

I. PURPOSE

Presentation of Presidential Citizens Medal to the "Father of Veterans Day," Raymond Weeks of Birmingham, Alabama, and the occasion for you to make appropriate remarks on Veterans Day.

II. BACKGROUND

Following World War II, Mr. Raymond Weeks headed a small delegation to Washington, D.C. to meet with General Dwight Eisenhower, then Army Chief of Staff. General Eisenhower endorsed the idea of adopting the name "Veterans Day" for the traditional November 11th "Armistice Day."

On November 11, 1947, due to Mr. Weeks' efforts, Birmingham, Alabama held the nation's first "Veterans Day." Seven years later, in 1954, the first national "Veterans Day" was held, pursuant to an Act of Congress.

For 35 years, since 1947, Mr. Weeks has organized the Birmingham Veterans Day, which has been a model for similar celebrations all over the country. Mr. Weeks has received dozens of awards and commendations from all branches of the military service and from veterans and civic groups.

Mr. Weeks is a Democrat and served in the Alabama State Legislature. He was a delegate to Democratic National Conventions in 1952, 1956 and 1960.

10:00 a.m. You arrive and move to podium on raised platform.

You make initial prepared remarks regarding the presentation of the Presidential Citizen's Medal to Mr. Weeks.

You hang the medal on Mr. Weeks and hand him his citation.

10:05 a.m. Mr. Weeks returns to his place and takes his seat.

10:06 a.m. You make the second portion of your prepared remarks.

10:15 a.m. You shake hands of guests in the front row and depart.

9:20 a.m.

Guests begin to arrive the SouthWest Gate, Diplomatic Reception Room. After holding in the Diplomatic Reception Room, they are directed up the back staircase and into the State Dining Room via the Cross Hall to be seated.

9:58 a.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Weeks will go to the stage and take their places.

10:00 a.m.

THE PRESIDENT arrives the State Floor via the elevator and proceeds to the Red Room. He is then announced into the State Dining Room from the south door of the Red Room.

THE PRESIDENT then proceeds into the State Dining Room to the platform and greets Mr. and Mrs. Weeks. THE PRESIDENT then continues to the podium where he will make remarks.

After the initial remarks regarding the award, THE PRESIDENT will be presented the medal by a Social Aide from THE PRESIDENT'S left. THE PRESIDENT will then pin it on Mr. Weeks and shake his hand.

The Weeks then are seated on stage and THE PRESIDENT concludes his remarks at the podium.

10:15 a.m.

Following THE PRESIDENT'S remarks, THE PRESIDENT will shake hands of those seated on the first row as he departs. THE PRESIDENT will exit the south door of the Red Room and continue to the elevator.

Following the departure of THE PRESIDENT, all guests may depart the back staircase, Diplomatic Reception Room.

There will be two buses available at the Diplomatic Reception Room for all guests who wish to be transported to the Arlington Memorial Cemetery for the wreath-laying ceremony, which will take place at 11:00 a.m.
