I. PURPOSE

The purpose of the meeting is to express support publicly for the Republican ticket in Virginia.

II. BACKGROUND

The Virginia GOP convention held June 6 chose Marshall Coleman for Governor, Nathan Miller for Lieutenant Governor, and Wyatt Durrette for Attorney General. Coleman and Durrette were unanimous choices. However, the battle for Lieutenant Governor was hard-fought with Miller overcoming Herb Bateman (a coalition choice) and Guy Farley (favored by the strongest conservatives). Virginia has kept the governorship in GOP hands for the past decade by pulling together a coalition of conservatives, Republicans and Democrats. Former Governor Mills Godwin, first a Democrat Governor--then GOP Governor, heads the coalition.

The slate does not currently have the full backing of the coalition. Coleman's true conservative credentials have been constantly questioned. The fight for Lieutenant Governor was bitter and has yet to be forgotten making for further problems.

III. PARTICIPANTS

--Marshall Coleman--currently moderate Attorney General; went into convention unopposed, but conservatives had been looking for another candidate.

--Nathan Miller--dark horse state senator for Lieutenant Governor won over coalition and conservative candidates.

--Wyatt Durrette--former member, House of Delegates; Reagan Co-chairman in 1976. Coalition candidate, probably strongest member of the ticket.

--Al Cramer--State GOP Chairman and Reagan supporter since 1968.

--Anson Franklin--Campaign manager for Coleman.

--Judy Peachee--Intergovernmental Affairs office of White House.

JUNE 19, 1981

One of the good things about a toast is that it provides the opportunity to say things that perhaps would not be said in the course of normal conversation.

So I welcome this chance to speak about my admiration for Prime Minister Lee and the people of Singapore, whom I first visited nearly 10 years ago. Let me also pay tribute to the late President Sheares, who passed away last month. He was a fine doctor and a fine public servant, and both his callings contributed to the well-being of Singapore.

Mr. Prime Minister, I am told that the five stars on your flag stand for the ideals of democracy, peace, progress, justice and equality. Would it be presumptuous if I mentioned a sixth star might be in order? The star of self-reliance.

Self-reliance is a trait that for some reason Americans seem to claim for their own. Perhaps it is because we required so much of it when we began as a Nation or because great American thinkers like Emerson and Thoreau emphasized it so.

Yet, Singapore truly embodies the quality of self-reliance. Your people have faced extreme problems with nothing to fall back on except their own energy, intelligence, and excellent political leadership such as you represent.

They overcame the challenges; and, today, Singapore is a prosperous lesson that nations do have control of their own destinies.

Mr. Prime Minister, I am trying to revitalize the concept of self-reliance here in the United States. If I can be anywhere near as successful as you, I will be a very satisfied man.

Your country's motto is very fitting: "Let Singapore Flourish." Would everyone please join me in a toast: May Singapore flourish; may the Prime Minister flourish; may our friendship flourish.
