenberg and the Hungarian Revolution, there is no need to link the issuance of the stamp to the anniversary of the Hungarian Revolution.
