SUBJECT: Lease of Three Excess US Navy Ships to Allied Governments

Issue

Need for Presidential certification that there are compelling national security reasons for providing excess US Navy ships by lease rather than by direct sale to Allied governments.

Facts

Department of the Navy intends to lease, at no cost, one Korean war-vintage destroyer to Turkey and two gasoline tankers dating from World War II to the Republic of Korea. To minimize US Navy operating costs and allow for the planned 21 February transfers to take place, Presidential certification of the appropriateness of leasing these ships must take place as soon as possible.

Discussion

Poor economic conditions in Turkey and the need, nonetheless, to bolster collaboration in NATO's southern flank argue strongly for this lease. By leasing instead of selling the two tankers to Korea, the US Navy retains the ability to recall these ships in time of emergency; for this reason a lease arrangement is in the US interest.

SUBJECT: Lease of USS ROBERT A. OWENS (DD 827) to the Government of Turkey; Leases of USNS RINCON (TAOG 77) and USNS PETALUMA (TAOG 79) to the Republic of Korea

The Department of the Navy proposes to lease three ships to foreign governments: USS ROBERT A. OWENS (DD 827) to the Government of Turkey, USNS RINCON (TAOG 77) and USNS PETALUMA (TAOG 79) to the Republic of Korea. In order to minimize the cost to the Navy of maintaining and operating the ships prior to their transfer, the Navy proposes to transfer the two ships to Korea on 21 February 1982 and the ship to Turkey on 22 February 1982. Notice to the Armed Services Committees required by 10 U.S.C. 7307(b) was provided on 19 August 1980 in the case of USS ROBERT A. OWENS and on 1 April 1981 in the case of USNS RINCON and USNS PETALUMA. Notice to Congress required by Section 62 of the Arms Export Control Act was provided on 21 January 1982. No exception has been taken to any of these leases.

Section 61 requires the President to determine:

- that there are compelling foreign policy and national security reasons for providing such articles on a lease basis rather than on a sales basis; and
- . the articles are not for the time needed for public use.

The tankers being leased to the Republic of Korea are the subject of contingency planning for naval forces in the Pacific and must be subject to recall by the Navy in the event of an emergency. The destroyer for Turkey is necessary to protect the Southern Region of NATO; economic conditions in Turkey necessitate a lease rather than a sale. None of these three ships will be needed for public use for the duration of the lease.

Based on the foregoing, I recommend that you sign the attached determinations.

SUBJECT : Lease of Three Excess US Navy Ships to Foreign Governments

The US Navy proposes to lease three ships, all dating from the '40s, to Allied governments. One destroyer will be leased to Turkey and two gasoline tankers to the Republic of Korea. In the case of the transfer to Turkey, leasing is preferred to a sale because of poor Turkish economic conditions and the need to bolster NATO collaboration. In the case of tankers being transferred to Korea, leasing allows the vessels to still be subject to USN contingency needs in the Pacific.

The Arms Export Control Act mandates that the President determine that there are compelling national security reasons for ships to be transferred on a lease basis rather than by sale. It is of extreme importance that the President sign the attached certifications as guickly as possible in order to ensure USN operating expenses are minimized and that the 21 February 1982 transfer date remains firm, for it cannot be extended.

 THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SECURITY CONSULTATIVE MEETING BETWEEN THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA WAS HELD IN SEOUL ON MARCH 3Ø AND 31, 1982.

- MINISTER OF NATIONAL DEFENSE CHOO YOUNG BOCK AND SECRETARY OF DEFENSE CASPAR W. WEINBERGER LED THEIR RESPECTIVE DELEGATIONS, WHICH INCLUDED SENIOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND DEFENSE OFFICIALS OF BOTH COUNTRIES. PRIOR TO THE MEETING, THE CHAIRMAN OF THE JOINT CHIEFS OF STAFF OF THE TWO COUNTRIES PRESIDED OVER THE ROK-U.S. MILITARY COMMITTEE MEETING ON MARCH 29, 1982.

- SECRETARY WEINBERGER, DURING HIS STAY IN KOREA, PAID A COURTESY CALL ON PRESIDENT CHUN DOO HWAN. THE SECRETARY VISITED MAJOR MILITARY BASES AND OBSERVED THE ROK/U.S. JOINT MILITARY EXERCISE, "TEAM SPIRIT '82."

- 2. ON THE CENTENNIAL OF KOREA-UNITED STATES RELATIONS, THE TWO DELEGATIONS, NOTING WITH SATISFACTION THAT THE TRADITIONAL TIES OF SECURITY COOPERATION HAVE BEEN STEADILY PROMOTED BETWEEN THE TWO COUNTRIES, PLEDGED TO DEVELOP FURTHER SUCH COOPERATIVE RELATIONS IN THE INTERESTS OF THE PEACE AND STABILITY OF NORTHEAST ASIA AND THE PACIFIC REGION.

- 3. REVIEWING THE SECURITY SITUATION IN ASIA AND THE PACIFIC AREA WITH SPECIAL REFERENCE TO THE KOREAN PENIN-SULA, THE TWO DELEGATIONS AGREED IN THEIR APPRAISAL OF THE THREAT TO SECURITY IN THE REGION. THE DISCUSSION INCLUDED THE POSSIBLE IMPACT OF THE REGIONAL SITUATION ON THE SECURITY INTERESTS OF BOTH THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA AND THE UNITED STATES.

- IN PARTICULAR, MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER SHARED THE VIEW THAT THE CONTINUING MILITARY BUILD-UP OF NORTH KOREA AND ITS AGGRESSIVE POSTURE POSED A MAJOR THREAT TO THE SECURITY OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA AS WELL AS TO PEACE AND STABILITY IN THE REGION. IN THIS CONNECTION, THEY HAD FULL DELIBERATIONS ON COMBINED ROK/U.S. MEASURES TO DEAL EFFECTIVELY WITH THE NORTH KOREAN THREAT.

- 4. THE TWO SIDES REAFFIRMED THAT THE SECURITY OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA IS PIVOTAL TO THE PEACE AND STABILITY OF NORTHEAST ASIA AND, IN TURN, VITAL TO THE SECURITY OF THE UNITED STATES.

- SECRETARY WEINBERGER, REAFFIRMING THAT THE UNITED STATES WILL REMAIN A PACIFIC POWER, REITERATED THE FIRM COMMITMENT OF THE UNITED STATES TO RENDER PROMPT AND EFFECTIVE ASSISTANCE TO REPEL ARMED INVASION AGAINST THE ... REPUBLIC OF KOREA--WHICH CONSTITUTES A COMMON DANGER--IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE KOREA-UNITED STATES MUTUAL DEFENSE TREATY OF 1954. HE ALSO CONFIRMED THAT THE UNITED STATES' NUCLEAR UMBRELLA WILL CONTINUE TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL SECURITY TO THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA.

- MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER AGREED THAT THE REINFORCED U.S. FORCES IN KOREA NOT ONLY ATTEST TO THE UNITED STATES' FIRM RESOLVE TO HELP DEFEND KOREA, BUT RENDER A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION TO THE PEACE AND STABILITY OF NORTHEAST ASIA.

- 6. MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER REVIEWED THE PROGRESS OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA'S FORCE IMPROVEMENT PLAN AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE KOREAN DEFENSE INDUSTRY. MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER, NOTING WITH SATIS-FACTION THE ROK/U.S. COOPERATION TO DATE IN THIS AREA, HAD CLOSE CONSULTATIONS ON CONCRETE STEPS TO WIDEN THE SCOPE OF SUCH COOPERATION.

- SECRETARY WEINBERGER ASSURED MINISTER CHOO THAT, SUBJECT TO CONSULTATIONS WITH AND THE APPROVAL OF THE CONGRESS AND OTHER APPROPRIATE AGENCIES, THE UNITED STATES WOULD CONTINUE TO SEEK TO IMPROVE THE TERMS FOR THE PROVI-SION OF FMS CREDITS TO THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA.

- MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER AGREED TO FURTHER STEP UP MUTUAL COOPERATION FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF KOREAN DEFENSE INDUSTRY INCLUDING THE USE OF KOREAN FACILITIES FOR THE MAINTENANCE OF UNITED STATES DEFENSE EQUIPMENT.

- 7. MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER AGREED TO UPDATE AND CONTINUE TO DEVELOP THE CURRENT WARTIME RESUPPLY REQUIREMENTS STUDY AND JOINTLY TO AUGMENT STOCK-PILES OF WAR RESERVE MATERIEL WITH A VIEW TO ENHANCING COMBAT READINESS IN THE EVENT OF A CONTINGENCY ON THE KOREAN PENINSULA. TO THIS END, THEY SIGNED AN AGREEMENT COVERING THE EXPEDITIOUS TRANSFER OF WAR MATERIEL TO THE KOREAN GOVERNMENT IN THE EVENT OF EMERGENCY.

- 8. MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER SHARED THE VIEW THAT IT IS ESSENTIAL FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF LASTING

PEACE ON THE KOREAN PENINSULA TO EASE TENSIONS AND CREATE AN ATMOSPHERE FOR NATIONAL RECONCILIATION THROUGH DIALOGUE BETWEEN THE SOUTH AND THE NORTH OF KOREA.

 PARTICULARLY, SECRETARY WEINBERGER EXPRESSED HIS FULL SUPPORT FOR THE FAR-REACHING 'PROPOSAL FOR DEMOCRATIC REUNIFICATION THROUGH NATIONAL RECONCILIATION' PUT FORWARD BY PRESIDENT CHUN DOO HWAN ON JANUARY 22, 1982.
 9. BOTH SIDES RECONFIRMED THAT THE EFFECTIVE FUNCTIONING OF THE UNITED NATIONS COMMAND AS A PEACE KEEPING MECHANISM HOLDS CONTINUING IMPORTANCE UNTIL ALTER-NATIVE ARRANGEMENTS CAN BE AGREED UPON TO ENSURE LASTING PEACE ON THE KOREAN PENINSULA.

 MINISTER CHOO AND SECRETARY WEINBERGER SUPPORTED THE UNITED NATIONS COMMAND'S PROPOSAL THAT EACH SIDE OF THE MILITARY ARMISTICE COMMISSION INVITE THE OTHER TO OBSERVE MAJOR MILITARY EXERCISES ON THE KOREAN PENINSULA.

- BOTH SIDES RECONFIRMED THE IMPORTANCE OF THE ANNUAL SECURITY CONSULTATIVE MEETING AND AGREED TO HOLD THE NEXT MEETING IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA IN 1983.

- 11. SECRETARY WEINBERGER EXPRESSED THE SINCERE APPRECIATION OF THE U.S. DELEGATION FOR THE COURTESY AND HOSPITALITY OF THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF KOREA AND FOR THE EXCELLENT ARRANGEMENTS WHICH LED TO A PRODUCTIVE AND SUCCESSFUL MEETING.
