

MEETING WITH NATIONAL TURKEY FEDERATION

DATE November 18, 1931

I. <u>PURPOSE</u> To receive a Thanksgiving turkey from the President and Executive Vice President of the National Turkey Federation.

II. <u>BACKGROUND</u> The National Turkey Federation is the only national trade association representing the turkey industry in the United States. Members of NTF produce and market 96 percent of the nation's turkey crop.

This is the 34th presentation of a Thanksgiving turkey to the Nation's First Family by the NTF. The presentation will be made by NTF President Hugh McClain of Mountain Home, Arkansas.

In March 1981, the NTF formally endorsed your program for economic recovery.

11:30 am -- You exit the Oval Office and proceed to the table set up in the Rose Garden. The live turkey will be placed on the table.

You will shake hands with the five guests and stand next to Mr. McClain who will make the presentation to you.

Following the presentation of the turkey you thank Mr. McClain, say goodbye to the guests, and return to the Oval Office.

BACKGROUND/SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR MEETING WITH NATIONAL TURKEY FEDERATION REPRESENTATIVES

Note: Since no remarks are required, what is provided as background is for your personal information only.

- -- You addressed the National Turkey Federation convention in San Diego in 1979 (Town & Country Hotel). At that event, you sat next to Mr. Lew Walts, the NTF's Executive Vice President. Mr. Walts (and his wife Frankie) will attend today's presentation.
- -- The NTF was previously headquartered in Mt. Morris, Illinois, near your hometown of Dixon (They are currently located in Reston, Virginia).
- -- In addition to the live turkey, there will be two thirty-pound dressed turkeys on either side of the table. They will be wrapped in foil and inscribed "Happy Holidays, Mr. President."
- -- During his presentation remarks, Mr. McClain will say a few words about the turkey industry and will probably note that the NTF supports your Program for Economic Recovery.

Last week I signed the Thanksgiving Day proclamation, which expressed our gratitude to God for all He has given us. We enjoy freedom, which has enabled us to reap a harvest of plenty throughout our Nation's history. We inhabit a homeland that is fertile and productive. And we have a people possessing a strong and generous character.
- -- Really, I don't believe any people on Earth have had more to be thankful for than we Americans. And before we sit down to our Thanksgiving dinner, carve into our turkey, and load up with cranberries and sweet potatoes,

I hope all Americans will give thanks for their many blessings. And let me thank you again for this bird, which I know is going to be delicious.

The Laymen's National Bible Committee deserves our thanks. For more than 40 years, they have sponsored National Bible Week to remind Americans of the significance of the Scriptures.

"If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

This passage expresses my hopes for the future of this Nation and the world.

TAPING: GOVERNOR QUIE EVENT, NOVEMBER 18, 1981

Good evening and thanks to all of you for being there tonight to kick off the 1982 Republican Reelection Campaign in Minnesota. I want to send my special greetings to former President Gerald Ford. His tireless campaigning has been an inspiration to us all. Jerry, let me take this opportunity -- and I know everyone there agrees with me -- to thank you for all that you are doing to further the cause.

Minnesota is also vital to that cause. Your State, just like the Federal Government, was dominated by liberals for decades. Our current economic hardships are the legacy of their spend, spend, tax, tax policies. Of course the profligate spenders are the same folks who are now fighting reform tooth and nail -- at the Federal and State levels. It's almost as if they enjoy bad economic news, thinking they've managed to jump ship soon enough to shift the blame.

Governor Quie (Kwee) knew he'd face this problem; yet, he had the courage to tackle the fundamental problems plaguing his State. Even now he is in a struggle to maintain the integrity of tax indexing in Minnesota. I congratulate him on fighting the good fight, and I encourage all of you to put out the maximum effort to reelect him. Reelecting Governor Quie will keep Minnesota on the right track and signal the Nation that Republicans are not about to permit the big-spending Democrats to exploit the economic problems

that they themselves have caused. Furthermore, we are not about to compromise our principles when the going gets rough.

Now is the time for us to reaffirm our belief in the fundamental Republican philosophy. Whether at the Federal or State levels, we believe in less government and more individual freedom, in less regulation and more jobs, in less taxes and more take-home pay. This philosophy is not meant just for Washington; it is a theory that has worked well at all levels of government.

President Ford will confirm that all political success is totally dependent on the continued dedication of the political activists at the local level. In a free society you are the basic unit of political change; your hard work and enthusiasm give those in public office the leverage to follow through on promises made in a campaign. This is especially true when tackling problems that have been building for decades. These problems will not disappear overnight so they require even more devotion if our goal is to be reached.

And tonight I want to reconfirm something to you. We will not be deterred from our goal of restoring a healthy and vibrant economy to the United States. The people are still with us because they know we're doing our best and the other party is offering no alternative; they concentrate on

the negative. We must continue to emphasize the positive because today -- more than ever before -- the Republicans are the party of hope.

But remember, it isn't going to do any good to clean the mess up in Washington unless the right kind of people are elected at the State level. So let's do everything we can to reelect Governor Quie and keep Minnesota in Republican ranks. I'm counting on you. Good luck.

TAPING: RE-ELECTION OF GUAM GOVERNOR PAUL CALVO NOVEMBER 18, 1981

I would like to talk with you a moment about my friend and your Governor, Paul Calvo. I've made it a rule not to tell other people how to vote, but I thought you ought to know how hard he's fought for you, the people of Guam, and how much he's done to support the programs that will benefit all Americans, no matter where they live.

Paul Calvo was one of the first to rally behind our cause last year as we campaigned to return America to strength and prosperity. For too long the Federal Government had been on a wild merry-go-round of spending and taxing, leaving us with the legacy of a trillion dollar debt, the highest tax burden in history and double-digit inflation.

In short - economic chaos.

Your Governor was one of the first to stand up and be counted. With his help, we won the election and are on our way to once again making our Government live within its means.

It will be a long and difficult struggle, but with leaders like Paul Calvo, I know we can do it.

Although Guam has characteristics that make its economy different from many other communities, Governor Calvo understands and is applying basic principles common to all. In his first year in office, he began to reduce the size of the General Fund's massive deficit. Because of his reforms and austerity programs, the people of Guam actually saved nearly \$11 million from their 1980 budget.

At the same time, Governor Calvo has brought increased Federal attention to the needs of Guam. He has encouraged private initiatives for development and attracted new industry.

I am proud to work with your Governor, Paul Calvo, and I count on his support and advice. We need people like Governor Calvo in office. Only with leadership like his in the States and territories of America can we return to the greatness we once knew and must have, again.
