#### MEETING WITH REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

#### I. PURPOSE

To brief the Republican leadership on the recent successful trips of the Vice President and Secretary of State; to discuss the FY 84 budget submitted on January 31 and to review the possible bipartisan compromise on jobs and humanitarian aid.

#### II. BACKGROUND

The President met last with the leadership as a group on January 25, the day of the State of the Union. Many members also attended budget briefings here on January 28 and 31.

Since that time, the Budget, Appropriations, Armed Services, and other Committees have held intensive hearings on our FY 84 budget, having heard testimony from Regan, Stockman, Feldstein, Weinberger, etc.

The Vice President and Secretary of State have undertaken successful missions to Europe and the Far East, and talks have taken place with the House Democratic leadership on a possible compromise on emergency jobs (H. Baker, Michel, Laxalt, and Lott have been consulted throughout this process).

The Senate returned on Monday, February 14, from a week of recess -- the House has been meeting in pro forma session. Little legislation activity is scheduled on either floor this month.

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#### SUGGESTED TALKING POINTS

- -- Too bad this meeting couldn't have taken place yesterday
  -- I could have given each of you a big Valentine!
- -- To begin the meeting, I want to call on the Vice President and George Shultz to highlight the important missions each has just completed. George Shultz is scheduled on the Hill at 10:00 a.m. to testify before Chuck Percy's Foreign Relations Committee, so I'll ask him to lead off.

(After the Secretary of State and the Vice President complete their remarks.)

- -- I want to salute both Georges on jobs well done.
- -- Now want to turn to the FY 84 budget. I have been following with great interest the hearings that have taken place to date.

  I believe our budget freeze and reform plan is and will serve as the framework for legislative action. It is fair, prudent and realistic. And it will accomplish our goal of sustained economic recovery with jobs for all who want to work.
- -- Already there are signs that recovery is beginning and even Marty Feldstein is saying it may be stronger than predicted. To assure this, we must continue to get runaway spending under control to bring federal deficits down.

- -- On another point, let me say that the tone of the defense debate---as I've seen on the network news and the newspapers ---concerns me greatly. There is nothing new or surprising about our defense request. It prudently maintains our program to restore America's defense while not diminishing our ability to negotiate arms reductions or endanger our security.
- -- I fully appreciate Congressional perogatives, but please join me in ensuring that we do not fall back into the past pattern of deferring or underfunding our defense requirements.
- -- Finally, I want to discuss briefly the possible bipartisan compromise on jobs and humanitarian aid. Based on a survey of items that could be accelerated from FY84 to FY83, the staff has met with the Speaker and a few others in the House Democratic leadership. They have been guided by several

Before consultation with you, that we can pass, on a bipartisan basis, a bill quickly that does not contain any

bipartisan basis, a bill quickly that does not contain any make-work jobs but does provide emergency real jobs and humanitarian relief on a on-time basis. The compromise we are discussing is roughly \$4.3 billion plus the extension of unemployment benefits through December, 1983, costing \$2.950 billion.

#### PRINCIPLES FOR POSSIBLE BIPARTISAN COMPROMISE ON JOBS AND HUMANITARIAN AID

- o No "make work" jobs.
- o Impact on multi-year budget deficit should be minimized by rescheduling or accelerating planned or necessary Federal expenditures.
- o Job-generating construction and repair work should be funded from existing multi-year transportation trust fund authorizations, user fees, or Federal agency construction plans currently scheduled for 1984 or later years.
- o <u>Permanent jobs programs</u> focused on long-term recovery or structural problems (e.g. structural unemployment, high technology R&D) should be considered in the FY 1984 Budget Resolution and legislative process.
- o With housing starts up 43% and permits up 75% any housing stimulus measures should be handled through the Budget Resolution and regular appropriations process within the context of overall funding for existing housing aid programs.
- o <u>Humanitarian relief</u> should be provided on a <u>one-time basis</u> through flexible authorities designed to <u>target</u> food, shelter and other in-kind aid to <u>pockets of serious distress</u> where needs are not being adequately addressed by existing Federal assistance programs.
- o Economic recovery is best creator of new jobs. That means we must be united in holding down spending and deficits in coming years.
