DEPARTURE STATEMENT -- TRUDEAU VISIT

It was a great pleasure this afternoon to meet once again with Prime Minister Trudeau. Our discussion covered a number of bilateral and multilateral issues.

As you know, the Prime Minister has just returned from Europe. He brought me a good report on European preparations for the economic summit in Ottawa that begins some nine days from now.

I told the Prime Minister that I am very much looking forward to our Ottawa talks. They come at an opportune time for the seven industrial democracies that will be in attendance.

All of our nations now face a common task of reducing inflation, increasing employment and improving the long-term economic prospects for our people.

Indeed, it is clear that achieving economic recovery now poses one of the greatest challenges to the free world, and it is this challenge that shall lie at the heart of our summit in Ottawa.

We must discuss not just our problems in Ottawa but our own national policies to cope with them and what we must do together to restore general prosperity.

I also hope that from this summit shall come a new sense of confidence and community among the industrial nations that economic recovery can be achieved.

I hope, further, that in our meetings, our countries will reaffirm our fundamental partnership with each other. For many years, our societies have shared democratic political institutions, market economy systems and a belief and faith in human dignity and freedom. By meeting at this summit, we will express our quiet determination to defend those values and institutions against any threat.

Finally, let me say that I look forward to the summit meeting for personal reasons. I believe it is important to the vitality of our foreign policy that I have an opportunity to renew friendships with world leaders who have already visited me here in Washington and also have an opportunity to forge new relationships with those who have recently been elected to office.

Prime Minister Trudeau and I -- as well as others who will join us in Ottawa -- all agree that we can achieve both progress and peace only through the close and continuous cooperation which this meeting symbolizes. That is the basis of our partnership, and partnership is the basis of our common task.

Mr. Prime Minister, I look forward to seeing you again when I arrive in your country for this important meeting.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR THE PRESIDENT

July 10, 1981

-- Good afternoon. I extend my heartiest welcome to the White House. I appreciate your being here today to provide us with your wisdom and suggestions on how this Administration can better serve all of America.

-- I think it would be realistic to say that not all of you agree with all our programs. We appreciate your concerns, and that's why I'm particularly delighted that you could come here to give us your input. We want to hear from those who might be critical of us in some areas ... as well as those who agree with our proposals.

-- As I said in my address to the NAACP in Denver,

"Anyone who becomes President realizes he must represent all the people of the land, not just those of a particular party or those who voted for him."

-- The economic recovery program is designed to end the stagnation and backsliding on gains that have been made by the Black people over the past few decades. We believe we have new answers that will accomplish the goals that the New Deal and Great Society anticipated, but never achieved.

-- It's vitally important that we build a bipartisan communication system with Black state legislators to ensure that the Black community is in the mainstream of decision-making as we return powers to the states under our program of federalism.

-- As a former Governor, I recognize the tremendous talent in the state legislatures. I know you are compassionate and knowledgeable, and much more accountable than Federal bureaucrats because you are closer to the people.

-- But I really invited you here so we can have a dialogue. I want to hear what you have to say in the time we have, and then I'd like you to talk with Secretary Schweiker, *Regan,* and ~~S. Bell~~ Bell about the specific programs relating to their departments ... and the Vice President will be here shortly to brief you on our regulatory relief effort. So I'll open the meeting for discussion now.
