President's Statement on the Establishment of the President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency

As some of you will no doubt recall, I spoke frequently during the recent Presidential campaign about the problems of fraud and wastein the Federal Government. Today we are taking severval necessary first steps in doing something about it.

This is a matter of much greater importance than dollars. One of the problems in this great country of ours is a measurable, palpable growth of cynicism among our citizens, and particularly cynicism about Government. Much of it has been entirely warranted. When people know from their own experience of cheating, or even just stupid and wasteful ways of doing things, why shouldn't they become cynical? But cynicism is a dangerous disease: It is the counterpart of loss of faith, of confidence in the institutions of our society.

Neither I nor anyone else can eliminate Government waste and abuse overnight. What I can do is to make every one of our Government employees, and those of courscitizens who would try to cheat the Government, acutely conscious that I care, right here in the White House, and that somebody is looking. Today I am signing an exeutive order to bring together in one body the Inspectors General of the various agencies of government and other high officials directly concerned - including the Justice Department and the FBI - so that they can focus their efforts in the places that will do the most good. They will share knowledge of what they are finding out. They will tell one another of promising corners to look into. And they will be ready to pounce, with criminal prosecution, where that is warranted.

The Chairman of the new President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency will be Edwin Harper, the Deputy Director of the Office of Management and Budget, who is also an Assistant to the President. He will be reporting directly to me. And Ed, I am confident you will have a lot to report.

I am also announcing today the appointments of the first six of the sixteen Inspectors General that are authorized by law. At the time I exercised my prerogative as a new President to terminate the appointments of the incumbent Inspectors General, I announced that we would seek out the very best people we could find, including those who previously held these positions. Five of the six appointments I am announcing today were serving previously as Inspectors General, and I hope this puts to rest suspicions that have been voiced that politics has anything to do with these appointments. We sought the best, and we found in these cases that the best were those who had experience and were serving with great effectiveness. They have all uncovered some very bad cases of fraud or abuse in government programs, and have saved or recovered millions of dollars.

These two actions get us on the road. It is a serious and continuing effort to go after the bad actors, the abuses that make people troubled about their government.
