


#### TERRORIST INCIDENTS AGAINST AMCITS/AMERICAN PROPERTY





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BC-HIJACK-EUROPE

EUROPEAN MINISTERS DISCUSS TERRORISM, AVOID TWA HIJACK CASE ROME, JUNE 21, REUTER - <u>EUROPEAN COMMUNITY JUSTICE AND INTERIOR MINISTERS CALLED TODAY FOR BETTER COOPERATION TO COMBAT TERRORISM, BUT AVOIDED DISCUSSING GREECE'S HANDLING OF THE HIJACKING OF A TWA AIRLINER LAST WEEK.</u>

GREECE, A COMMUNITY MEMBER, HAS COME UNDER FIRE FOR SECURITY AT ATHEMS AIRPORT WHERE THE HIJACKERS BOARDED THE PLANE ON A FLIGHT TO ROME LAST FRIDAY.

IT HAS ALSO BEEN CRITICIZED FOR EXCHANGING AN ACCOMPLICE OF THE HIJACKERS FOR GREEKS ABOARD THE AIRCRAFT.

ITALY'S INTERIOR MINISTER OSCAR LUIGI SCALFARO, WHO CHAIRED THE TWO-DAY MEETING, TOLD A NEWS CONFERENCE GREECE HAD MADE A STATEMENT ON THE HIJACKING. BUT HE SAID HE HAD TAKEN CARE THERE SHOULD BE NO DISCUSSION OF A SUBJECT ""NOT ON THE AGENDA.""

THE MINISTERS SAID IN A STATEMENT THEY SHOULD MEET AT LEAST ONCE A YEAR TO REVIEW EFFORTS AGAINST ALL FORMS OF TERRORISM.

AND CALLED FOR SPECIFIC PROPOSALS TO IMPROVE INFORMATION AND OTHER COOPERATION AMONG EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COUNTRIES.

- 1. SECRET ENTIRE TEXT
- 2. Summary. There follows a message which should be passed to the governments of the Summit Seven. This message relates the substance of the President's press conference of June 18 and US actions with regard to Athens airport. It calls upon the governments of the other six to consider the advisability of a similar advisory against Athens airport, look carefully at the chaotic conditions at Beirut International Airport and recall the need for some joint action against recent Iran which has harbored hijackers and hijackings. Finally it calls upon the FRG to convoke an early meeting of the Summit Seven to consider these questions. The Vice President can be expected toraise these questions, inter alia, during his upcoming trip. End summary.
- 3. The problems of hijacking and other acts against civil aviation security have long been of concern to the Seven, and the USG has for some time attempted to enlist our allies in a more active program to combat this menace, in particular prior to and after at the most recent experts meeting in Bonn March 13-14.

  Unfortunately no concrete results have yet come from this meeting and the prospect for early action apprears dim.

  The TWA 847 incident, not simply because its victims are

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American, underscores the need for immediate progress in the efforts to find better responses to terrorism directed against civil aviation. The general actions discussed by the President in his statement and subsequent follow-up telegrams are part of this continuing USG effort to obtain early agreement on practical, specific measures. We will not cease pressing our allies to join us, either in formal collective action or in parallel efforts aimed at a common objective.

President Reagan, in his press conference Tuesday, June 18, noted several steps the USG would be taking in response to the TWA hijack. In addition to the travel advisory on Athens airport and the appeals for voluntary action discussed below, he noted that State and DOT are to explore the possibility of an expansion of the armed sky marshall program aboard international flights of U.S. carriers; that DOT and the FAA will review the wisdom for all U.S. air carriers to continue flights into Athens until security there has improved; and that State and DOT will report on whether the USG should terminate the service of foreign air carriers whose governments do not honor appropriate international conventions or provide adequate security at their airports. The President also urged Americans not to enter any Middle Eastern country that does not publicly condemn and disassociate itself





from the TWA hijack and call for the immediate safe release of our citizens. In addition, the President noted that he is calling upon all allied and friendly governments to redouble efforts to improve airport security to prevent hijackings, and to take steps together to prevent travel to places where lawlessness is rampant and innocent passengers are unprotected. The Vice President will address all these issues during his upcoming trip.

Travel Advisory at Athens Airport.

known to the GOG our concern for the laxness on terrorism in general and airport security in particular. Various Western European airlines and governments have communicated similar concerns to the Greek Government. To demonstrate the positive USG attitude, we sent a civil aviation security team with senior security officials from USG, Pan Am and TWA to Athens in February for consultations. A complete survey was done by the US team working with the Greek authorities and further US assistance was offered. The team provided a list of specific action recommendations made after four days of discussions and physical review of airport security. The Greeks promised a number of concrete improvements at





the time, but have been very slow to act. In some respects there has been backsliding. (Greek authorities recently asserted that they would no longer permit international carriers in Greece to conduct their own secondary preboard screening.) These failings have been repeatedly underscored at Athens International Airport, most significantly by the incident on 4 April in which a terrorist simply drove through a gap in the perimeter fence, fired a rocket launcher which hit a Jordanian airliner and drove away. At that time we warned the Greeks that we were considering the possibility of a travel advisory.

6. On June 18 at the noon press briefing the Department issued the following statement and travel advisory to alert travellers planning to use Athens international airport: Quote -

The Department of State advises travelers to Greece that several terrorist incidents have taken place at Athens
International Airport. Until adequate security measures are in place, travelers should be advised that an above average potential for terrorist activity exists. - Unquote

7. This action was taken after careful consideration which led to the conclusion that our obligation to warn





American citizens about the danger of travel by air to, through and from Athens compelled the USG to issue a public travel advisory. We have made clear to the GOG that the advisory has been prompted by technical deficiencies at Athens airport, is not a political action, and the USG does not intend it to affect our bilateral political relationship.

- 8. It is the USG view that at present a comprehensive security approach is needed at Athens airport, which includes both general and specific measures; and the USG, as in the past, remains prepared to work with the GOG and to offer as much assistance as possible, including technical training of civil aviation security personnel and related training for supervisory, managerial and executive personnel. We have made clear that we hope for a rapid, positive response to our offer of technical assistance. The Government of Greece has in the short time since the advisory combined expressions of outrage with a certain receptivity to our suggestions. The USG hopes that the travel advisory will be temporary and that an improvement in security procedures will permit its early lifting.
- 9. Action in the above case has been fully consistent with the proposals made by the USG at the Bonn meeting on





March 13-14. The US has also taken note of the initiative of several airline pilot associations, for example the British and Canadian, calling upon their governments to take action, as well as actions by individual airlines such as Pan Am to suspend flights to Athens. These actions are also consistant with USG proposals made in Bonn March 12-13.

- 10. In addition to the lax security at Athens, a second issue of importance related to Greece should be considered by the Summit Seven governments. Shortly after the hijacking began, the hijackers demanded the release of certain of their colleagues imprisoned in other states, including the individual who had attempted to participate in the attack against TWA but who had been bumped from the flight. The Greek Government quickly permitted the departure of this individual for Algiers where he was released. Such action is in clear violation of the Bonn Declaration as well as the Hague and Montreal Conventions.
- 11. The United States Government calls upon the Governments of the other members of the Summit Seven to look into the security issue at Athens Airport and, if they are in agreement with the position of the United States in this matter, to make their concerns known to





the Greeks. This would help bring home the point that there is a real security problem which needs correction, in order to protect the lives of international travellers generally, rather than having the issue appear (erroneously) as a politically inspired act by USG.

The Situation at Beirut International Airport.

12. Events in Beirut in connection with the TWA hijacking and the immediately preceeding Jordan air hijacking and destruction, indicate once again the extent of major civil aviation violations at a single airport. The Government of Lebanon is clearly unable to control the situation at its own international airport and those who do have some control obviously favor the hijackers. There is little chance that any hijackers might be ever caught, let alone prosecuted or extradited. The airport is clearly unsafe for foreign carriers, not only those which service it, but to any of those which might be close enough to be diverted to Beirut. There are few contemporary cases which offer more evidence for sanctions under the Bonn Declaration and the Haque and Montreal Conventions than the Government of Lebanon. Lebanon is a country which President Reagan had clearly in mind when discussing the fourth step of his June 18 statement.





- 14. The United States has not yet finally determined what actions it will take with regard to Beirut Airport, but believes that this is an issue for the most urgent consideration. Not only is urgent action needed to convince the GOL and all those in positions of authority or influence that they should not passively accept the hijacking of TWA 847 and taking its passengers hostage, but that they should put an end to the unrestrained lawlessness which rules at BIA. Perhaps the most feasible means of doing this would be for governments to suspend air service between their countries and BIA, at least until the TWA hijacking has been resolved and improved security measures have been undertaken. Addressee governments will be hearing more from the USG about this very soon.
- 15. There are clearly other governments which clearly do not honor their international obligations or provide adequate security at their airports. Among these is Iran, where there have been several recent hijackings, most notably those of Air France, Saudia and Kuwait Airlines. The United States remains particularly concerned in that the Government of Iran continues to harbor without any serious sign of prosecution the terrorists who murdered two Americans as well as the





other hijackers and it continues to hold the Kuwaiti aircraft hijacked to its territory which it is obligated to return. Both of these actions are clear violations of the Bonn Declaration as well as the Hague and Montreal Conventions. In addition, Iran has a significant degree of influence over the outcome of the TWA hijacking by virtue of its special relations with the Hizballah; the latter is directly involved with the hijacking and holds some of the hostages independently of Amal.

15. For Bonn only: The Government of the United States recognizes that there are some questions of international hijackings currently before the ICAO council in Montreal and scheduled for decision about June 27 and that the ICAO representatives of the Seven have been engaging in discussions, as agreed at the March 12-13 Bonn meeting. Nonetheless the USG urges the Government of the Federal Republic of Germany as host of the Summit Seven to convoke a meeting of the Summit Seven experts at the earliest time to consider taking effectively early action to revitalize the Bonn Declaration and to give practical effect to ideas put forward at the March 12-13 meeting which were clearly supported by most of those present. If the FRG should decide to reconvene such a meeting, the USG considers that there should be some sort of prior agreement to remove procedural obstacles which have



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hampered past meetings.

WE HAVE WITNESSED WITHIN THE PAST TEN DAYS A NUMBER OF DEADLY REMINDERS THAT THE PROBLEM OF INTERNATIONAL TERRORISM HAS INTENSIFIED. THE HOSTAGES TAKEN FROM THE TWA AIRLINER, THE BOMBING AT THE FRANKFURT AIRPORT, AND THE KILLING IN EL SALVADOR PROVIDE FURTHER EVIDENCE THAT THIS

IS A CAMPAIGN DIRECTED NOT AGAINST ONE NATION, BUT AGAINST ALL OF CIVILIZED SOCIETY IN WHICH INNOCENT CIVILIANS ARE THE VICTIMS.

I KNOW THAT YOU AND YOUR GOVERNMENT ATTACH THE HIGHEST IMPORTANCE TO THIS ISSUE AND SHARE OUR GREAT CONCERN OVER THE NEED TO COMBAT THIS INTERNATIONAL SCOURGE. I HAVE APPOINTED GEORGE BUSH TO TAKE THE LEAD WITHIN THE UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT TO DETERMINE WHAT ACTIONS WE AND OTHER THREATENED FRIENDS CAN TAKE TO END THIS INCREASINGLY VIOLENT ATTACK ON OUR CITIZENS AND SHARED DEMOCRATIC VALUES.

IN PARTICULAR, I HAVE ASKED GEORGE BUSH TO FOCUS ON THIS ISSUE DURING HIS VISIT TO EUROPE NEXT WEEK. I HAVE ASKED HIM TO RAISE WITH YOU NOT ONLY THE QUESTION OF THE AMERICAN HOSTAGES IN BEIRUT, BUT THE MORE GENERAL THREAT POSED BY INTERNATIONAL TERRRORISM AND WHAT MORE WE MIGHT DO TO COMBAT IT. 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
