I. PURPOSE

To respond to Senator Pete Domenici's (R-New Mexico) request for an opportunity to introduce Mr. William Tanner, Editor, Albuquerque Tribune, to the President during a brief photo session.

I. PURPOSE:

To welcome this prestigious group of broadcast executives to the White House, receive an award from them that they were not able to present to you last year (Radio Hall of Fame Award) and make some brief remarks about your European trip and the current economic situation.

II. BACKGROUND:

This group, (and their wives) are in town for their Annual Meeting. They have not been to the White House during your Administration, although they were entertained by Presidents Carter and Ford. They will be briefed by other Administration officials before you arrive in Room 450 (Small, Gergen, Atwater) and will be further briefed by Don Regan as soon as you leave. Last year at their convention in Las Vegas, they inducted you and Kate Smith into the Radio Hall of Fame (joining such others as Jack Benny, Bing Crosby, Bob Hope, Walter Winchell) but were not able to give the award to you because their convention came just weeks after the events of March 30. Their Chairman, Ed Fritts, will present the award to you tomorrow.

V. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS:

After you are announced, you will proceed to the podium where Mr. Ed Fritts, Chairman of the Board, will be standing. He will speak first and present you with the Radio Hall of Fame Award. You will thank him and then give brief remarks and take a few questions from the audience.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON A POSSIBLE QUESITON OF CONCERN TO BROADCASTERS:

It is possible (though remote) that one of the broadcasters could ask you a question about Radio Marti and suggest that in response to this, the Cuban government will increase their interference with U.S. radio signals. The NAB did a study of 187 radio stations that Cuba either has or PLANS TO BUILD and found that:

- --if all were built
- --under ideal conditions
- -- there could be severe interference with U.S. radio stations

However the important points to note are these:

- (1) All of these Cuban radio stations have <u>not</u> been built so the study really exaggerates the situation.
- (2) Cuban radio interference has been going on for 15 years and has nothing to do with Radio Marti.
- (3) Radio Marti is like Radio Free Europe in that it will be a way to inform the Cuban people about what's really going on in the world (we need your support on this)
- (4) Killing Radio Marti would not solve interference problems but could lead to further intrangisence on the part of Cuba.

We are currently backing legislation to implement Radio Marti, there has been some question on the Hill about frequencies, but we are hopful we can resolve Congressional concerns.

Well, thank you very much Eddie. I'm sorry I wasn't available to receive this great award last year. But it's certainly an honor to know you can take your spot in a group with greats like Edward R. Murrow, Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Kate Smith and Bing Crosby.

We're delighted all of you could join us and be here for this briefing. I must say I'm beginning to feel almost as much like a visitor to the White House as you do. It's a little like that old line -- "If this is Tuesday, it must be Belgium."

Something like that happened to us last Wednesday. We arrived in Bonn with German dictionaries, British newspapers, Italian lira, and in a few cases -- some uneaten French cheese. We knew it was getting time to come home.

Let me just repeat something I said when I arrived back at Andrews, because I think it's so important and we tend to lose sight of it. America does have a lot of friends in the world, and we can be proud of our country.

Certainly we encountered demonstrators who didn't agree with our policies. You saw a lot of that. But in every city the streets were lined, wherever we went, with people cheering America and most of them waving American flags. The Europeans understand that our economy will be the engine for world economic

recovery, and our defenses must provide the umbrella for security and the protection of freedom for the West.

And I do think we're making progress. Some of the best news we received in Europe was that responsible Republicans and Democrats had passed a revised bipartisan recovery budget. Now that both the House and the Senate have passed budget resolutions not too dissimilar, we believe the conference committee can reconcile their differences.

The important thing is, responsible Republicans and

Democrats are working together on a plan that puts us on a course
toward declining deficits and getting spending under control -once and for all. Already we're hearing the predictable but
false rhetoric about severely slashing budgets, heaping untold
suffering upon the needy, the old and the disabled.

Well, I think it's about time these people go beyond demagoguery and talk straight with the American public. We have never tried to cut the Federal budget. We are trying to reduce the increases in programs that are escalating out of sight and that will bankrupt this Nation unless we have the courage to act.

Let me just cite the example of medical entitlements, which have been the subject of so much propaganda. How many Americans are aware that this area of the budget had a 16.9 percent average annual growth rate between 1970 and 1980? Now what does the Latta budget, the just-passed House resolution, do to Medicare? Certainly we're led to believe it makes terrible cuts. But if

you look closely, you'll see that under Latta, spending on Medicare will not be cut at all. It will continue to grow by nearly 15 percent a year, which is more than twice the projected rate of inflation.

Crying compassion but then voting for inflation doesn't create jobs, doesn't bring down interest rates and it certainly doesn't help poor families become more self-supporting. Crying compassion but then voting to eliminate the third year of our tax reduction won't help the very people who still haven't had a real tax cut and who need it so badly -- lower and middle-income families.

We're not asking you to support our policies; we are asking you to help us separate fact from fiction and make sure the American people get the facts.

And now, I think I've already talked long enough, so I'd be pleased to try to answer some of your questions in the time we have.
