I. PURPOSE

To satisfy Congressman Ashbrook's request for the President to meet with Joseph L. Wagner, a political writer for the Cleveland Press.

II. BACKGROUND

John Ashbrook represents the 17th Congressional District of Ohio and is serving in his 5th term as a Member of the House of Representatives. He is the ranking minority member of the Education and Labor Committee and has actively supported the President's spending and tax cut proposals. Congressman Ashbrook will likely run for the Senate seat now held by Howard Metzenbaum (D-Ohio).

Joseph Wagner is a political writer for the <u>Cleveland Press</u>, who has long been an admirer of the President and whose columns have been supportive of him. The newspaper will begin publishing a Sunday edition in early August, having previously published only six daily editions, in hopes of reaching a projected circulation of 400,000.

I. PURPOSE

To accommodate the request of Congressman Railsback that he and Congressmen Sawyer and Butler be given the opportunity to discuss with the President their reasons for supporting the reauthorization of the Legal Services Corporation.

II. BACKGROUND

On June 18, the House voted 227-165 to reauthorize the Legal Services Corporation for two years at a funding level of \$241 million annually.

Congressmen Tom Railsback, Hal Sawyer, and Caldwell Butler are Members of the House Judiciary Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties and the Administration of Justice. Railsback, who as ranking Republican on the Subcommittee managed the bill for the minority, Sawyer, and Butler voted in favor of the Corporation's continuation, citing as reasons that the reauthorization bill embodied adequate remedies such as further restrictions on legislative lobbying by corporation lawyers and the prohibition of LSC dissemination of information on political activities, the filing of class action suits against local, State and Federal Governments, and the handling of abortion cases unless the mother's life was in danger, so as to prohibit inappropriate and objectionable LSC activities.

The House Appropriations Committee has voted to appropriate the reauthorization funds. The Senate has included LSC reauthorization as part of the reconciliation bill and is expected to report a separate reauthorization bill. Counsellor Meese and OMB Director Stockman have publicly indicated they would recommend vetoing the reauthorization legislation. Because of the strong veto signal, a number of Members voted in favor of the unsuccessful motion to recommit with the instructions to include the Corporation's activities under the social services block grant.

Railsback, Sawyer, and Butler are aware of the possible veto and recognize the votes exist to sustain such action.

Congressman Butler has publicly expressed hope for a compromise, i.e., a one-year extension of the Corporation at a reduced funding level from the reauthorization amount and subsequent inclusion in a block grant.

The original request for a Presidential meeting was declined but was subsequently scheduled at the strong insistence of Congressman Bob Michel.

BRIEF REMARKS: REPUBLICAN HOUSE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE JULY 24, 1981

Thank you very much. Jack, Bob and Trent, thanks to your efforts and those of the rest of you, this is an exciting morning for Republicans on Capitol Hill. We begin the final battle of a campaign we've waged for the last 4 years. We are on the brink of fulfilling a promise we made to the American people, and today we take the last, historic steps to provide the first, real tax cut for all Americans in nearly 20 years.

We have this chance because many Members have been working very hard, but special thanks go to people like Barber Conable and Dick Cheney, Stan Parris and Newt Gingrich. I can appreciate their commitment because I share it, as well. This tax cut is the most crucial item left on our agenda for prosperity.

Last fall, most of us in this room pledged a solemn covenant with the American people. We stood on the steps of the Capitol and pledged to work as a team, united in the goals of our Party. We pledged that within a year we would not only cut the Federal spending that had grown out of control, but we would cut the taxes that have stolen the hope for a better tomorrow.

Today we are within striking distance of these goals.

Members of the House and Senate are working out the final
details of the largest budget cuts the Congress has ever
considered. And today, Members of the House will begin an

historic debate as our final tax cut proposal is introduced. This is a good bill and a fair bill. It includes added incentives to further stimulate our economy. This bill has my enthusiastic support, I know it will have yours as well. Republicans and Democrats will be choosing between the Speaker's tax increase, or the bipartisan tax cut.

The choice is clear and our momentum is powerful, but we must remember we have gotten this far because we have all stood together. Only if we remain together during these last, critical days, will we realize the goal to which we have pledged ourselves -- a goal people said could never be reached. Together we can change the course of history, reversing the decline of America's economic strength, and starting her on the road to recovery, again.

Now, as a former Democrat, no one appreciates bipartisan cooperation more than I do. But I think that we Republicans can be forgiven if we recall that only because we dug our heels in, only because we wouldn't compromise our principles, only because we wouldn't give up despite resistance from the Democratic leadership every step of the way, is there even a chance of a tax cut at all. I think we can be proud of that.

The American people want tax relief, they deserve tax relief, and, with our help and the help of some discerning Democrats, we are going to turn the chance for tax relief into the reality of a 3-year tax cut.

But the House leadership has stacked the deck against the American people; we've got to let them know that. They tease us with an economic Catch-22 that goes like this: Economic goals must first be reached, but since their plan makes the goals impossible, the goals can never be reached. With a sleight of hand they have made it appear as if they offer a third year of cuts to match ours. But they make no such offer. Since they have never believed in cutting taxes, they have attached the third year to a trigger. They know that under their plan that trigger can never be pulled.

They claim it is too risky to guarantee individuals a tax cut in 1984, so they make no commitment at all. But Tip O'Neill and the Democratic leadership, people who claim to be on the side of the working people, find no risk at all in guaranteeing big business a cut every year for the next seven years in a row.

Does that sound like a tax cut for the working people to you?

In the last 10 years, Tip O'Neill gave the people 5 "tax cuts." Over the same 10-year period, taxes increased by more than \$400 billion. Now, I ask you, what do you think they have in store for the working people this time?

Our tax bill, the bipartisan tax bill being introduced this morning, targets three-quarters of its tax relief to middle-income wage-earners. We offer taxes indexed to eliminate the bracket creep of inflation. We offer estate tax relief that will keep family farms in the family, and incentives to encourage small business.

Now, which bill really sounds like a bill for the working people? Our bill holds the most hope for the majority of Americans.

But I have been concerned lately that rhetoric has begun to blur what is really the sharp edge in this debate. Many people are unaware of the clear choice before them. So let us leave the American people with one thought to consider this weekend: the real choice is between Tip O'Neill's tax increase or the bipartisan tax cut.

Everyone should know that their taxes are already doomed to rise by 22 percent during the next 3 years because of built-in tax increases and the bracket creep of inflation.

Mr. O'Neill offers them only a 15 percent cut. We offer 25.

The Democratic leadership has never believed in cutting taxes. As I said, they haven't done it for nearly 20 years and I don't see any indication they intend to do it now. They have made no commitment to cut taxes because they don't want to cut on spending. We have made a commitment to a permanent tax cut.

It has been said that Government performs its highest duty when it restores to its citizens taxes oppressively collected. Let us respond to the duty call we have sounded, and let us rally others here and across America who hear that call and understand their responsibility to their country. At stake are the dreams of our countrymen, and on that fragile foundation rests the hope of the next generation. Together we have the chance to ensure those dreams. Let us

act as one to keep the solemn pledge we made together and fulfill the obligation we all feel so strongly to a free and prosperous future for this much-loved country.


