the Davis Cup team when you meet the Australians in October. I ~~do, however,~~ want to congratulate you on beating last year's winners in New York. ~~I know the~~ ^{The Czechoslovakian team} Czech's had a good team.

-- This international competition serves a good purpose. Yes, it gives your fellow citizens a thrill to see you out there. ~~Yet we must never lose sight that it is~~ ^{For as long as it is} through honest competition like this that nations learn to live together in peace. ~~So~~ When you're on the court, ~~remember~~ you are more than athletes, you are Ambassadors of good will for ~~America~~ ^{the world}.

-- But tennis is not just ^{for} a professional sport. ^{in your own home} Some ^{is} estimated ^{suggest} that over 32 million people of all ages and backgrounds are playing. Furthermore, it is a family game. It is not uncommon to see parents competing on the court against their children -- and sometimes winning.

-- Now I understand we've got some refreshments prepared. So if we can make our way there, we can continue getting to know each other. Thanks again for a lovely time.

Despite unprecedented defeats on the economic package, the House leadership maintained a legislative schedule that permitted timely enactment of the key parts of the economic package.

In addition to the economic issues, the Fall legislative calendar presents new challenges for the Administration and the Congress. It is important for the Administration and the public to know what priority the House leadership will be giving to legislation this Fall, and what legislative timetable they intend to follow.

Appropriations bills and possible vetoes, the debt-ceiling increase, the second Budget Resolution, and a need for a continuing resolution to fund the government will be Congressional battlegrounds for the continuing fight to hold down government spending. The Farm Bill, AWACs, Voting Rights Act, Clean Air Act, etc. are some of the additional issues awaiting Congressional action.

The Speaker and the Republican Leader will determine if and when the House will deal with these matters. This luncheon

will be a time to ask for their ideas and priorities and to assure them of the Administration's commitment to work closely with them.

The Speaker spent much of the recent recess at his summer home on Cape Cod although he made several trips to his District (Cambridge, Mass.). Congressman Michel was back in his District (Peoria, Ill.) for the recess.

Some of your staff people say it's fun to work with you. Do you deliberately maintain a certain lightness in meetings with your staff? Do you go to a staff meeting in a more relaxed way than to other meetings?

In the past there have been instances of the President's staff becoming more of a barrier than a bridge between the President and people and issues. Have you managed to avoid this pitfall?

What if your staff gives you conflicting advice? Suppose you disagree with their recommendations? What then?

I. PURPOSE

The President has requested this meeting to discuss the Saudi AWACS sale.

II. BACKGROUND

In the Senate, we are looking at a very close head count on the proposed sale of the AWACS to Saudi Arabia. Senator Packwood has indicated to you that he hopes to have over 50 co-sponsors for his resolution of disapproval by September 14th.

The sales is viewed by most opponents as a threat to the security of Israel -- an idea fostered by the active and influential Jewish lobby. Few members focus on the U.S. national security aspects of the sale. Other technical questions raised are the stability of the Saudi government, the possible loss or transfer of sophisticated surveillance equipment to a third country, data sharing, Saudi assurances regarding use of the equipment, and Saudi support of the PLO. Several members have also said that the Saudis have not been helpful in the Middle East peace developments.

The purpose of the ongoing informal notification period is to allow for consultation between the Administration and Congress before the final package is sent up for consideration. We are undertaking an extensive briefing program for Senators and their staffs -- giving them background details and offering the opportunity to ask questions and make recommendations.

The group you have invited here today is crucial to our success. They are the "undecideds" and the "leaners". Some of this group have expressed reservations to the sale and suggested that once Senator Packwood gets a majority to co-sponsor his resolution, they will have to join him. They will be watching to see just how strong your personal commitment is to this issue.

Talking Points on AWACS

-- I would like to discuss what I consider to be the key foreign policy issue we will face over the next six weeks: the sale of the air defense enhancement package to Saudi Arabia.

-- A great deal of opposition has been generated by this proposal, but it is opposition based on misunderstanding. I want to set the record straight on where I stand on the proposal.

-- The most important reason for proceeding with the sale is that it makes a substantial contribution to the security of the United States and the West. I would not support the sale were it otherwise.

-- Saudi Arabia must have the capability to defend its oil facilities from attack by regional adversaries. We have learned from the Iran-Iraq war that there is no particular sanctity for oil facilities in regional conflicts.

-- The Saudi oil facilities are concentrated and highly vulnerable to an air attack. The Saudi Air Force cannot, at the present time, provide an adequate defense.

-- The loss of certain key oil facilities would halt the flow of Saudi oil for more than a year, causing economic havoc and deep security dangers for the West. As long as we and our principal Allies remain dependent on Saudi oil, we must ensure that these facilities are adequately defended.

-- Saudi Arabia looks to us to provide for its security. We will take steps to draw Saudi Arabia closer to us.

-- Moreover, what we are doing with Saudi Arabia represents an important next step for the peace process. To move forward, Saudi Arabia, as the most influential of the moderate Arab states, must play a greater role. We are encouraging this.

-- I have just finished two days of meetings with Prime Minister Begin. We have reached important understandings concerning our future cooperation. The Prime Minister stated -- and I agree -- that we have advanced our relationship significantly. I listened to his views on this sale and he listened to mine.

-- This package will not pose any substantial threat to the security of Israel. Each of the four elements in the Saudi air defense enhancement package has been carefully tailored to ensure that it makes good military sense without providing a capability which exceeds Saudi needs. The limitations of the various elements, including AWACS, and the growing superiority of the Israeli Air Force, will preclude Saudi Arabia from ever posing any credible threat to the security of Israel.

-- Stringent safeguards will be established to ensure that the equipment will not be compromised. Even so, we are confident that, even should an unforeseen compromise occur, there will be no major damage to our national security. This is because the technology involved is really quite old and not particularly sensitive.

-- This sale makes an essential contribution to our national security and to the economic health of the West. I therefore fully support the sale and intend to do whatever is necessary to ensure that it is completed.

-- Because of the importance of this sale to our national security, I urgently ask each of you to help in its passage. It is apparent that there is an awful lot of misunderstanding of this issue on the Hill. In fact, most of those who are committed against the sale have not even been briefed on the details of the proposal and our case for it.

-- Your help in presenting the facts about the sale will be of crucial importance. Dick Allen and his teams from State and Defense will provide briefings on the package. I ask that you encourage your colleagues not to commit against the sale until they have been briefed.

-- I look upon this issue as truly bipartisan in nature because of the contribution it makes to our national security interests. The security of our energy resources and our national credibility as a reliable security partner depend upon the consummation of this sale.
