



6:00 p.m. Guests arrive from East Gate and proceed directly to the State Floor for cocktails and hors d'oeuvres via the ground floor Cross Hall and Grand Staircase.

6:45 p.m. Guests are ushered by Social Aides down the Stairways from the Green Room and the Red Room and the Grand Staircase to the tent on the South Lawn for barbecue dinner.

There will be four main barbecue lines at the far west and far east of the tent through which guests will pass and then take their seats at the tables.

7:15 p.m. THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN join the guests for the barbecue dinner via elevator and Diplomatic Reception Room.

8:45 p.m. Conclusion of the Statler Brothers Concert. THE PRESIDENT comes to the stage to thank the Statler Brothers and say goodnight to the guests.

9:00 p.m. THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. REAGAN depart via the north entrance of the tent, the Diplomatic Reception Room, and the elevator to the Residence.

9:15 p.m. All guests depart.

TALKING POINTS: CALIFORNIA AND TEXAS DELEGATION RECEPTION SEPTEMBER 23, 1981

- -- I want you to know I've been a big fan of the Statler
 Brothers -- even before they wrote me into their song.
 I don't see how anybody could come away from music like
 we've had tonight and not feel good.
- -- Thank you, gentlemen, on behalf of all of us. I think
 I can speak for everyone when I say that, for Easterners,
 you do all right.
- -- Nancy and I are glad all of you could come tonight.

 Back home, in Texas and California, barbeques are a means for people to come together: at church congregations, political rallies, country get-togethers, business parties and just gatherings of friends. Often, like tonight, guests are of different parties and points of view. And somehow, after sharing food and having fun, you understand the other fellow better. You remember the values and traditions that bind you and that the bonds are stronger than the issues that divide.
- -- We all need to remember, in the trying days and months that lie ahead, if men and women of good faith reason together -- if we look to our strengths and rely on our bonds -- we will rise above our problems together. We are, after all, the last best hope of man on earth.
