We have drawn up the agenda for the PRG to reflect overall U.S. interest in a South Asia which is stable and resistant to Soviet inroads via Afghanistan. Our non-proliferation policy has been a key element of our Indo-Pak strategy, although Congress focuses only on Pakistan.

There are a number of pending actions related to the Pak nuclear program: Senator Glenn's letter to the President (a draft reply which we are coordinating is at TAB A); the Adelman memo to Frank (TAB B); the Solarz subcommittee markup on the post '87 Pak program (TAB C); and Pak arms supply cases awaiting notification to Congress.

There are also some differing views within the Administration. Our objective should be to clarify all key issues and points of view and identify any differences which will ultimately require higher-level decisions.

The President's response to Glenn will be important in our strategy on the Pak program. A read-out from Howard Baker of his conversation with Glenn would be useful before the PRG since we will also need to tailor the President's letter somewhat to the Baker-Glenn conversation. You may want to circulate the draft letter to PRG members.

The Solarz sub-committee markup of the Pak assistance request has some problems but is nowhere as dire as the Adelman memo suggests. There may or may not be greater difficulties in the Senate (we do not yet know how much support Glenn has), but we recognize that this is indeed a crucial time for the Pak nuclear program and for the nuclear arms race between India and Pakistan.

Our Afghanistan policy is also at an important juncture: the Soviets are beginning to think about a political solution although have clearly not made the necessary hard choices yet so more pressure is needed; pressure, military and political, on Pakistan is growing so that Pakistan's need for the U.S. is greater today and cutting off U.S. assistance could cause a negative political reaction resulting in at least a partial collapse of the GOP Afghan policy.

With the above in mind, a number of key issues for the PRG are:

- 5. The subcommittee supports the Administration's request regarding funding levels for Pakistan, but it recommends the following policy provisions concerning assistance to Pakistan:
- a) an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act that Section 669 of that Act be waived with respect to Pakistan until September 30, 1989 (the Administration had requested a waiver until September 30, 1993).
- b) an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act that any waiver of Section 669 of that Act will cease to be effective if the President certifies to Congress that India has formally accepted the application of appropriate, verifiable, and reliable safeguards to all of its nuclear facilities, equipment, and materials.
- c) an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act that Pakistan's formal acceptance of the application of appropriate, verifiable, and reliable safeguards to all of its nuclear facilities, equipment, and materials shall constitute the reliable assurances necessary to justify a presidential waiver of the prohibition on assistance as permitted by Section 669(b)(1)(B) of that Act.
- d) a provision that the United States may not sell an AEW system to Pakistan unless the President certifies that there exists no cost-effective alternative to the system proposed, and that the

proposed AEW system in conjunction with Pakistani combat aircraft will provide Pakistan with an effective air defense vis-a-vis Afghanistan.

- e) an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act which reaffirms the defensive purpose of U.S. arms transfers to Pakistan, prohibits the sale of defense articles to Pakistan which are unsuitable for Pakistan's defense against the threat posed by the Soviet presence in Afghanistan, and which requires that US equipment be deployed on or in the vicinity of the Afghan border unless it is logistically important to do so.
- f) an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act requiring that before assistance can be provided to Pakistan, the President must certify that the government of Pakistan intends to hold free, fair, and party-based elections before May 1, 1990, has made significant progress in eliminating violations of human rights, and has made significant progress in promoting political freedom.
- g) a provision specifying those factors which the President shall take into account in making a determination with respect to Pakistan pursuant to section 481(h) of the Foreign Assistance Act regarding cooperation in narcotics control.
- 6. The subcommittee supports the administration's request to amend section 514(b)(2) of the Foreign Assistance Act to authorize a stockpile of defense articles for Thailand.
