USG Posture on Pentecostals

On July 18, the second of the two Pentecostal families, the Chmykhalovs, arrived in Vienna. State has forwarded you a memorandum (Tab I) pointing out that during the coming weeks we should expect heightened press interest in the role of the U.S. Government in the families' departure from the Soviet Union and recommending that the USG continue to maintain a low profile.

Our recent efforts on the Pentecostals behalf have been based on unpublicized diplomatic contacts. We have indicated to the Soviets that we would not exploit the release of the Pentecostals for political purposes. Hence, any significant departure from this policy of downplaying the USG role would be viewed as a breach of our promise and could endanger our current efforts on behalf of Shcharansky and other prominent figures. It also would contradict the President's expressed desire to maintain a low profile on such human rights cases.

For these reasons, State believes (and I agree) that the USG should confine its remarks to expressions of satisfaction that the families have succeeded in emigrating. They suggest that we should not provide the media with details on the exchanges which led to their departure from the USSR and should deflect any requests by the families to meet with the President or other major Administration figures. At Tab II is suggested press quidance. At Tab III is a memorandum from Kimmitt to Hill concurring with State's press guidelines.

John Lenczowski, Jack Matlock and Bob Sims concur.

SUBJECT: Recommended USG Posture on the Emigration of the Embassy Pentecostals

The Chmykhalovs, the second of the two Pentecostal families who spent nearly five years in refuge in our Embassy in Moscow, arrived in Vienna July 18, and on the following day thirteen of the fifteen members of that family will continue on to St. Louis, Missouri to join supporters. Now that the Chmykhalov family is safely out of the USSR, they, the Vashchenko family, and certain of their supporters may be expected to take full advantage of the publicity they have looked forward to for weeks, months, or even years. During the days and weeks following the emigration of the last of the Embassy Pentecostals we should expect press interest in the role of the U.S. Government in the families' departure from the Soviet Union. The families themselves, who in the past have placed great faith in the value of press play, may encourage such attention. Indeed, the Vashchenkos have on previous occasions expressed a desire to meet with the President to thank him personally for his efforts on their behalf. Even if such a meeting does not occur, questions regarding who said what to whom and at what level are bound to arise.

The Department of State recommends that the USG continue to maintain a low profile regarding its role in the Vashchenkos' and Chmykhalovs' emigration. Our recent efforts on the Pentecostals' behalf have been based on unpublicized diplomatic contacts. We have indicated to the Soviets that we would not exploit the release of the Pentecostals for political purposes, and our posture has obtained Soviet cooperation.

Any significant departure from this policy of downplaying the USG role would be viewed by the Soviets as a violation of our pledge to them, and could seriously endanger our efforts on behalf of Shcharanskiy and other prominent figures. For that reason the Department believes that the USG should confine its public remarks on the Vashchenkos and Chmykhalovs to expressions of satisfaction that the families have succeeded in emigrating. We should not provide the media with details on the exchanges which led to the Pentecostals' departure from the USSR, and should deflect any requests by the families to meet with the President, the Secretary of State, or other major Administration figures. The attached press guidance conforms to that course of action.

### Emigration of the Chmykhalov Family from the USSR

- Q. Do you have any comment on the emigration of the Chmykhalov family from the USSR?
- A. Yes. We are very pleased that the family has achieved its long-sought goal of emigration. As you know, with the emigration of this family and the Vashchenko family, which departed the Soviet Union approximately three weeks earlier, the last of the Pentecostals who were in refuge in our Embassy in Moscow has left the USSR. Many individuals, both within the United States Government and outside it, worked for many years so that the families might obtain exit permission. I am sure I speak for all those supporters when I wish the families every success as they begin their new lives in the West.
- Q. Where will the Chmykhalovs [or Vashchenkos] ultimately settle?
- A. You will have to ask them that question.
- Q. Could they settle in the U.S.?
- A. That would be determined by the appropriate USG agencies upon review of the families' applications.

- Q. What can you tell us about rumors that the Embassy Pentecostals were granted permission to emigrate largely as a result of the President's request to Soviet Ambassador Dobrynin on their behalf?
- A. The Soviets have been well aware throughout of the strong interest and concern of many Americans and of the U.S.

  Government, from the President on down, in this case. But I will not be commenting on or describing our diplomatic communications with the Soviets on this or other similar cases. We have made a practice of not commenting publicly on those efforts, and without leading you one way or another on any specific cases, will not do so now.

Thank you for your letter urging the President to meet with the Vashchenko and Chymkhalov families.

Many representatives of the U.S. Government from the President on down have long taken an active interest in the situation of the Embassy Pentecostals and were gratified by the successful emigration of the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families to the West. However, given the fact that we are presently in the midst of seeking to resolve, through unpublicized diplomatic channels, several difficult human rights cases (involving other Pentecostals), we do not believe that a meeting between the President and either or both of those families would be appropriate at this time.

Many representatives of the U.S. Government from the President on down have long taken an active interest in the situation of the Embassy Pentecostals, and were gratified by the successful emigration of the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families to the West. Nevertheless, despite this long-standing interest, we do not believe that a meeting between the President and either or both of those families would be appropriate at this time. The U.S. Government continues to work on behalf of those whose human rights are abused in the USSR, and it is their position that several prominent cases should, like the case of the Embassy Pentecostals, be resolved by the emigration of the persons concerned. A meeting between the President and the families would likely be perceived as an attempt to exploit the Embassy Pentecostals for political advantage, and would therefore be counterproductive to our efforts on other specific human rights cases.

REF A REQUESTED EMBASSY ISLAMABAD'S VIEWS ON CONSE-QUENCES OF ALLOWING SOVIET PRISONER OF WAR VASHCHENKO · INTO THE U.S. THEY ARE AS FOLLOWS: THE GOP WOULD PROBABLY WELCOME U.S. DECISION TO ALLOW VASHCHENKO TO ENTER THE UNITED STATES. AS DEPARTMENT IS AWARE. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF SOVIET SOLDIERS ON PAKISTANI SOIL AND GOP IS AT A LOSS ABOUT WHAT TO DO WITH THEM. AS MFA DIRECTOR GENERAL FOR AFGHANISTAN TOLD EMBASSY OFFICER, THE GOP FEARS THE MUJAHIDEEN WILL KILL THE PRISONERS, IF THEY ARE NOT TAKEN OFF THE MUJAHIDEEN HANDS, OR THAT THE SOVIETS WILL BECOME AWARE OF SPECIFIC CASES AND ASK- FOR GOP TO RETURN THE SOVIETS TO THE SOVIET UNION-A REQUEST THE GOP ULTIMATELY FEELS IT WOULD HAVE TO HONDR. THE GOP WOULD LIKELY VIEW THE U.S. DECISION AS A PRECEDENT AND PRESS THE U.S. TO TAKE AT LEAST SOME OF THE OTHERS.
- 3. THE GOP HOWEVER, WOULD HAVE TWO CONCERNS WHICH SHOULD BE BORNE IN MIND. FIRST, IF THERE WERE EXTENSIVE PUBLICITY ABOUT VASCHENKO, THIS WOULD JEOPARDIZE PROSPECTS FOR RENEWING THE ICRC-SOVIET-MUJAHIDEEN AGREEMENT TO INTERN SOVIET PRISONERS IN SWITZERLAND. SINCE THE SOVIETS PROBABLY WOULD BE RELUCTANT TO AGREE TO A PROCEDURE WHICH COULD RESULT AGAIN IN OTHER PRISONERS ENDING UP IN THE UNITED STATES. SECOND, THE U.S. DECISION WOULD ATTRACT WIDESPREAD PUBLIC ATTENTION TO THE PRESENCE OF SOVIET SOLDIERS ON PAKISTAN'S TERRITORY. THIS ATTENTION COULD BECOME PARTICULARLY AWKWARD FOR THE GOP, IF PRISONERS WERE ALLOWED DIRECTLY INTO THE U.S. FROM PAKISTAN AND IT WOULD PROBABLY LEAD TO DIPLOMATIC REPRESENTATIONS FOR RETURN OF THE PRISONERS TO THE USSR.
- SOVIET PRISONERS IN PAKISTAN WILL BE A CONTINUING PROBLEM AND VASHCHENKO CASE WILL HAVE CONSEQUENCES FOR ALL OTHERS. BEFORE REACHING ANY FINAL DECISION ON VASHCHENKO, ASSUMING HE IS NOT RETURNED TO SWITZERLAND IN THE INTERIM WE SUGGEST THAT DEPARTMENT CONSULT WITH U.S. ALLIES ABOUT POSSIBILITY OF DISTRIBUTING OTHER PRISONERS AMONG A NUMBER OF COUNTRIES, RATHER THAN RISKING PRESSURE FROM THE GOP FOR THE U.S. TO TAKE ALL SOVIET PRISONERS. AT A MINIMUM, WE WOULD SUGGEST BRITISH, FRENCH AND WEST

GERMANS. WE COULD THEN APPROACH GOP WITH A CONSIDERED APPROACH FOR DEALING WITH THE PROBLEM AND CRITERIA FOR ACCEPTING THE SOVIETS. AT THE SAME TIME, WE SHOULD NOT UNDERCUT PROSPECTS FOR A RENEWED ICRC-SOVIET-MUJAHIDEEN AGREEMENT. WE SHOULD MAKE THIS CLEAR TO GOP. ICRC AND AS FEASIBLE TO MUJAHIDEEN REPRESENTATIVES.

- 2. DCM AND POLOFF MET ON SEPT 29, 1983 WITH AMBASSADOR BRUNNER, MFA DIRECTOR FOR INTERNATIONAL CRGANIZATIONS TO DISCUSS THE VASHCHENKO CASE. BRUNNER STATED THAT THE U.S. GOVERNMENT COULD DO "WHATEVER 1] WISHES" WITH VASHCHENKO, "BUT PLEASE DO NOT ASK "IS FOR OUR VIEWS, OR TO DO ANYTHING." BRUNNER WENT ON TO SAY THAT THE GOS IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR VASHCHENKO S.NCE HE IS NO LONGER IN SWITZERLAND. THEREFORE, WHETHER HE GOES TO THE U.S., OR EVEN SOME OTHER COUNTRY, IS OF NO OFFICIAL CONCERN TO THE GOS. AT PRESENT, THE RESPONSIBILITY FOR VASHCHENKO RESTS WITH THE FRG HE SAID.
- 3. BRUNNER ADDED THAT ON SEPT 29 VASHCHENKO HAD APPEALED THE FRG DENIAL OF HIS REQUEST FOR REFUGEE STATUS. HE NOTED THAT IT WOULD TAKE WEEKS BEFORE THE APPEAL PROCESS WOULD BE EXHAUSTED.
- 4. BRUNNER SAID THAT THE GOS HAD CONTACTED THE ICRC ABOUT THE U.S. INTEREST. HE SAID HE UNDERSTOOD THE ICRC ALSO DID NOT WANT TO BECOME INVOLVED IN ANY WAY, NOR EVEN TO BE KEPT INFORMED ABOUT WHAT THE U.S. DID OR DID NOT PLAN TO DO, AND HE STRONGLY IMPLIED THAT THE GOS DOES NOT WANT TO BE KEPT INFORMED ABOUT ANY FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS. HE ADDED THAT, IF QUERIED BY THE SOVIETS, THE GOS WOULD SAY THAT IT DOES NOT KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT U.S. INTERESTS IN THIS CASE.
- 5. IN RESPONSE TO A QUESTION BY THE DCM AS TO THE POSSIBILITIES OF MORE SOVIET PRISONERS ARRIVING IN SMITZERLAND IN THE FUTURE, BRUNNER SAID THAT THE AFGHAN FREEDOM FIGHTERS HAD DECIDED NOT TO SEND ANY MORE PRISONERS TO SWITZERLAND UNTIL SUCH TIME AS THE ICRC WAS ALLOWED TO RETURN TO KABUL, AND TO OPERATE THERE. BRUNNER ADDED THAT THE AFGHANS HOLD AT LEAST 48 SOVIET PRISONERS AT PRESENT. HE SUGGESTED THAT PERHAPS THE U.S. SHOULD MAKE DIRECT CONTACT WITH THE AFGHAN FREEDOM FIGHTERS TO DISCUSS THE SITUATION OF THESE PRISONERS.
- 6. IN RESPONSE TO OUR PROBING, BRUNNER DESCRIBED VASHCHENKO AS THE ONLY ONE AMONG THE EIGHT SOVIET PRISONERS IN SWITZERLAND WHO HAD DEMONSTRATED INTELLECTUAL CURIOSITY. HE SALD THAT VASHCHENKO, AT THE BEGINNING OF

HIS STAY HAD ALSO BEEN THE ONLY ONE WITH STRONG COMMUNIST FEELINGS. WHICH HE EXPRESSED BY IMMEDIATELY CRITICIZING THE WESTERN WAY OF LIFE. ACCORDING TO BRUNNER, HOWEVER, VASHCHENKO EEGAN TO RAPIDLY CHANGE HIS VIEWS DURING A STAY IN A SWISS HOSPITAL WHILE RECOVERING FROM FROSTBITE TO HIS FEET). ERUNNER SAID THAT VASHCHENKO HAD BEEN WILLING TO "THINK THINGS OUT FOR HIMSELF", HAD BEEN IN-TERESTED IN BOOKS, AND IN FURTHERING HIS EDUCATION AS AN ELECTRICIAN. BRUNNER SAID VASHCHENKO STOOD OUT AMONG THE EIGHT PRISONERS DUE TO HIS INTEREST IN IMPROVING HIMSELF. THE REMAINING SEVEN SOVIET PRISONERS HAD DNLY BEEN INTERESTED IN GETTING BLUEJEANS, AND BUYING RADIO-CASSETTES. THEY HAD THE SAME INTERESTS AS MOST YOUNG PEOPLE EVERYWHERE, BRUNNER NOTED, WITH NO IDEOLOGICAL COMMITMENT. When the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families departed the Soviet Union this summer, the Department of State recommended, and the National Security Council agreed, that the USG would not publicize its role in the emigration of those families (Tab B). This policy has been maintained since the Pentecostal families arrived in the U.S., and as one result there have been no meetings between the families and major USG officials. Recently, however, Senator Lugar has proposed that the President receive the Embassy Pentecostals, a meeting that would probably receive sizable press attention.

The Department of State recommends that the USG continue its low profile policy. Our efforts on the Pentecostals' behalf were based on confidential diplomatic exchanges, in which we indicated to the Soviets that we would not exploit the release of the Pentecostals for political purposes. Any significant departure from this policy, such as a Presidential meeting with the Pentecostals, would be viewed by the Soviets as a violation of our pledge to them, and could jeopardize future USG efforts on behalf of other Soviet dissidents and refuseniks. We would therefore recommend against the suggested meeting between the Pentecostals and the President.

The attached proposed response to Senator Lugar (Tab A) expresses our satisfaction that the Embassy Pentecostals were allowed to emigrate. However, it notes the need to continue to work on behalf of others still in the Soviet Union, and the importance of quiet diplomacy in those efforts. For that reason, the letter concludes, a meeting between the Embassy Pentecostals and the President would not be appropriate at this time.



Dear Senator Lugar:

Thank you for your recent letter proposing that the President meet with the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families.

Many representatives of the United States Government, from the President on down, have long taken an active interest in the situation of the Embassy Pentecostals, and were gratified by their successful emigration to the West. However, our ongoing efforts, through unpublicized diplomatic channels, on behalf of other difficult human rights cases require that we handle with great discretion our contacts with persons whom the Soviets have permitted to emigrate. For this reason, we do not believe that a meeting between the President and representatives of the Embassy Pentecostal families would be appropriate at this time.

Thank you for sharing your views on this subject. Please be assured that we will keep the question of meetings with the Vashchenko and Chmykhalov families under consideration.

S/S-S:DIR On July 28 the Vashchenko family received the Israeli Ministry of the Interior's official refusal of their request for resettlement in Israel, and the fourteen members of the family remaining in that country (Liuba and Nadia Vashchenko are already in the U.S.) will travel to the United States Friday, July 29. They will be accompanied by supporter Ray Barnett, who has escorted most of the Embassy Pentecostals on their travels, and will proceed directly to Seattle, where Barnett's organization, "Friends in the West", is headquartered. We do not currently have information regarding the Vashchenkos' long-term plans, particularly regarding which offers of assistance from supporters they may accept. probable, however, that the family will settle in the U.S., inasmuch as Israel has now been formally ruled out as an option, and Britain, the only other country in which sustained, large-scale public support for the Pentecostals has been seen, has previously indicated a reluctance to provide the families with documents entitling them to permanent residency. With the arrival of the Vashchenkos tomorrow, the last of the Embassy Pentecostals will have landed in the United States.

> As recommended in the Department of State's recent memorandum (Tab A), and confirmed by the National Security Council (Tab B), we intend to maintain a low profile regarding the emigration of the Embassy Pentecostals, and will deflect any requests by them to meet with the President, the Secretary of State, or other high Administration officials.

SUBJECT: Recommended USG Posture on the Emigration of the Embassy Pentecostals

The Chmykhalovs, the second of the two Pentecostal families who spent nearly five years in refuge in our Embassy in Moscow, arrived in Vienna July 18, and on the following day thirteen of the fifteen members of that family will continue on to St. Louis, Missouri to join supporters. Now that the Chmykhalov family is safely out of the USSR, they, the Vashchenko family, and certain of their supporters may be expected to take full advantage of the publicity they have looked forward to for weeks, months, or even years. During the days and weeks following the emigration of the last of the Embassy Pentecostals we should expect press interest in the role of the U.S. Government in the families' departure from the Soviet Union. The families themselves, who in the past have placed great faith in the value of press play, may encourage such attention. Indeed, the Vashchenkos have on previous occasions expressed a desire to meet with the President to thank him personally for his efforts on their behalf. Even if such a meeting does not occur, questions regarding who said what to whom and at what level are bound to arise.

The Department of State recommends that the USG continue to maintain a low profile regarding its role in the Vashchenkos' and Chmykhalovs' emigration. Our recent efforts on the Pentecostals' behalf have been based on unpublicized diplomatic contacts. We have indicated to the Soviets that we would not exploit the release of the Pentecostals for political purposes, and our posture has obtained Soviet cooperation.

Any significant departure from this policy of downplaying the USG role would be viewed by the Soviets as a violation of our pledge to them, and could seriously endanger our efforts on behalf of Shcharanskiy and other prominent figures. For that reason the Department believes that the USG should confine its public remarks on the Vashchenkos and Chmykhalovs to expressions of satisfaction that the families have succeeded in emigrating. We should not provide the media with details on the exchanges which led to the Pentecostals' departure from the USSR, and should deflect any requests by the families to meet with the President, the Secretary of State, or other major Administration figures. The attached press guidance conforms to that course of action.

### Emigration of the Chmykhalov Family from the USSR

- Q. Do you have any comment on the emigration of the Chmykhalov family from the USSR?
- A. Yes. We are very pleased that the family has achieved its long-sought goal of emigration. As you know, with the emigration of this family and the Vashchenko family, which departed the Soviet Union approximately three weeks earlier, the last of the Pentecostals who were in refuge in our Embassy in Moscow has left the USSR. Many individuals, both within the United States Government and outside it, worked for many years so that the families might obtain exit permission. I am sure I speak for all those supporters when I wish the families every success as they begin their new lives in the West.
- Q. Where will the Chmykhalovs [or Vashchenkos] ultimately settle?
- A. You will have to ask them that question.
- Q. Could they settle in the U.S.?
- A. That would be determined by the appropriate USG agencies upon review of the families applications.

- Q. What can you tell us about rumors that the Embassy Pentecostals were granted permission to emigrate largely as a result of the President's request to Soviet Ambassador Dobrynin on their behalf?
- A. The Soviets have been well aware throughout of the strong interest and concern of many Americans and of the U.S.

  Government, from the President on down, in this case. But I will not be commenting on or describing our diplomatic communications with the Soviets on this or other similar cases. We have made a practice of not commenting publicly on those efforts, and without leading you one way or another on any specific cases, will not do so now.
