MEETING WITH THE PRESIDENT'S ECONOMIC POLICY ADVISORY BOARD

January 24, 1983

I. PURPOSE

- A. To review our overall economic policy with emphasis on monetary policy.
- B. To review the U.S. role in the international economy.

II. BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS, AND PRESS PLAN

- A. Background: This is the eighth meeting of your Economic Policy Advisory Board. The Board last met on September 8, 1982.

The meeting will commence at 9:00 a.m. and will begin with a discussion of three papers:

- 1. Monetary Policy and Economic Conditions by Milton Friedman.
- 2. Notes on Budget and Monetary Policy by Paul McCracken.
- 3. U.S. Role in the International Economy by Walter Wriston.

The first two papers are attached and were circulated to Board members yesterday.

Milton Friedman's paper makes two central arguments and raises one crucial question for the future:

- 1. He argues that since August and September, 1982 the Federal Reserve Board has abandoned its practice of pursuing monetary growth targets established in October 1979.

2. The Fed's implementation of policy in 1981 and the first half of 1982 was more restrictive than their targets and contributed to the depth of the current recession. He suggests that the Fed has now abandoned their targets as a result of pressure to stimulate a recovery.
3. Friedman is concerned that the current rate of monetary growth is not sustainable without rekindling inflationary pressures. He poses the question: When and how does the Federal Reserve return to prudent monetary growth? If the Fed's actions are too restrictive this would abort the recovery. If the Fed waits too long we could be back on the inflationary roller-coaster.

Paul McCracken's paper makes three central points:

1. We are in a time when macroeconomic theories of all types seem unable to provide a convincing explanation of what is happening in the economy.
2. The prospect for the future is increasing Federal budget deficits. In 1983 the economy can accommodate a large deficit because we will be in the early stages of a recovery. However, by 1988 deficits of several hundred billion dollars will soak up close to half of all funds raised in credit markets leaving insufficient funds for the investment needed by a growing economy.
3. Despite the imprecision of our macroeconomic theories, it is important that the Administration propose policies that will produce a pattern of declining future budget deficits to a level in 1988 of less than \$100 billion.

Walter Wriston's paper has not yet arrived and will be distributed at the meeting.

Since much of the discussion will involve monetary policy, Preston Martin will join us from the Federal Reserve Board. We invited Paul Volcker, but unfortunately he has a prior commitment outside Washington that he could not break.

I am pleased that one of your number, Alan Greenspan, played such a crucial role in shaping the compromise that was recently announced.
- C. I am also heartened by the inflation news that we got last Friday. It is encouraging that inflation was 3.9 percent for 1982 and actually declined 0.3 in December.
- D. I have had a chance to look at the papers that Milton and Paul prepared and understand that you have spent some time this morning discussing fiscal and monetary policy. I trust this has produced the usual consensus that occurs when a group of economists gets together.

Good evening, and thank you for the great honor you have bestowed on me tonight. I very much wish I could be with you in person, but I appreciate the opportunity to speak with you through this message.

Calvin Coolidge once said that "the Nation which forgets its defenders will be itself forgotten," and I believe his words were right on the mark. All Americans owe a great debt of gratitude and respect to you in the Reserve Officers Association, and to all members of our growing reserve forces. Your sacrifices, your readiness, your dedication to God, country and duty have done much to maintain the security and peace some take for granted. On behalf of your fellow citizens, I thank you.

The United States must never forget that we remain the champion of freedom and the foremost foe of tyranny. Each generation must guard our liberty for the next. You in our reserve forces are playing an ever larger and more important role in our national defense. I want to reaffirm tonight my commitment to keep the reserves adequately manned, equipped, and trained to meet your full responsibility as a combat-ready part of our total force. The reserves are a crucial element of the deterrence which checks our adversaries and keeps the peace.

I know George is with you tonight, so he can fill you in further on our strides and struggles to rebuild our defenses. He will also thank you in person for the tremendous honor you have done me. I will always be proud of the Minuteman Award, and I will strive to live up to the challenge it represents. Thank you again, and thank you for your continued support as we rally the national will to keep safe this last best hope on earth.
