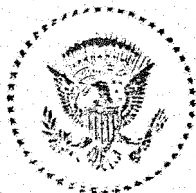

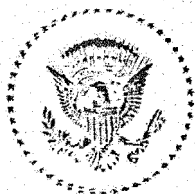

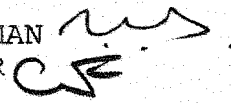

BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON SIX PEACE CORPS VOLUNTEERS

The six Peace Corps Volunteers selected to receive Presidential recognition are:

MICHAEL McKENNA BOLSTER, 25, Princeton, N.J. (Congresswoman Marge Roukema (R) Fifth District) Tulane University BS in architecture. Yemen, 1981-present. Under hardship conditions, has mastered Arabic and several native tongues to conduct accurate water surveys in earthquake-stricken areas of Dhamar as well as full-time job training counterparts to survey, design, draft and install water distribution system.

MADELINE CHORMAN, 72, resident of New York (Congressional district to be determined) MA, Spanish teacher, and BA in English/Business Education; 50 year member of St. Francis of Penance and Christian Charity. Ghana, 1981-present. As Peace Corps Volunteer from 1970 to 1978 in Ghana, she taught business education at St. Mary's Girls Secondary School at Accra, which led to helping establish small businesses including Korle Bu Hospital Service Canteen in 1973. Chorman trained a host country national counterpart to run the canteen before she left in 1978, but when the manager died unexpectedly in 1980, Chorman returned at her own expense and reapplied to the Peace Corps to resume operation. During recent evacuation of Ghanaians from Nigeria, PCV Chorman's Canteen initiated "Food on Wheels" programs to serve free meals to thousands.

JOAN LeCLAIR, 41, Minneapolis, MN (Congressman Bill Frenzel (R) Third District), MA in speech pathology/psychology, University of Minnesota. Malaysia, 1980-present. One of few speech therapists in country, persuaded government to allow training of social workers to be speech therapist, created program, trained officers, wrote manual, evaluated additional training by recent graduates, so as to leave them self-sufficient in speech therapy.

JAMES D. MORRIS, 28, Carmel, CA (Congressman Leon Panetta (D) Sixteenth District) AB, biochemistry, UC-Davis. Guatemala, 1981-present. As an agricultural extension agent, he has at his own initiative created a new mini-station fish center to train 1,000 farmers (and two counterpart technicians) how to raise the fast-growing source of protein, the African tilapia fish, in the remote Olopa, Chiquimula sector where annual incomes average \$240.

KENNETH ROBINSON, 29, Tucson, AR (Congressman Morris Udall (D) Second District) Paraguay, 1980-present. Health and environment sanitation worker, he has also developed a parasite education program, invented an inexpensive hand pump made from local materials, encouraged locals to set up a small business to make different types of latrine floors, well caps, tubes and water catchment devices -- as well as obtaining funding from the Catholic Relief Service to improve latrines and wells in eight rural schools.

MONICA WERNETTE, 31, Clay Center, KS (Congressman Jim Slattery (D) Second District) Washburn University, Topeka, KS; doctoral candidate, public health, Kansas State College. Zaire, 1981 - present. A trained epidemiologist, fluent in French and Lingala (native to Zaire); she has spent weeks in the tropical rain forest pursuing most of the world's known cases of, and all of the known deaths attributable to, the mysterious virus called human monkey pox (a cousin to the more virulent small pox). Praised and written up in World Health Organization journals, her work will continue since, on her own initiative, she has created a training program for her Zairian counterparts.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: PEACE CORPS VOLUNTEER AWARDS
MONDAY, APRIL 18, 1983

This morning, as we begin National Volunteer Week, I am very pleased to honor six fine Americans who have volunteered their time, skills, and experience to the cause of peace. Seldom are we able to point to one person's work and pronounce it not only good and worthwhile, but also a step toward building peace in our time.

Today, we enjoy that good fortune, and we can measure it six-fold. We are honoring six Americans who have dedicated themselves to the cause of peace -- Americans who have travelled, voluntarily, to unfamiliar lands to help citizens of developing nations. I have often spoken about how the spirit of voluntarism moves like a deep and mighty river throughout our own country. I've sensed a real, upbeat joy that Americans feel this spirit is being restored, and they're glad it's getting stronger again.

By the example of these Peace Corps volunteers, people throughout the world can understand that America's heart is strong, and her heart is good. These six builders of peace -- men and women of all ages -- are not shouting in city parks or trying to second-guess our defense planners. They are using their God-given talents and skills to help others. They are pursuing the noble cause of peace by living the meaning of the poet Emerson's words: "The only gift is a portion of thyself." And they are doing this as an engineer, a nun, a medical technician, a speech therapist, a fish farmer, and an

environmentalist with the knack for Yankee ingenuity -- and we salute them all.

I am delighted to welcome Sister Madeline Choreman [CHORE-man], who has come all the way from Ghana to be with us; also the parents and friends of our other distinguished volunteers. You know, the Peace Corps appeals to all ages. There's no upper age limit for volunteers. Many are well into their sixties and seventies, and a few Peace Corps volunteers are over eighty! Our older volunteers are honored for the wisdom they acquired over a lifetime, especially in some of the developing nations where life expectancy is only about 45. And these senior citizen Peace Corps volunteers are having the experience of a lifetime! I hope more of our older Americans will consider joining the Peace Corps to put their experience to work. Maybe I should get my own resume ready for that day when I'm ready to look for my next job. By the way, I'm not quite there yet.

By working to counteract the dreadful effects of poverty, deprivation, and lack of opportunity, Peace Corps volunteers help people become more self-reliant -- they help create peace and opportunity at the grassroots.

All of us hope and pray for peace. America has no higher aspiration. We are working for something never before achieved in any administration -- to go beyond a limitation to an actual reduction in the numbers of strategic weapons. That's one great source of hope. Another is in what these six volunteers do every day.

If each of us could strive to live by their example our world would be a much better and a far safer place.

We applaud these volunteers in their quest for peace, and on behalf of the American people, we thank them during our celebration of National Volunteer Week.

Proposed Remarks For Mrs. Herrington

Thank you, Mr. Attorney General

Mr. President, it is an honor and a pleasure to be with you this afternoon. When you established this Task Force you led the nation into a new era in the treatment of victims of crime. Never before has a President recognized the plight of those forgotten by the Criminal Justice System. It is my privilege to introduce to you five citizens who have given invaluable assistance to your Task Force. They represent hundreds of others who came forward, some at great personal sacrifice, to inform us of the depth of the problem.

BETTY JANE SPENCER

MR. PRESIDENT, I'D LIKE TO INTRODUCE YOU TO A REMARKABLY BRAVE AND DEDICATED WOMAN, MRS. BETTY JANE SPENCER.

IN FEBRUARY OF 1977, FOUR MEN ROBBED THE FAMILY AND MURDERED MRS. SPENCER'S FOUR SONS. MRS. SPENCER SURVIVED THREE SHOTGUN BLASTS HERSELF.

THE RINGLEADER OF THE GROUP WAS ON PAROLE AT THE TIME, AND ALSO ON BAIL FOR A RECENT ARREST. ANOTHER OF THE KILLERS WAS ON BAIL AS WELL.

MRS. SPENCER WENT TO WORK TO IMPROVE THE SYSTEM OF JUSTICE IN HER STATE. AS A RESULT OF HER EFFORTS AND OTHER CITIZENS LIKE HER, MORE THAN 20 LAWS HAVE BEEN CHANGED TO BETTER PROTECT AND ASSIST VICTIMS OF CRIME IN INDIANA.

SHE HAS BEEN A TRUE CHAMPION IN THE CAUSE FOR CRIME VICTIMS AND, I AM PROUD TO INTRODUCE HER TO YOU.

HAROLD TUTHILL

MR. PRESIDENT, I'D LIKE YOU TO MEET MR. HAROLD TUTHILL.

ON JUNE 16 OF LAST YEAR THREE MEN ENTERED THE HOME OF HAROLD AND LILY TUTHILL AND SAVAGELY BEAT THEM BOTH AND ROBBED THEM.

FAST POLICE WORK LEAD TO THE RAPID APPREHENSION OF THE CRIMINALS, BUT THE TRAUMA OF THESE EVENTS HAUNTS THE TUTHILLS. THE CONTINUING FEARS AND FINANCIAL BURDENS RESULTING FROM THE ATTACK FORCED THE TUTHILLS TO MOVE FROM THEIR HOME OF 40 YEARS.

MR. PRESIDENT, MAY I INTRODUCE HAROLD TUTHILL.

ELVUS REGULIA

MR. PRESIDENT I'D LIKE YOU TO MEET ELVUS REGULIA, A CALIFORNIA PHARMACIST WHO WAS BURGLARIZED 6 TIME, HELD UP 3 TIMES, AND TAKEN HOSTAGE ONCE.

FREQUENT COURT DELAYS AND CONTINUANCES RESULTED IN LOST INCOME AND NO PROGRESS AGAINST HIS ATTACKERS. EVENTUALLY, THE FINANCIAL DRAIN ON HIS BUSINESS, COUPLED WITH AN INCREASING FEAR FOR HIS PERSONAL SAFETY, FORCED MR. REGULIA TO SELL THE PHARMACY HE HAD OWNED AND OPERATED FOR 24 YEARS.

HE IS CURRENTLY EMPLOYED AS A PHARMACIST AT SAN QUENTIN PRISON. DURING HIS TESTIMONY BEFORE OUR TASK FORCE, MR. REGULIA SAID, "THOUGH I RUB ELBOWS WITH MURDERS AND OTHER CONVICTS NOW, I STILL FEEL SAFER THAN THE PHARMACIST WHO SERVES THE PUBLIC."

MR. PRESIDENT, MAY I INTRODUCE MR. ELVUS REGALIA.

GERALDINE STRONG

MR. PRESIDENT, I'D LIKE YOU TO MEET MRS GERALDINE STRONG,
A VICTIM OF CRIME WHOSE INJURIES WERE MAGNIFIED BY THE
CALLOUS TREATMENT AFFORDED HER BY THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE
SYSTEM.

MRS. STRONG WAS KIDNAPPED AT GUNPOINT, RAPED, ROBBED AND
THREATENED WITH DEATH DURING A HORRIBLE THREE-HOUR PERIOD.
MRS. STRONG'S ASSAILANT WAS ARRESTED AT THE SCENE OF THE
CRIME, HE WAS NOT BROUGHT TO TRIAL FOR A YEAR.

MRS. STRONG TOLD YOUR TASK FORCE THAT, "MY DISILLUSIONMENT
WITH THE JUDICIAL SYSTEM IS MANY TIMES MORE PAINFUL THAN
THE ATTACKS ON ME."

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: NATIONAL CRIME VICTIMS WEEK
MONDAY, APRIL 18, 1983

Attorney General Smith, Mrs. Lois Herrington, ladies and gentlemen. Standing here in the Rose Garden, listening to these dreadful stories of senseless brutality, seems almost unreal, but for far too many of our citizens the threat of violent crime is all too real.

I would like to thank you, Mrs. Blackwell, Mrs. Strong, Mrs. Spencer, Mr. Regalia, and Mr. Tuthill, as well as all the citizens who have come forward to help us come to grips with this very serious problem. You have acted in the highest tradition of our country. By your courage and selflessness you have done your Nation a great service.

I think the time has come when we, as a free people, should face up to some hard decisions about crime.

The crime epidemic that has spread throughout our country is no uncontrollable disease, much less an irreversible tide. Nor is it some inevitable sociological phenomenon traceable to urbanization or modern society. It is, instead, and in large measure, a cumulative result of too much emphasis on the protection of the rights of the accused and too little concern for our Government's responsibility to protect the lives, homes, and rights of our law-abiding citizens. We should be proud that our criminal justice system protects the constitutional rights of the accused; but over the past few years that system has allowed the safeguards protecting the rights of the innocent to be torn

away. This has so complicated the system, clogged our courts, and reduced the chances of conviction -- as well as the level of punishment once a criminal is convicted -- that the criminal element now calculates that crime really does pay.

The suffering of these victims we've met today -- and millions of others as well -- is testimony to the inequity and the inadequacy of today's justice system. Our Task Force on Victims of Crime called the neglect and mistreatment of crime victims a national disgrace. I heartily agree. What we've got to do now is move forward to correct this disgrace, and at the same time to clear away the roadblocks that prevent the authorities from doing their job. But we need your help. Prompt enactment of our anti-crime package, particularly the bail reform and sentencing provisions, is needed to protect victims from criminals. The voice of the people must be heard in the Congress.

It will take time and hard work to undo the distortions of our criminal justice system that brought on this wave of crime, but, under Attorney General Smith's leadership, we are moving on these tough questions.

Finally, while Washington is a vital part of tackling the problem, it will also take the coordinated efforts of people in State and local government, and in every walk of life, to get this situation under control. Without action at the State and local level, our Federal efforts can achieve little. Ultimately, if we are to succeed, each of us, as citizens, must do his or her part; not only through contacting elected officials -- though

that always helps -- but also by watching out for our friends, our families, and our communities.

Crime prevention is no longer just a job for the police. Every level of government, and Americans everywhere, must take an active part. Many neighborhoods have a crime watch program. I would hope that more and more of our citizens take the time and effort to get involved.

So thank you all for what you are doing. Together I'm confident that we can begin to make America safe again.

To respond to a request by Senator Helms for a meeting with the NCAA Basketball Champions from North Carolina State University.

II. BACKGROUND

With one second remaining, the North Carolina State Wolfpack won the NCAA basketball championship 54-52 over the heavily favored University of Houston Cougars. N.C. State entered the national championship with a season record of 26-10, thus becoming the first team to win the national championship with double-digit losses. Houston had a season record of 31-3.

N.C. State was ahead 33-25 at halftime, fell behind 37-44 with eight minutes left and went on to win in the final seconds.

This meeting was scheduled for the most recent Congressional hour. However, a NCAA rule prohibited the team from traveling to Washington for this purpose. Senator Helms has suggested as an alternative an exchange between the President and the team by satellite communication.

SUNDAY, MONDAY 18, 1983

Hello to all of you in Raleigh. I wanted to send my personal congratulations to Coach Valvano and all of you on the North Carolina State University basketball team for your heartstopping win over the University of Houston. And my congratulations as well to all of the North Carolina State fans, two of whom are with me here today -- Senator East and Senator Helms.

You know I used to do play-by-plays of football and baseball games when I worked as a radio sports announcer in Iowa. It's the excitement and fun of games like the one you played in Albuquerque that were the best games to cover. The tension and hopes were so thick you could feel them in the air.

So, for historical purposes, what I thought I might do is recreate the game as I would one of those old games I used to broadcast. This is the way it would go:

"Alright, the seconds are ticking down here at University Arena in Albuquerque. North Carolina State better pull something out. The score is 52-52 with seconds to go. Everyone knows they're waiting to give the ball to Whittenburg. Oh, oh, Thurl Bailey has the ball in the corner. They could be in trouble. They better get it out of there sportsfans. Bailey keeps his cool, tosses it to Whittenburg, seconds to go. Whittenburg's got it, he's right above the key, he shoots, but it's not going to make it, it's going short. Oh, oh, Lorenzo Charles under the

rim, DUNKS IT, DUNKS IT, HE SLAMS IT DOWN THERE WITH ONE SECOND REMAINING. THE CROWD IS GOING CRAZY, THEY'RE ON THEIR FEET. THAT'S THE GAME. WHAT A GAME. THE NORTH CAROLINA WOLFPACK HAS BEATEN THE HEAVILY FAVORED HOUSTON COUGARS FOR THE NCAA BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP. THIS IS A GAME THAT'S GOING DOWN IN THE HISTORY OF BASKETBALL."

That's the way I would have covered it. But you really should be proud of your accomplishments and I want to thank those responsible for making this satellite transmission possible so I could convey my congratulations.

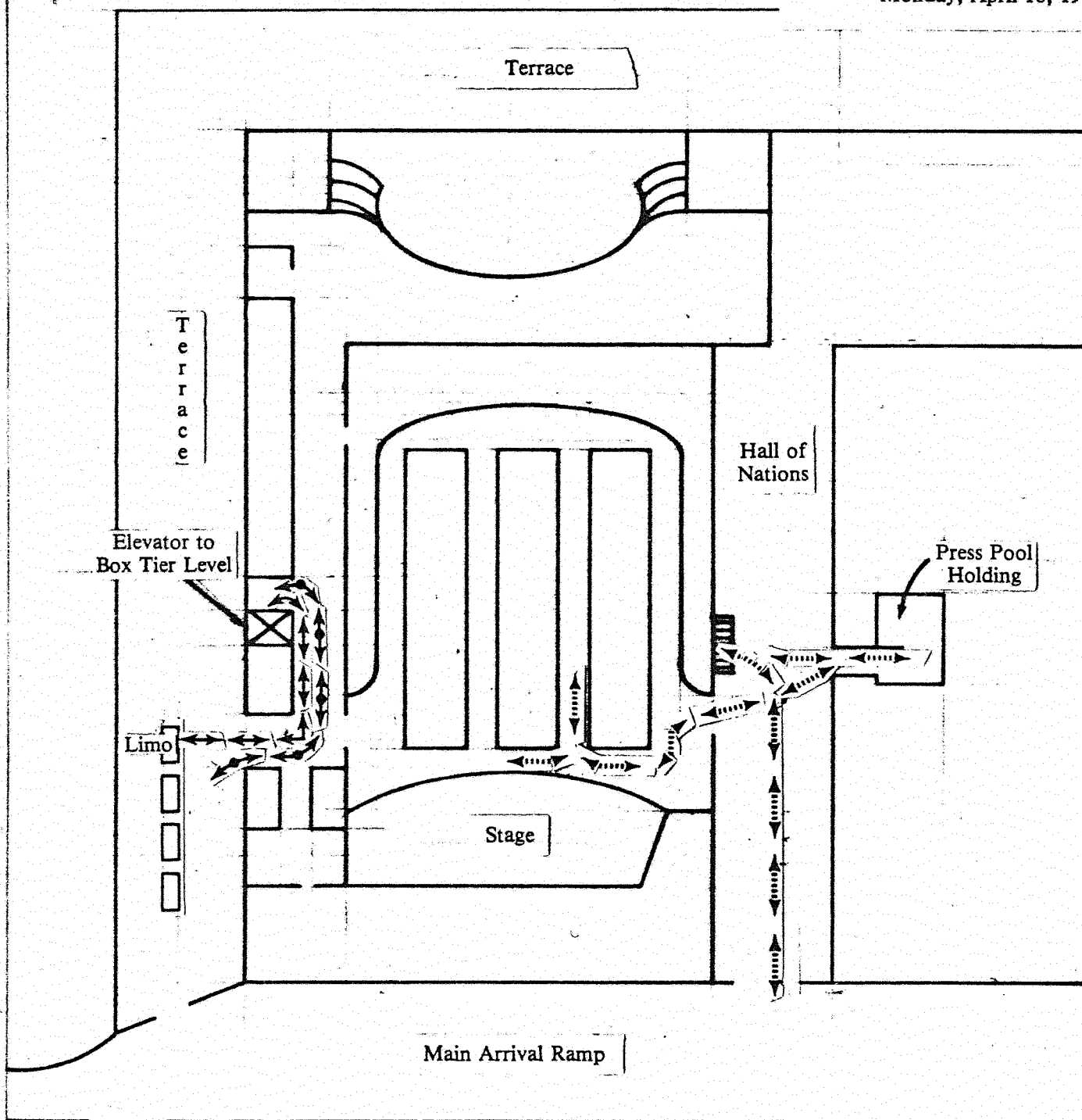

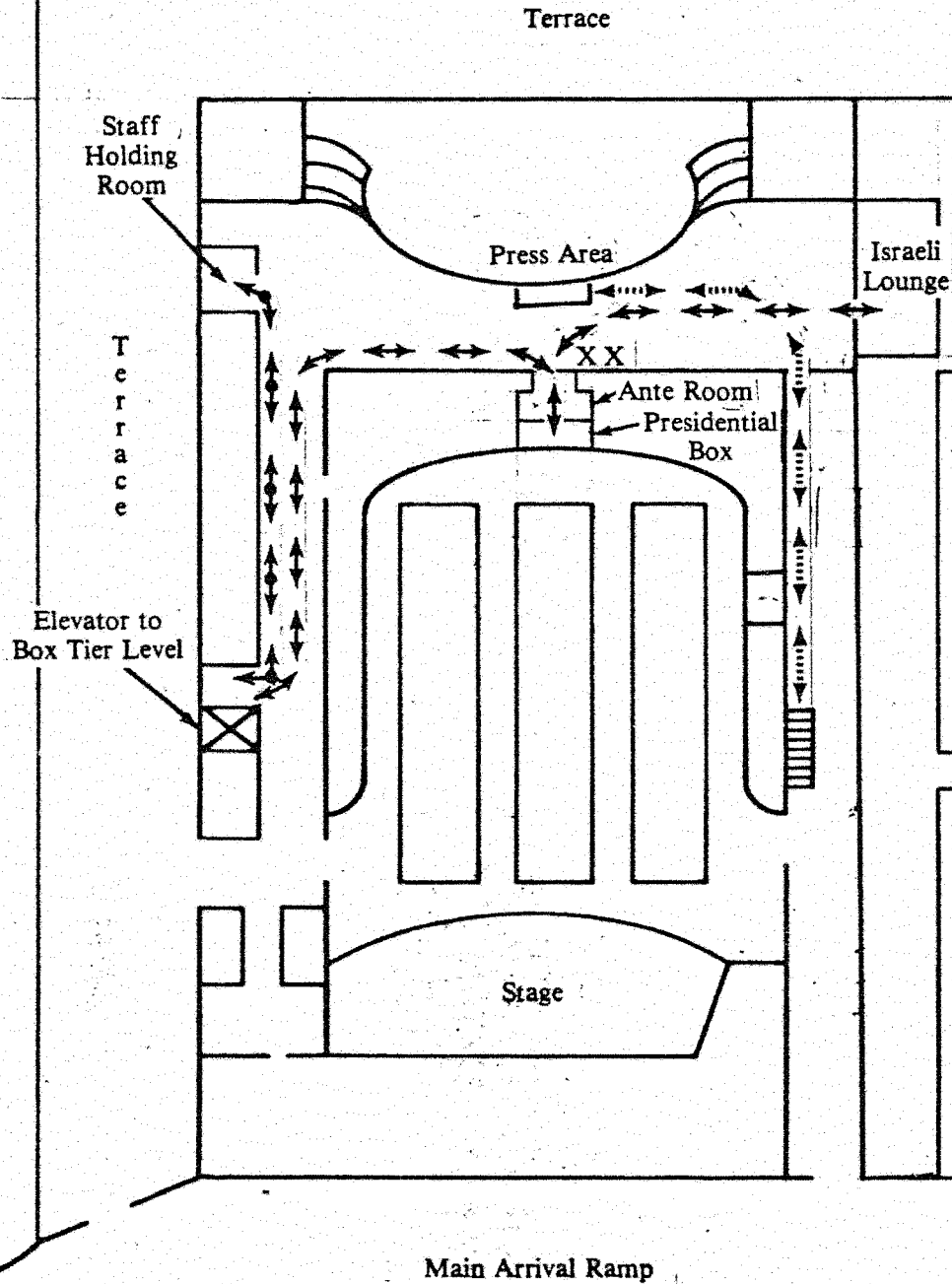
