I. PURPOSE

To discuss your Strategic Defense Initiative.

II. BACKGROUND

Senator Malcolm Wallop is the foremost advocate of your Strategic Defense Initiative announced in your televised speech on March 23, 1983. After your speech, Wallop introduced a Senate Resolution to facilitate the program you outlined in your speech. He has argued eloquently for a shift in strategy from one relying on offensive nuclear weapons to one that relies on defensive systems for basic national security. Wallop wrote you a letter on April 5 (copy attached) congratulating you for your initiative and suggesting that he would like to work with you on the necessary follow-on actions to demonstrate the resolve expressed in your speech.

Wallop is likely to make three suggestions:

- 1) Formation of a new organization for strategic defense that will consolidate current technology activities conducted by several different organizations within the Department of Defense and the Department of Energy. It is possible that he may suggest former Senator Jack Schmitt or other individuals to head up the new organization;
- 2) He may recommend that you appeal directly to the aerospace industry for suggestions on implementing your policy; and
- 3) Increase FY 84 funding by approximately \$280 million focused primarily on chemical lasers which Wallop feels will provide the nation with a near term BMD capability.

At this juncture, it would probably be unwise to commit to specific organization realignments until these have been studied further. However, consolidation of R&D efforts on ballistic missile defense related programs is a good one and should be pursued. NSC is currently investigating potential organization changes, and we would be glad to work with Wallop in formulating specific actions. There is also a good deal of merit in the idea of appealing to the aerospace industry. On the funding level increase for FY 84, it would be premature to endorse a specific increase, but we are sympathetic with quickly defining the necessary funding level to expedite BMD related technology.

Dear Mr. President:

Above all, I want to thank you, and to congratulate you, for your speech of Wednesday March 23. When you laid before the American people the prospect of safety to be gained by our own military efforts, the moral and strategic bankruptcy of the "freeze" movement became apparent to many. I was heartened to see in your speech a recognition of the fact that the military strategy our country has been following since the days of Robert MacNamara is fundamentally flawed, not only in a military sense but in a political and moral sense as well. The anti-military movement in the West is a direct consequence of a strategy that does not make sense. You raised the prospect of changing all that.

I am writing to suggest that, having raised that prospect, the country can ill afford to see it falter. It really must be realized reasonably quickly. If your initiative is allowed to degenerate into vague promises about the indefinite future, it will be wholly discredited. The high-ranking Administration officials who, no sooner had you finished speaking, rushed to tell the press that nothing will or can happen except long-range R&D, are striking at the very heart of your initiative and of your credibility. Your opponents are already calling you crazy, claiming that what you propose can't be done. They must be shown to be wrong, or people will soon believe them. They are factually wrong. I have studied this field much longer than most of your aides, and can tell you unequivocally that we can put a missile-killing laser in orbit in this decade and possibly before the end of your second term. Three years ago the Carter Administration unequivocally declared we had an option to put a laser weapon in orbit by late 1987. They chose not to. Unfortunately some in your Administration have been even less friendly to the space laser program than Jimmy Carter's advisors.

As you know, for the past four years I have urged that we build a space laser weapon and modify our strategy in the ways that you have suggested. Two of my amendments to this effect have passed the Senate. The one last year stipulated that this be done within the decade. Last week Senator Paul Laxalt and I introduced a resolution, S. Res. 100, supporting you and urging you to give us the budgetary plans to build space-based defenses as quickly as possible. We hope for your strong public support.

Mr. President, I am urging a program that will bear fruit in the short as well as in the long term, not only because I believe it is possible, best for the nation as a whole, and politically essential. I, as one of your best supporters, as an advocate of defense, and Senator from Wyoming call on you with a sense of genuine urgency to develop a reasonably near-term program for Ballistic Missile Defense. As you know, what's left of the MX, and probably its successor, will come to Wyoming not alone because of geography and geology but because we are a state that will have them. We are that way not only because our people are traditionally sober and patriotic but also because Wyoming has never been worked over by the opposition. That cannot last. No doubt the opposition's organizers and money will flow into Wyoming. Each of our citizens will be asked again and again: "What good are these new missiles going to do you?, Aren't you worried by the fact that in a crisis, several thousand warheads are going to be coming your way?, Why are you willing to be "ground zero" in order to threaten Russians on behalf of the whole United States?, Why do you think the U.S. government considers you expendable?," and so on.

I must be able to tell my friends back home, and other Americans who look at us in Wyoming, that the new missiles going in are the kind that, if used, would destroy the Soviets' own missiles - that is, that every missile we fired would make sure that a goodly number of Soviet warheads would not be coming our way. I'd also like to be able to tell them that the U.S. government does not consider them - or any other U.S. citizen - expendable and that, along with offensive missiles, we will be seeing defensive systems being deployed as well. Everyone knows that there has never been and never will be a perfect defense. We cannot let that argument deter us from proceeding. But I'd like to be able to tell them that should a moderate number of warheads

be heading not for the missiles but for any one of our cities, we'd stand a good chance of shooting them down. I'd like to be able to tell them that, within this decade, our government will have a laser weapon in orbit, and that soon thereafter we will have enough such weapons to make attacks by ICBMs and SLBMs unfeasible.

Unfortunately, Mr. President, I can't now tell my friends back home that the U.S. government has coherent plans for doing any of these things. Our new offensive missiles are not going in with the kind of warhead - or in the kind of numbers - needed for a serious counterforce job. We are not building, much less deploying, the kind of defensive missiles that could offer protection against the kind of light attacks that most non-missile targets might receive. As for lasers, your Administration has reduced the scope of the Carter Administration's already insufficient plans. Despite votes of 91-3 and 100-0 in the Senate in favor of laser weapons, your defense planners have actually been taking us backwards in this field. When Mr. MacFarlane tells the press, "We're not talking about space, only a little research," I cringe. That's why for months I have been pondering what I would tell my friends and neighbors back home when they asked: "What good are these new missiles going to do for the country - and for us in particular?"

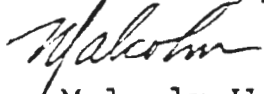
Now, thank God, you have said clearly and convincingly that the first responsibility of government is the physical protection of the population. But the plans for protecting Wyoming and the rest of the country still aren't there. If some in your Administration have their way, I still won't have much to say to my constituents to counter the attack which the left will wage in Wyoming.

We should be laying out a program akin to the one which put us on the moon: each month and each year the country should know it's getting close to the goal of safety.

We should put people in charge of this program who are unambiguously committed to its earliest possible success. The program should prepare for producing and orbiting the weapons even as they are developed, and should vigorously pursue second, and third-generation systems.

Mr. President, to the extent you deem it worthwhile, I would be honored to work with you on these matters.

Meeting with Senator WallopTalking Points

- Thank you for your strong support in the Senate on my Strategic Defense Initiative. I especially appreciate your resolution of support. Your continued leadership will be extremely important in rallying endorsement of the Administration's program once it is formulated.
- I know you have some specific recommendations on actions that we should pursue to follow up my March 23 speech. Please tell me about them.

FYI: We expect Senator Wallop to recommend: (1) new organization for strategic defense; (2) that you appeal directly to aerospace industries for suggestions; (3) increased 1984 funding.
- Following Senator Wallop's recommendations, you should note: I have directed a major interagency study to provide me with recommendations on how best to proceed with a vigorous ballistic missile defense program. This study will be completed by October 1, 1983. The study effort, under Paul Thayer, will produce two products: the technology plan and study implications. Also, the study will recommend necessary additional funding required for FY 84 and FY 85 for my review in June 1983. The study, however, is not currently chartered to provide recommendations on organizational structure and your suggestions in this area will be greatly appreciated.

- I am favorably inclined toward your recommendations on consolidation, but at this juncture we are not able to commit to specific organizational realignments. Your recommendation to appeal directly to aerospace contractors has merit.
- We look forward to working closely with you in pursuing our common objectives. Thank you very much for coming down.

Talking Points on New Start Guidance

- o Yesterday, I met with the National Security Council to review our approach to the START negotiations in light of the Scowcroft Commission Report. You may be interested in knowing that Brent Scowcroft was present at that meeting as was Dr. William Graham, Chairman of the General Advisory Council on Arms Control and Disarmament.
- o As a result of that meeting and, as a result of extensive consultations with all of you and other members of Congress, I intend to make some changes in our START position. I believe that the Scowcroft Commission Report and the accompanying increase in bipartisan consultation and support now give us an opportunity to press for movement in the negotiations.
- o We will remain committed to our objective of equitable and verifiable agreements which provide a stable balance at reduced levels of arms, and we will continue our focus on the most destabilizing systems. Thus, consistent with the Scowcroft Report, we will still seek to limit ballistic missile warheads to 5000 on each side and we will continue to seek constraints on the destructive power and potential of ballistic missiles.
- o With respect to a limit on the number of deployed ballistic missiles, I am following the recommendation of the Scowcroft Commission and will direct that the U.S. relax its current proposal for a limit of 850 on deployed ballistic missiles.
- o Furthermore, with respect to limitations on destructive capability and potential, we recognize that there may be more than one way to achieve our objectives. Therefore, I am giving Ambassador Rowney the flexibility to explore all appropriate avenues for meeting our goals.
- o The process of negotiating with the Soviet Union is not easy, but I believe that if we can continue a bipartisan approach to arms control and defense programs, we will be successful. You will have my cooperation, but I will need your help.

TALKING POINTS

On the Williamsburg Economic Summit

- The Williamsburg Economic Summit was a clear success from our viewpoint and, I believe, for all the participants.
- Our meeting showed a spirit of confidence, optimism, and certainty -- confidence that recovery is underway, optimism that it will be durable, and certainty that economic policy and security ties among us will be strengthened in the future.
- All agreed, in the joint declaration on economic recovery issued at the close of the summit, that "we must all focus on achieving and maintaining low inflation, and reducing interest rates...(and) renew our commitment to reduce structural budget deficits, in particular, by limiting the growth of expenditures."
- The need now is to maintain the momentum of the constructive spirit that emerged from the Williamsburg discussions and translate our commitment to progress into appropriate legislative action.
- We must tackle budget deficits, and we must do it by limiting the growth of government expenditures.
- We must oppose quick fixes of protectionism (such as legislation along lines of Local Content Rule).

- We need to strengthen the IMF (World Bank) as means of providing adequate resources to meet compelling needs of the developing countries; goal is a 47% increase in IMF quotas, of which U.S. share would total \$8.5 billion (\$5.8 for Bank, \$2.7 contribution for General Borrowing Arrangements).
- We must move further in the direction of bringing the domestic economic policies of the Summit countries into convergence, which will improve prospects for stable, non-inflationary growth.
- Now, I'd like to ask Don Regan to share his observations of the Summit with you.

I. PURPOSE

To congratulate the 76'ers team and organization for winning the 1983 NBA World Championship.

II. BACKGROUND

The 76ers have come close to winning the NBA Championship several times, having been bridesmaids to the champions in 1977 (Portland), 1980 and 1982 (Los Angeles). After their loss to the Portland Trailblazers in 1977, they told the Philadelphia Sixer fans, "we owe you one" and finally after six years they were able to pay their debt. They paid the debt in grand style, thrilling the Philadelphia fans with a 65 - 17 season, and an almost flawless playoff of 12 - 1 which established a new NBA record.

Led by "Dr. J" (Julius Erving) and "Moses" (Moses Malone), who became the team's prophet, predicting a 70 win regular season and a sweep of the playoffs 4-4-4, the "Sixers" became an awesome combination of strength and finesse, which overpowered team after team.

People thought that the owner, Harold Katz, had made a mistake by paying \$2.2 million per year for Moses Malone, but the team's success has silenced all critics. Moses had truly delivered his team to the NBA Championship and was named the League's Most Valuable Player.

Championships are not new to some members of the team. Dr. J had won two previous championships in the American Basketball Association (ABA) and 76ers coach, Billy Cunningham (Billy C) was a team member of the 1966 - 67 Sixers title team, but the NBA title has been Dr. J's and Billy C's quest for seven years and the sweet taste of victory will be savored.

Thank you very much and welcome to the White House. It is a real pleasure to play host to a team and a basketball family that have come to symbolize America at its best. With your dogged determination, your high style, your fierce competitiveness and your great talent, you have given new meaning to the "Spirit of '76."

You came so close to winning the championship so many times before, others might have become frustrated. But none of you gave up. Your owner, Harold Katz, was determined to do whatever it took to gather the best players into his club. Your coach, Billy Cunningham, played on the last Philadelphia championship team, so he had the vision. But the players -- you are the ones who put it all together with your individual effort and team spirit. I know Dr. "J" and Moses Malone -- "Mr. Four, Four, Four" -- are two of your brightest stars, but it took every one of you pulling together to make this dream come true.

Your regular season was nothing but awesome -- 65 wins with only 17 losses, and your performance in the playoffs set a new NBA record. I think Coach Riley of the Lakers put it best when he likened your playoff style to "controlled fury." After all, he should know since he was on the receiving end.

I. PURPOSE

To meet with education leaders to discuss implementation of the recommendations of the National Commission on Excellence in Education.

II. BACKGROUND

Representatives from the American Federation of Teachers, the National School Boards Association, the American Association of School Administrators and the Council of Chief State School Officers have been invited to meet with you to discuss the following topics.

1. Implementation of the recommendations of the National Commission on Excellence in Education.
2. The Master Teacher/Merit Pay concept.
3. The potential of a meeting with a larger group.

Secretary Bell has suggested that you make the following points:

- The Commission report will only have value to the extent that the recommendations are implemented. Do our guests have any ideas on what we should do to make certain that the recommendations are acted on by those responsible for our schools?
- We want to preserve local and parental responsibility for education but the recommendations show that this has not been working very well. You might want to ask the President and Executive Director of the National School Boards Association to advise us as to how we might effectively appeal to local school boards.

- A critical problem identified in the report relates to the fact that we are not attracting into and holding enough of the Nation's top talent in the teaching profession. We think that the Master Teacher idea has great promise to make teaching more attractive. You might ask Al Shanker of the American Federation of Teachers if he thinks his organization could be persuaded to support this concept.
- We have high hopes that the findings and recommendations of the Commission could lead to some very significant improvements in American education. How can we exert Federal leadership to bring this about?
- We want to meet with a larger group sometime soon. Could our guests suggest who should be invited?

o The American Federation of Teachers (Affiliate of AFL-CIO)

- . Albert Shanker, President of AFT
He has expressed "an interest" in the Master Teacher concept. They have not made a commitment, but they have agreed to "explore it further." Membership of AFT is about 560,000 teachers.
- . Patrick Daly, Vice President of AFT
He is a member of the Executive Council and Chairman of the Education and Research Committee.

o The National School Boards Association (NSBA)

- This organization serves the local school boards across the Nation, which includes the boards of some 16,000 school districts.

He will serve for 1983-84. Dr. Barton is superintendent of schools in Blue Spring, Missouri--a suburb of Kansas City.

He will be helpful in block grants and Master Teacher. Like others, he opposes tuition tax credits.
 - . Dr. Paul B. Salmon, Executive Director
He was formerly the superintendent of schools in Sacramento.

He opposes tuition tax credits. He will support us on Master Teacher/Merit Pay. He generally favors more Federal aid and Federal involvement in education, but we have made some progress in getting his support of block grants.

o The Council of Chief State School Officers (CCSSO)

This is the organization of the State superintendents of public instruction from the 50 States.

- . Dr. Calvin M. Frazier, Elected President of CCSSO

Dr. Frazier is the Commissioner of Education for the State of Colorado. His one-year term expires in November of 1983.

We can count on their support on most of the recommendations of the National Commission on Excellence.
