# I. PURPOSE

To respond to a request from Senator Rudy Boschwitz for you to meet with this group to discuss your decision not to address out-year policy in the second budget resolution and not to deal with entitlements and revenue enhancement this year.

#### II. BACKGROUND

Last Thursday at the GOP leadership meeting in the Cabinet Room, you informed the leadership including Senator Domenici that with regard to the second budget resolution, you recommend that out-year decisions on entitlements and revenue enhancement be handled in the budget message next year and that there should be no attempt to deal with these issues now. In spite of this recommendation, ten of twelve Republicans on the Budget Committee voted to move ahead immediately with tax increases and entitlement program cuts. All Democrats and Senators Kassebaum and Quayle sided with your position and the attempt was rejected.

Senator Boschwitz has called to request an opportunity to appeal this decision. Senator Boschwitz has been constantly assured that you work through the leadership on issues like this, but the meeting was agreed to as a courtesy to him and the other Senators who requested it.

TAPING: GOVERNOR QUIE EVENT, NOVEMBER 18, 1981

Good evening and thanks to all of you for being there tonight to kick off the 1982 Republican Reelection Campaign in Minnesota. I want to send my special greetings to former President Gerald Ford. His tireless campaigning has been an inspiration to us all. Jerry, let me take this opportunity -- and I know everyone there agrees with me -- to thank you for all that you are doing to further the cause.

Minnesota is also vital to that cause. Your State, just like the Federal Government, was dominated by liberals for decades. Our current economic hardships are the legacy of their spend, spend, tax, tax policies. Of course the profligate spenders are the same folks who are now fighting reform tooth and nail -- at the Federal and State levels. It's almost as if they enjoy bad economic news, thinking they've managed to jump ship soon enough to shift the blame.

Governor Quie (Kwee) knew he'd face this problem; yet, he had the courage to tackle the fundamental problems plaguing his State. Even now he is in a struggle to maintain the integrity of tax indexing in Minnesota. I congratulate him on fighting the good fight, and I encourage all of you to put out the maximum effort to reelect him. Reelecting Governor Quie will keep Minnesota on the right track and signal the Nation that Republicans are not about to permit the big-spending Democrats to exploit the economic problems

that they themselves have caused. Furthermore, we are not about to compromise our principles when the going gets rough.

Now is the time for us to reaffirm our belief in the fundamental Republican philosophy. Whether at the Federal or State levels, we believe in less government and more individual freedom, in less regulation and more jobs, in less taxes and more take-home pay. President Ford will confirm that all political success is totally dependent on the continued dedication of the political activists at the local level. In a free society you are the basic unit of political change; your hard work and enthusiasm give those in public office the leverage to follow through on promises made in a campaign. This is especially true when tackling problems that have been building for decades. These problems will not disappear overnight so they require even more devotion if our goal is to be reached.

And tonight I want to reconfirm something to you. We will not be deterred from our goal of restoring a healthy and vibrant economy to the United States. The people are still with us because they know we're doing our best and the other party is offering no alternative; they concentrate on

the negative. We must continue to emphasize the positive because today -- more than ever before -- the Republicans are the party of hope.

But remember, it isn't going to do any good to clean the mess up in Washington unless the right kind of people are elected at the State level. So let's do everything we can to reelect Governor Quie and keep Minnesota in Republican ranks. I'm counting on you. Good luck.

TAPING: RE-ELECTION OF GUAM GOVERNOR PAUL CALVO NOVEMBER 18, 1981

I would like to talk with you a moment about my friend and your Governor, Paul Calvo. I've made it a rule not to tell other people how to vote, but I thought you ought to know how hard he's fought for you, the people of Guam, and how much he's done to support the programs that will benefit all Americans, no matter where they live.

Paul Calvo was one of the first to rally behind our cause last year as we campaigned to return America to strength and prosperity. For too long the Federal Government had been on a wild merry-go-round of spending and taxing, leaving us with the legacy of a trillion dollar debt, the highest tax burden in history and double-digit inflation. In short - economic chaos.





Good evening. It has been such a great pleasure for Nancy and me to be with you tonight.

Last night we were lucky enough to have Robert Goulet entertain at a State dinner. I couldn't help but remember that Goulet had his Broadway debut in the musical "Camelot" back in 1960. The Kennedy administration so often has been compared to "Camelot." I wondered what play or movie my Administration would be compared to. Last week seemed like the "Poseidon Adventure."

Tonight I want to talk about a happier subject . . .

the United States Senate. We can be proud of the relationship

we've developed over the last 10 months. Working together

we accomplished more in this short time than other administrations

did when both Houses of the Congress and the Presidency were

controlled by the same party.

Our cooperation has been based on the mandate of the 1980 election and also on the heartfelt belief that America needs a fundamental change of direction.

The good ship Columbia was headed for the rocks; and we've managed, with hard work and good faith, to steer her clear. And I promise you tonight that if we stick with the course we've charted, there are calm waters ahead.

The expansion of government and taxes were destroying the freedom and prosperity that is every American's birthright.

Together we passed legislation that will reduce government growth and cut the tax burden.

I am proud of each and every one of you for the political courage you've demonstrated this year. For the record, let me take this opportunity to emphasize that I do not intend to back down on what we've accomplished. Members of the other party can dance with glee as we face a period of temporary economic adjustment. But this is just another example of the negativism that the voters rejected in 1980. The people are still on our side and are not about to permit big-spending liberals to exploit the economic hardship that they themselves created.

In the months ahead our challange is to stand firm for what we've already decided. We have made a legal and moral commitment to the people of the United States, and that pledge will be honored. No special interest asking to be an exception, no member of the opposition who never believed in our program in the first place should deter us from our objective. And remember, our goal is not a quick fix but the restoration of a firm foundation for lasting economic prosperity.

I don't want to start singling you out because each of you was there when it counted. So many of you made such remarkable personal contributions -- I think you know the depth of my gratitude and the country's. But I would like to say just a few words about Howard Baker. Howard, your

leadership has been indispensable for all that we've accomplished. You've been a political ally, a friend, and a personal confidant. Your support on all of these tough issues and your personal direction during those days when I was just getting to know Washington is deeply appreciated. Through your efforts we've built a working partnership between the White House and the United States Senate that would be the envy of any President. So a special thanks to you, Howard.

Still on the agenda are some tough issues like the B-l and MX programs, a few nominations that may require some personal attention and the continuing struggle to stay within the budget limits we've already set. But knowing you're there -- all of you -- and knowing the kind of relationship we've got, I am confident that we can do whatever needs to be done.
