SUBJECT:

Soviet Message on Embassy Pentecostalists

George Shultz forwarded you a memorandum (Tab A) concerning a message on the Pentecostalists delivered to State by the Minister-Counselor at the Soviet Embassy, Sokolov. The message reiterates the standard Soviet position that the U.S. bears full responsibility for both keeping the Pentecostals in the U.S. Embassy and for encouraging them to leave. It also states that the families will not be persecuted if they leave and "the question of their leaving the USSR will be considered," with "account taken of all the circumstances involved."

Based on the tone of his discussions with Sokolov, George speculates that the Soviets may want to resolve this long-standing problem. He asserts that although this message adheres to the standard line, Soviet authorities may in fact permit the Pentecostalists to emigrate once they return home. After George discusses this matter further with Ambassador Hartman, he will forward you his recommendations.

While this interpretation of Soviet actions cannot be ruled out, I am skeptical that the Soviets have any intention of permitting the Pentecostalists to leave. In February 1982, one of the Pentecostalists, Lidiya Vashchenko did return to Chernogorsk on the condition (as promised by Soviet authorities) that her exit visa application be reviewed. Since that time, she has been prevented from applying for emigration. Hence, if we are to convince the families to leave the Embassy, clear assurances by a high-level Soviet official that the Pentecostalists will be permitted to emigrate should be attained.

Dobrynin is ill, and called to ask that I receive his Minister-Counselor, Sokolov, briefly this afternoon. Sokolov brought with him the text of a message from Moscow on the Pentecostalists in our Embassy there. The text is attached.

The message begins with the standard Soviet line that we are responsible for both the problem -- keeping Soviet citizens in the Embassy -- and the solution -- making them leave. It also reiterates previous statements that the Soviets will not "persecute" them if they leave. Then, in what Sokolov described as "the constructive part" of the message, it says that if they return to their home town in Siberia, "the question of their leaving the USSR will be considered," with "account taken of all the circumstances involved."

Formally, this does not go beyond what the Soviets have said before. Nevertheless, the Soviets are obviously trying to be responsive to your deep interest in the Pentecostalists' plight. Thus, although the written message keeps their formal line intact, they may in fact be offering a kind of assurance that emigration will be permitted if the families return home first.

There are two problems with this. First, the families have had several lifetimes of broken promises, and it may take a great deal more than this sort of vague and masked assurance (if that is what it is) to convince them to leave their refuge in the Embassy and apply for emigration from home. Second, given the vagueness of the message, we should be skeptical too.

I will be reviewing the issue of how we should respond, and will want to get the views of Ambassador Art Hartman, who will be here for consultations next week. I will then be giving you my recommendations.

TEXT OF SOVIET MESSAGE ON PENTECOSTALISTS

We already explained to the American side our principled position on this subject. Keeping Soviet citizens in the U.S. Embassy for such a long time is clearly illegal and abnormal. Their further stay there only aggravates the situation, and the responsibility for that fully rests with the American side. The resolution of this issue depends precisely on the American side: the above mentioned persons should leave the U.S. Embassy.

In this connection we can say definitely that no one is going to persecute them, there are no such intentions. Accordingly, after those persons return to the place of their residence, the question of their leaving the USSR will be considered. It will be done with account taken of all the circumstances involved in this matter.

Developments on Soviet Pentecostals

The Soviet authorities have requested Lidia Vashchenko to apply formally for exit permission and on March 30 she did so. She is now in her home town, Chernogorsk, awaiting a decision on her application. If it is approved, she will receive an Israeli visa (her nominal destination) in Moscow and exit via Vienna. Our Embassy in Moscow is ready to give her any assistance she needs, and private organizations are poised to send representatives to meet her in Vienna.

After Lidia departs the Soviet Union, we will want to make a strong effort to persuade the Pentecostals in the Embassy that their best chance of getting out of the Soviet Union is to return to Chernogorsk and apply immediately for exit permission. Even a dramatic development such as Lidia's departure may not make this easy, since the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families remain deeply afraid of what may happen to them. We intend to ask a prominent private American who is known to and trusted by the Pentecostals to go to Moscow with the advice to return to Chernogorsk. Olin Robison, President of Middlebury College, seems to us the best choice. He has spent considerable time with the Pentecostals, is personally involved in the case and enjoys the trust of all parties.

Pentecostalists at Embassy Moscow

Embassy Moscow, through the Vashchenko family members in refuge there, has received word that Lidia Vashchenko has been told by Soviet officials to pick up her exit documentation today (April 4). It is possible that the Soviets may accelerate emigration procedures to permit her departure from the USSR as early as tomorrow.

As you know, we have told both the Embassy Pentecostalists and the Soviet Government that Lidia's case would be regarded as a test of Soviet good faith in dealing with the other Vashchenko and Chmykhalov family members. If, as we anticipate, Lidia succeeds in emigrating this week, the time is right to point out to those still at the Embassy the advisability of following her example by returning to Chernogorsk to apply for Soviet exit permission. For this task, I recommend Dr. Olin Robison, a lay Protestant Minister and president of Middlebury College in Vermont. Dr. Robison has visited the Embassy Pentecostalists frequently, most recently in February 1983, and he retains their trust. During the previous Administration he was designed a U.S. "special emissary" to attempt to resolve their situation. He has commitments in the U.S. April 11-18, and is currently considering whether he can travel to Washington and Moscow this week.

If he agrees and you approve, we shall designate Dr. Robison to act again as our representative and send him to Moscow to discuss current developments with the Vashchenkos and Chmykhalovs. Attached is the suggested text of a personal letter from you which he would deliver to them. It does not commit you to assuring their ultimate departure, but does assure them that Dr. Robison has your confidence. Prior to his departure for Moscow, I recommend that Dr. Robison meet with me to ensure that he conveys your message to the Pentecostalists as fully and precisely as possible.

Update on the State-of-Play of Lidia Vashchenko's Emigration
Thursday, April 7
8:00 a.m.

--There is still no clear indication of where Lidia intends to go from Vienna. U.S. Pentecostal activist Jane Drake has told our Moscow Embassy that she has heard indirectly that Lidia would leave for England this morning with British Pentecostal supporters Michael Rowe and Danny Smith, but she had not left as of an hour ago.

--Furthermore, during a telephone conversation with her family in the Embassy after her arrival in Vienna, Lidia did not mention going to Britain. Michael Rowe, who talked at that time with an Embassy officer, said he understood Lidia intended to go on to Israel. Of course, a brief visit to England would not preclude an intention to settle in Israel.

--According to our Embassy in Vienna, as of about 6 a.m. Washington time, Lidia is expected to stay 2-3 days in Vienna to rest. The Embassy describes the situation as "a bit of a circus," with lots of people in the act and lots of advice, but believes that Lidia has still not made up her mind what to do after she leaves Vienna.

--Signs of disagreement are beginning to appear among the private Pentecostal support groups over issues such as where Lidia should settle. We have heard indirectly that Jane Drake is concerned about Smith and Rowe as being "a little fanatical." Comment: We have found Smith reasonable and responsible, and have had good reports of Rowe from Olin Robison. end comment. Drake also is reported to believe that Lidia should go to Israel or the FRG. Drake has received recommendations from contacts in the U.S. Jewish community that the "Christian Embassy of Jerusalem" might help resettle Lidia in Israel. She has been in touch with the organization's director, who is looking into the matter.

--Ambassador Richard Davies (now retired) has said that he will be going to London and Vienna to see Lidia. Davies is a consultant to SAVE (Jane Drake) and the publication "Religion in Communist-Dominated Areas." He feels that Rowe and Smith, the British Pentecostal supporters, will do a good job in helping Lidia, but wants to ensure that the wishes of the American Pentecostal support groups are also taken into account.

--Olin Robison is considering returning from Moscow via Vienna on April 8 or 9 to meet with Rowe and perhaps with Lidia. Robison believes that Rowe's support could be crucial to his mission.

-- The two members of the Vashchenko family who accompanied Lidia to Moscow had a good reunion with their parents in the Embassy. Thoy have since departed the Embassy and are making arrangements to return to Chernogorsk.

-- The Washington Post this morning carries a report that Lyuba Vashchenko, the family's spokesman in the Embassy, has said that when the other members of the family in Chernogorsk receive exit permission, those in the Embassy will depart. Our Embassy in Moscow has not heard her say this, but the story does square with another indirect report we have heard of what the family's negotiating position will be.

The sentiments you express concerning the plight of Jews in the Soviet Union reflect your own deep commitment on behalf of one of the great human causes of our time. The unique courage displayed by Jews in the U.S.S.R., in face of the intensified official harassment, discrimination and often outright persecution and arbitrary imprisonment, has indeed been further strengthened by your magnificent message to the Third International Conference on Soviet Jewry which ended in Jerusalem last night.

When Ambassador Kirkpatrick read your message, in the course of her own inspiring address to the Conference, it was greeted by the more than one-thousand-five-hundred delegates with thunderous applause. I, too, in my speech at the closing session, saw fit to publicly quote certain of the highly pertinent paragraphs contained in your letter to me and, again, these were enthusiastically received.

I wish to express to you our gratitude for having delegated Ambassador Kirkpatrick to represent you and your administration at this all-important assembly. Her very presence underscored for all to see and hear the importance the United States attaches to the great cause for which the Jerusalem Conference was convened.

The work of mobilizing world public opinion must go on and I want to thank you from the heart for the significant initiatives of the United States in helping to lead this fight for justice and freedom.

- 5. (C) COMMENT: THERE APPEARS TO BE LITTLE CONTACT RETYFEN THE TWO FAMILIES OF PENTECOSTALS IN CHERNOGORSK. AS THEY WERE NOT ON GOOD TERMS IN THE EMBASSY, THEY GENERALLY AVOID ONE ANOTHER NOW. ONLY TIMOFE! OCCASIONALLY DROPS IN ON THE VASHCHENKOS. THUS, THEIR APPROACHES ARE NOT LIKELY TO BE COORDINATED. THE CHMYKHALOVS, UNLIKE THE VASHCHENKOS, HAVE NEVER PARTICULARLY APPRECIATED THE IMPORTANCE OF GOING THROUGH PROPER CHANNELS AND DOING THINGS BY THE BOOK. THEY HAVE TURNED TO THE KGB BECAUSE THEY ARE CONVINCED THAT ORGANIZATION WILL DECIDE THEIR FATE. EVEN IF THIS WERE TRUE (WE THINK THE MATTER WILL BE DECIDED ON A POLITICAL LEVEL) THE KGB PROBABLY WOULD NOT WANT IT TO LOOK THAT WAY. WE WILL TRY TO ENSURE, THEREFORE, THAT THE CHMYKHALOVS ARE INFORMED OF PROGRESS THE VASH-CHENKOS MAKE SO THAT THE LATTERS' METHODS CAN BE EMULATED. END COMMENT. HARTMAN

IF NO PENTECOSTAL SUPPORTERS ARE ABLE TO MEET THE FAMILY, YOU SHOULD BE PREPARED TO TAKE AN ACTIVE ROLE IN MEETING THE FAMILY AND FACILITATING THEIR SETTLE-MENT INTO TEMPORARY LODGINGS. WE SUGGEST YOU ATTEMPT TO GET IN TOUCH WITH OTHER MEMBERS OF THE SSSG, WITH OLIN ROBINSON, AND WITH JANE DRAKE, TO AFFORD THEM THE OPPORTUNITY TO BE ON HAND WHEN THE VASHCHENKOS ARRIVE IN THE WEST. WE URGE YOU TO CAUTION THEM, HOWEVER, ABOUT PREMATURE RELEASE OF THIS INFORMATION TO THE PRESS, AND, AS WELL, ABOUT THE CONSEQUENCES

- UPON RECEIPT STATE 174462 (REF A) EMBASSY PHONED LIDIA MORNING JUNE 23 IN NAZARETH TO RAISE THE QUESTION OF ISRAELI VYZOVS FOR THE MEMBERS OF THE CHMYKHALOV FAMILY. HER REACTION WAS FRANKLY NEGATIVE. (TO ENSURE THAT THE REQUEST AND OUR REASONS FOR IT WERE FULLY UNDER-STOOD, WE AGAIN USED OUR FLUENT RUSSIAN SPEAKING FSN TO TRANSLATE.) LIDIA WAS RELUCTANT OVER THE PHONE TO DISCUSS THE DETAILS OF HER UNWILLINGNESS TO SEND INVITATIONS FOR THE CHMYKHALOVS.
- LIDIA PLANS TO COME TO THE EMBASSY ON TUESDAY, JUNE 28, WHEN WE WILL ASSIST HER IN OBTAINING VISAS FOR THE COUNTRIES SHE INTENDS VISITING ON HER FORTHCOMING TRIP (TEL AVIV 8402). SHE STATED THAT AT THAT TIME SHE WOULD BE WILLING TO EXPLAIN HER POSITION.
