I. PURPOSE

To allow you to meet each of the Freshmen Senators and impress upon them the importance of working with you to carry out the November 4th mandate.

II. BACKGROUND

On November 4th, 16 Republicans were elected to the Senate and for the first time in 26 years, the Republicans are in control of the Senate. The fact that these newly elected Senators find themselves in the Senate majority and in many cases, chairing important subcommittees in the Senate is largely attributable to the success of your Presidential campaign. The retention of this very important power base can only be achieved if there is a very strong sense of commitment on their part to the economic program of your administration. If the economic program is not enacted, or if it is weakened by special interests retaining their hold on the Federal Treasury, their majority status, their seats in the Senate and your Presidency, as well as the future of this country is jeopardized.

This meeting is an opportunity to establish or re-establish a personal rapport with each Senator and hopefully for them to establish a collective identity with your Presidency and your programs.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH FRESHMEN SENATORS

A. TALKING POINTS 9.26

- -- Remind them that the November 4th election produced an overwhelming mandate for you and the 16 Senators in this room today. Since this group has not met to celebrate your collective victory and reflect on the responsibilities that victory brings, you felt it important to meet here today.
- -- The mandate you share with them is simply to turn the economy around and to restore our defense strength. To do that, the economic plan you sent to the Hill must be enacted as quickly as possible.
- -- Emphasize that each vote on spending and tax cuts will be difficult. However, point out that each vote will become even more difficult if they give in to one special interest while telling others no.
- -- Remind them that the reasons we have gotten into our economic problem is because Senators who held their seats in prior years, for one reason or another, gave special interests unjustifiable claims on the Federal Treasury. The Class of 1981 was elected to do just the opposite.

RECOGNIZE SENATOR HEINZ AND SENATOR PACKWOOD

-- Comment that the election of 16 new Republican Senators was the most significant event in Republican Party politics in more than two decades since this has enabled Republicans to gain control of the Senate.

- -- A lion's share of the responsibility for the tremendous victory has to be placed in the hands of Senator John Heinz, last year's Chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee. He deserves a round of applause.
- -- Recognize Senator Packwood and comment that in two years you hope Senator Packwood can present 16 more Freshmen Republicans.

INTRODUCTION OF SENATOR ARLEN SPECTOR OF PENNSYLVANIA

- In jest, indicate that you are going to break with Senate tradition by asking, not the most senior of the group of Senators to speak, but rather select the Senator who occupies that special place at the absolute bottom of the seniority ladder.
- -- Comment that in some ways it is an unenviable position to hold but in this case, Senator Specter will not have to wait his turn. His turn is NOW.
- -- Point out that he follows in a distinguished line of Number 100s. One of the most recent is Senator Mark Hatfield who ascended from number 100 to become Chairman of the Appropriations Committee.
- -- Ask Senator Specter to speak for the Freshmen Class.
- D. AFTER SENATOR SPECTER SPEAKS, RECOGNIZE SENATOR BAKER
- E. AFTER SENATOR BAKER SPEAKS, CLOSE MEETING.

I. PURPOSE

To honor Representative Guy Vander Jagt's request for the President to meet his constituent (Mandy Evans) and her Dutch friend (Lieske Van Kessel). Mrs. Van Kessel is credited with saving the lives of many persons hiding or fleeing from the Germans during World War II, including Ms. Evans and a number of downed Allied airmen.

II. BACKGROUND

Congressman Guy Vander Jagt represents the Ninth District of Michigan, which covers most of the eastern shore of Lake Michigan and extends from Allegan County in the south to Leelanau in the north. The southern portion of the District, in combination with Grand Rapids, has the nation's largest concentration of Dutch-Americans.

Guy Vander Jagt was first elected to Congress in 1966 when his predecessor, Robert Griffin, ran successfully for the United States Senate. Guy since has distinguished himself as an orator of unusual ability, as reflected by his performance as Keynote Speaker at the Republican National Convention last year. As Chairman of the National Republican Congressional Committee (NRCC), Guy played a major role in the election of the fifty-two new Republican Members of the House last Fall. Although he lost a hotly contested race with Bob Michel in December to become the House Republican Leader, Guy remains as one of eight members of the official House Republican Leadership by virtue of his continuing role as NRCC Chairman. Guy also serves on the House Ways and Means Committee.

Mrs. Lieske (pronounced "Leeska") Van Kessel, of the Netherlands, was a member of the Dutch Underground during World War II. She is credited with saving the lives of hundreds of Jewish refugees and downed Allied airmen during the course of the war. She reportedly hid Mandy Evans, who is Jewish, on her houseboat for approximately a year. Ms. Evans recently won a "Fantasy Wish" contest sponsored by radio station WGN in Chicago ("The Wally Phillips Show"); and, as a result she was reunited with Mrs. Van Kessel. During Mrs. Van Kessel's visit, the two women plan to tour the United States.

The reunion has received national press coverage, including an appearance on the "Today" show on Monday, March 16, 1981. During the "Today" show interview, Ms. Evans was asked about the U.S. tour the two women are taking. She replied, in part, "We will be meeting the President on Wednesday; and, of course that tops it all."

-- Acknowledge Guy Vander Jagt's continuing dedication and leadership on matters of vital importance to the nation.

Mention that, with a name like Vander Jagt and such a large concentration of Dutch-Americans in his Congressional District, a good Dutch heritage must have something to do with it.

- -- Recall that you were nicknamed "Dutch" by your father, even though you actually are of Irish, Scotch and English ancestry; and indicate that you have never been prouder of the association.
- -- Express your admiration of the extreme dedication and courage exhibited by the Underground during World War II.
- -- Indicate that the experiences of individuals like Mandy
 Evans and Lieske Van Kessel occupy a permanent place in
 history that always will be remembered by those who
 cherish freedom and believe in the dignity of human life.
- -- In thanking them for visiting with you, wish Mandy Evans and Lieske Van Kessel well throughout their American travels.

ATTACHMENT 1 TALKING POINTS

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH REPRESENTATIVE JIM WRIGHT (D-TEX), THE HOUSE MAJORITY LEADER

- -- Express your appreciation for the Majority Leader's help in developing a specific timetable for consideration of the economic package.
- -- Acknowledge that such an agreement is unprecedented and indicates a mutual commitment to resolving the nation's economic problems.
- -- Recognize that while some partisan actions will occur, you are pleased that the political rhetoric has not been nearly as hot as the jalapeno jelly beans.
- -- Reiterate your pledge of complete cooperation with the Congress to ensure expeditious passage of the economic package.
- NOTE: The Gift Office advised that the President is allowed to accept but NOT EAT these jelly beans.

I. PURPOSE

To respond to a request from Senator Boren, Senator Nickles and Congressman English for a photograph session with the Maid of Cotton.

BACKGROUND II.

Karie Kaye Ross, the 1981 Maid of Cotton, is a twenty-one year old senior at the University of Oklahoma and is from Clinton, Oklahoma. The Maid of Cotton is sponsored by the National Cotton Council and her purpose is to focus attention on the importance of cotton to the economy of the nation.

Senator Boren is a member of the Senate Finance Committee and one of two Democrats to sponsor last year the Roth-Kemp tax proposal. He is one of the organizers of a coalition of twelve moderate to conservative Democrats in the Senate. A schedule proposal is pending for you to meet with this group.

Senator Nickles was elected with you in 1980. He is the youngest member of the Senate. As Chairman of the Labor Subcommittee of the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources, he is a strong advocate of your economic package.

Congressman Glenn English is a member of the Stenholm Group and a member of the Subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee, which will have considered the Dairy Price Support Issue on Wednesday morning, just before coming to the White House. The question of postponing the automatic increase in the Dairy Price Support on April 1 is considered to be an important first test in the economic package. You should also know that prior to returning to his native state of Oklahoma to become

involved in politics in the late 60's, he was Chief Assistant to the Majority Caucus of the California Assembly.

- -- You may want to comment to Boren that you hope to have the coalition of moderate to conservative Democrats that he has been organizing down to the White House soon, especially since the Stenholm Group has been here.
- -- You may want to comment to Nickles about the tough stance that he is taking in the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources against the balance of the Committee that is trying to avoid making cuts in social programs.
- -- You may wish to comment that this will be Nickles' second visit to the White House on Wednesday, having been here for breakfast with the freshman, pointing out that this should be an indication to the people of Oklahoma of how highly he is regarded at the White House.
- -- You may want to ask English about how the bill to eliminate the automatic increase in the Dairy Price Support on April 1 faired in the House Agriculture Subcommittee that morning.
