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

DECLARATION ON INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM

- 1. The Heads of State and Government discussed the problem of international terrorism.
- 2. They noted that hijacking and kidnapping had declined since the Declarations of Bonn (1978), Venice (1980) and Ottawa (1981) as a result of improved security measures, but that terrorism had developed other techniques, sometimes in association with traffic in drugs.
- 3. They expressed their resolve to combat this threat by every possible means, strengthening existing measures and developing effective new ones.
- 4. They were disturbed to note the ease with which terrorists move across international boundaries, and gain access to weapons, explosives, training and finance.
- 5. They viewed with serious concern the increasing involvement of states and governments in acts of terrorism, including the abuse of diplomatic immunity. They acknowledged the inviolability of diplomatic missions and other requirements of international law: but they emphasised the obligations which that law also entails.
- 6. Proposals which found support in the discussion included the following:
- closer co-operation and co-ordination between police and security organisations and other relevant authorities, especially in the exchange of information, intelligence and technical knowledge;
- scrutiny by each country of gaps in its national legislation which might be exploited by terrorists;

- use of the powers of the receiving state under the Vienna Convention in such matters as the size of diplomatic missions, and the number of buildings enjoying diplomatic immunity;
- action by each country to review the sale of weapons to states supporting terrorism;
- consultation and as far as possible cooperation over the expulsion or exclusion from their countries of known terrorists, including persons of diplomatic status involved in terrorism.
- 7. The Heads of State and Government recognised that this is a problem which affects all civilised states. They resolved to promote action through competent international organisations and among the international community as a whole to prevent and punish terrorist acts.

Second Round of U.S.-UK Talks on Terrorism

Terry Arnold (State/MCT) and North met with Andrew Green, Counsellor of the British Embassy, last week to discuss the agenda for our next meeting July 24. At the opening of the meeting Green provided the documents at Tab A. We discussed these at length and agreed, in principle, on a four item agenda focusing on the issues indicated at Tab I. We committed to provide to him, by Monday, July 9, your agreement on the agenda and timing for the meeting.

Regarding the timing, the British delegation shown at Tab B will not arrive until late on Monday, July 23. They depart late in the evening of July 24. Given the length of the agenda, the three of us have proposed a scheduling modification as follows:

11:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m. - Initial Discussions, WHSR 12:30 p.m.- 2:00 p.m. - Working Lunch at Maison Blanche

2:00 p.m.- 4:00 p.m. - Follow-up Discussions, WHSR

If you concur with the new timing and the agenda at Tab I, we will informally advise Andrew Green so that he may pass this information to the party in London.

(a) Status of Diplomats

The notification of any person as a member of a diplomatic mission should be rigorously examined in the case of states known to be promoting or encouraging terrorism. In addition to the refusal of visas or use of PNG procedures for known terrorists, the use of PNG procedures as an exemplary measure against a mission should be carefully considered where misconduct cannot be attributed with certainty to an individual diplomat;

- (b) Size of Mission
- If necessary a ceiling can be set: a replacement should not automatically be allowed for anyone expelled for abuse of immunity:
- (c) Break in relations
 In certain grave cases this may have to be applied;
- (d) Buildings

We shall be scrutinising more closely the activities carried on in buildings for which diplomatic immunity is claimed where we suspect these are not legitimate diplomatic activities;

(e) Refusal to act under duress

Some states have used the threat of reprisals against foreign

nationals to seek concessions from members of the ten who hold

terrorists under arrest or in prison terms following trial, conviction

and sentence. We believe that in general no concessions should be

made to those who practice terrorism.

AREAS WHERE A COMMON APPROACH MIGHT BE SOUGHT:

- (a) Diplomatic Pressure
 Joint demarches, collective break in relations, refusal to admit diplomats expelled from another country for terrorist activities, down grading of political contacts and state to state relations with offending states.
- (b) Economic pressures
 Sanctions are unlikely to work but national reviews of defence
 sales contracts for arms widely used by terrorist groups should be

Talking Points for US/UK Second Round of Talks

regarding Terrorism

Tomorrow you are scheduled to chair a meeting with our British counterparts for a second round of discussions on combatting/countering terrorism. As before, you will chair the U.S. side, which will consist of North and Sayre. Attending from the British side will be:

- Mr. Goodall, Deputy Under Secretary of State, Foreign and Commonwealth Office (defense and intelligence)
- Mr. Hannay, Deputy Chief of Mission, British Embassy
- Mr. O'Neill, Assistant Under Secretary of State,
 Foreign and Commonwealth Office
 (terrorism)
- Mr. John de Fonblanque, Cabinet Office (Chairman for terrorism)
- Mr. Green, Counselor, British Embassy

The agenda at Tab A has been provided to the British Embassy per your earlier agreement. They have provided for our review the papers at Tabs B and C. The documents at Tab B define their perspective on the threat to the UK from:

- Iranian-sponsored terrorism,
- Iraqi-sponsored terrorism, and
- Palestinian-sponsored terrorism.

The document at Tab C is a British assessment of the opposition movement within Libya. This evaluation results directly from our earlier discussion of the issue and reflects views that are generally in concert with our own.

The addition of Mr. de Fonblanque to our group is an indication that the British very much wish to continue the dialogue at the current level (White House-NSC/Cabinet Office). Amb Sayre agrees with this approach, reflecting an awareness that there are many competing interests at stake within the State Department and the Foreign Office. He notes, however, that, if we are to have a third round of discussions, we should probably include Ron Spiers as a participant.

We have not prepared talking points on the British papers. We have, however, proffered some thoughts on the agenda items for your use during the meeting. These are attached at Tab I. The talking points are arranged so that they parallel the items on the agenda which require U.S. input. Reference is made in your talking points to the London Declaration at Tab D. Please note that in Item IV of the agenda and your talking points we deal with improved efforts on R&D. We propose that you provide them with a copy of the paper at Tab E, which was submitted to the TIWG. We have stamped it draft and removed the control numbers so that it can be passed to the British.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That you use the talking points at Tab I and review the agenda (Tab A), British documents at Tabs B and C, the London Declaration on Terrorism at Tab D.
