MEETING WITH INSPECTORS GENERAL TO REDUCE FRAUD, WASTE,
AND MISMANAGEMENT IN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT -- DECEMBER 7, 1981

Thank you, Ed.

Last March I signed an Executive Order establishing the Council on Integrity and Efficiency. The purpose was to attack fraud, waste and mismanagement by bringing together the Inspectors General with the FBI, the Department of Justice, the Office of Management and Budget, and the Office of Personnel Management. By joining forces, you have made substantial progress -- you have saved the taxpayers over \$2 billion in only 6 months -- I congratulate you.

When the Council was established, I told the American people that this was not a symbolic gesture but an effective step towards getting control of the Government and ending public cynicism about their political institutions.

I made a promise at that time: that we are going to follow every lead, root out every incompetent, and prosecute every crook we find who's cheating the people of this Nation. Thanks to your diligent work, we are keeping that promise.

Over the last 8 months, I have followed your progress on reducing fraud, improving management controls, reducing error in important and costly social programs, and providing deterrents against future abuse.

I was very pleased when Ed Harper reported in a Cabinet Meeting that this year alone the Department of Agriculture reduced delinquent debt in the Farmers Home

Administration by a billion dollars. This is a good example of action that helps us get the budget under control.

Some of you may have noticed recently NBC magazine's long story about the changes Jerry Carmen made at the General Services Administration, an agency that was badly scandal-ridden.

The story noted with surprise that we kept our campaign promise to put the corruption fighters back in charge at GSA.

I think this kind of action and the enormous accomplishments of everyone in this room shows that we intend to do more than talk about the problem of waste and fraud. As I said before, this is a national scandal and we intend to fight it with every resource at our command.

I am pleased to be able to see all of you together here today and I look forward to examining your reports. Be assured that you have my total support and the support of the American people.

Integrity and efficiency in managing Government programs not only saves the Government money, it means better service for those the programs are designed to serve -- the American people.

Thank you for your valuable work. You are a great team and I hope you'll all stay as mean as junkyard dogs when it comes to protecting the taxpayers.

I. PURPOSE

To present the Distinguished Service Medal to Columbia commander Colonel Joe Engle and to Captain Dick Truly.

II. BACKGROUND

Space Shuttle Orbiter Columbia was launched November 12, the first time any space craft has returned to space. You phoned the astronauts November 13 from the Johnson Space Center in Texas.

The Distinguished Service Medal, the highest honor conferred by NASA, is awarded to persons in the federal service who, by distinguished service, ability, or courage, have personally made a contribution representing substantial progress to aeronautical and space exploration in the interests of the U.S. The latest astronauts to receive it were John Young and Robert Crippen.

The astronauts will present you with four gifts: (1) A framed silver medal commemorating the second flight of the Columbia, (2) an American flag carried on the flight, (3) photographs of the mission, and (4) a NASA crew patch designed for the mission.

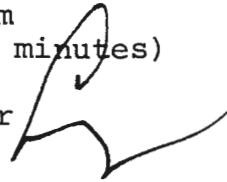

MEETING WITH GRASSROOTS REPUBLICANS -- DECEMBER 7, 1981

It is such a pleasure to have you here today. Over the years I've often mentioned how out of touch Washington is with the rest of the country. We are taking steps with meetings like this to make sure that doesn't happen to us.

Lyn Nofziger told me how much each of you did to make this Administration possible. I want to thank each of you for your past and current support. We appreciate Lyn too. He is leaving the White House next month, but you can be assured that Lyn will only be a phone call away.

Before we start, you should know that we are still optimistic about our economic program. There has been some economic problems; after 20 years of irresponsible Government spending, we didn't expect this job to be easy. Nevertheless, we have made considerable progress, and we expect substantial economic improvement in the last half of 1982.

The inflation rate has gone down; the interest rates have dropped; domestic energy production is up. We have, in short, laid a good foundation. As I said, however, we are experiencing a period of adjustment, and the Democrats are using it to undermine the public's confidence in our program.

You're from every part of the country, and I need to hear your analysis of the public mood. Do Americans want us to move forward and stick with our program, or are we losing public support? Where are we vulnerable? What are our

strengths? With that said and those two questions asked, perhaps one of you would like to say something.

I. PURPOSE

To present a rifle replica and provide recognition for the National Rifle Association.

II. BACKGROUND

"The Texas Army," a component of the National Rifle Association, will present you with a handmade, classic flintlock, muzzle-loading rifle. It is an exact replica of a rifle used 150 years ago and referred to as "Kentucky style," .45 calibre and 42 inches long. The stock was cut from curly maple, carved, stained, hand-rubbed and is with silver furniture. At the end of the visit, you present the rifle on loan to Harlon Carter for public display at the NRA museum.

"The Texas Army" was originally formed at the time of the Texas Revolution in the mid 1830's and deactivated after the Civil War. In 1969, General Carroll Lewis, along with Texas Governor Preston Smith, reactivated the Texas Army under the Governor's commission as a historical and heritage reenactment group. All members are "Colonels," commissioned by the Governor of the State of Texas under the provisions of the Texas State Constitution. They could, in reality, be activated under the Governor's command in an official state crisis.

The group, which helps commemorate various historical events during the year, is volunteer, collects no dues and has no meetings. At this time, there are approximately 105 Colonels under the direct command of the Governor of the State of Texas.

SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS FOR
MEETING WITH THE CORE GROUP

- Express your appreciation for the long and valuable association with these Members, individually and collectively.
- Mention that you are pleased to meet with them as a group again, recalling that the last time such a session took place was little more than a year ago. Acknowledge that much has transpired since then and say that the team spirit and leadership exhibited by them and their Republican colleagues on the budget and tax bills will help bring about vital changes in the economic direction of this nation.
- Mention you would like to hear what they have to say about the direction and goals of the past year and indicate that most importantly, you want to get their collective thoughts on goals and endeavors for the next session of Congress, particularly as we head toward the 1982 elections.
- Lay two items out on the table for starters.
- This week, consideration of the continuing resolution will be stepped up. Say that Tip must have thought he was testing our will two weeks ago

and that you hope that he now believes that you will not accept the "business as usual" standards of the past. Say that you will continue to work for that which is vital to the people of our nation--getting this country economically sound again. Holding firm on spending ceilings for next year is bound to influence the work that must come for '83.

- Foreign assistance authorization and appropriations may be considered on the House floor this week. Tell them that this is your budget request and that it reflects your foreign policy. Tell them that your budget request represents the minimum funding necessary to uphold our credibility and commitments to our allies. Tell them that their assistance is very important for obtaining adequate support from their Republican colleagues to assure passage of foreign assistance legislation.

- Turn to Tom Evans and ask him to lead with comments.
