MONDAY, JUNE 27, 1983

First of all, Nancy and I want to wish all of you a pleasant and enjoyable holiday on this glorious Fourth of July.

As we enjoy the parades and picnics -- and the ball games -- we should also pause to reflect on the meaning of this day and on the indomitable spirit that's been the driving force behind America's greatness. And nowhere is this spirit more evident than in the American willingness to volunteer -- to give our neighbors a hand when we're needed.

That's the spirit behind a program I want to tell you about -- the Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program, a Federally-sponsored volunteer program that encourages successful Vietnam veterans across the country to volunteer their time, effort and creative leadership to help solve the problems still faced by some of their fellow veterans.

The biggest problem addressed by these volunteers is in the area of unemployment. Millions of young Americans served proudly and well in Vietnam, giving up years of their lives to answer the country's call. They came home to an indifferent welcome and difficult economic times. The Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program helps address this problem by forging a partnership between State and local leaders and the private sector -- and especially the business community.

This partnership is exemplified by the support and cooperation of organizations like the Atlanta Braves and people like its President, Ted Turner.

You know, in Washington, D.C., and throughout the country, memorials honoring Vietnam veterans have been and are being built. These memorials are an important way for the American people to say thanks to our veterans. But there is no greater contribution Americans can make than to insure that each and every Vietnam veteran has a real opportunity to obtain employment. At this point, I want to ask employers in your State to join with the Georgia Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program and other leadership programs across the country to make sure that Vietnam veterans have a living memorial -- a chance to put their discipline, loyalty and experience to work in a worthwhile job.

In closing, I would like to thank you all for your part in honoring the men and women who served so nobly and well during the Vietnam conflict -- the men and women we remember this Fourth of July.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: GENERAL FOURTH OF JULY MESSAGE
MONDAY, JUNE 27, 1983

My fellow Americans, today we join together to celebrate freedom's birthday. America is 207 years old. That makes us the oldest living democracy on earth.

I think there's a good reason for that. It's always been my belief that by a divine plan, this Nation was placed between the two oceans, to be sought out and found by those with a special brand of courage and love of freedom.

Can we imagine the courage it took, back in 1620, to pick up family, bid goodbye to friends, board those small ships, and set sail across a mighty ocean toward a new future in an unknown world?

Can we appreciate what the patriots endured, in that bone-cold snow at Valley Forge, when they spent a winter without enough food, or medicine or even boots to cover their feet?

Maybe we can't. Maybe we look around our more comfortable world of 1983 and say, "That's more than we've known or could endure."

But look closer, look in our neighborhoods and families, and you'll see: America is still a land of heroes, with all the courage and love of freedom there ever was before. And that's our best hope for the future.

We've seen our heroes at Normandy, Bastogne, Guadalcanal and Pork Chop Hill. We saw the battlefield valor of a Roy Benavidez; we saw the agony of our POW's, inside prison camps in North

Vietnam. We held our breath, then rejoiced and cried when they finally came home, kissed the ground and thanked God they were free.

We're a melting pot. And our body and spirit have never been stronger or richer, thanks to hundreds of thousands of new heroes: brave men, women, and children who risked death to escape their communist prisons in Asia and Cuba. They arrived less than 10 years ago. Most were not able to speak a word of English. But with their courage and faith they brought unbounded determination to work, produce, succeed and excel. Now, more and more of them are becoming leaders in their communities: small business owners, hard-working taxpayers, even a valedictorian in her high school graduating class. We can be proud and thankful that they're joining us today, in parades, ball games and backyard barbeques, as young members of an old family.

We can salute the heroes of our technological age, like the four-man, one-woman crew of the Challenger: They dazzled America and the world with another perfect mission into the new frontier of space.

And how can we ignore the countless, other examples of courage, and love of neighbor, from everyday Americans: people like that grandmother in New York who collared a robber and gave him the back of her hand until the police arrived; people all across the country, who have been battling angry spring floods and rising rivers, so they could save the property, and maybe the lives, of their families and friends.

Don't let anyone tell us that America's best days are behind her, that the American spirit has been lost. I've never felt stronger than I do now that our people are coming together, and that America is moving forward again. I've never been more convinced that fundamental problems of the economy, education and national defense, neglected for too many years, are now being addressed and can be solved.

They will be solved, if we believe in each other and in those values that make us a great and loving people.

Think about it: We work and educate for freedom, for service to the ideal of liberty, not for subservience to the state. Our notion of education is the most revolutionary idea conceived by mankind. When our scholars and teachers learn something new, they can't wait to teach it to our children. But in a totalitarian country, you're not allowed to read books or discuss ideas that aren't approved by censors. You're not allowed to have a computer in your home, because you might obtain information or knowledge that would make you a threat to the state.

Let us remember, this July 4th, that America's revolution remains unique because it's changed the very concept of government. We are the Nation which proudly announced to the world: we are conceived in liberty; each of us is created equal with God-given rights; and power ultimately resides in "we the people."

We the people have only begun to write a great story that will be passed down through time -- the story of America. I'm

reminded of a verse I once read about Old Glory. The red, white and blue is a testament to the unity and patriotism of our people, and to the deep love and commitment we have for our country, our freedom, and our way of life. The verse was written as if the flag was speaking to us now and for generations to come.

The flag
It said, "I am whatever you make me, nothing more. I am your belief in yourself, your dream of what a people may become. I am the day's work of the weakest man and the largest dream of the most daring. I am the clutch of an idea and the reasoned purpose of resolution. I am no more than you believe me to be and I am all that you believe I can be. I am whatever you make me, nothing more."

Happy fourth of July, and may God bless America.

PRESIDENTIAL TAPING: U.S.-PHILIPPINE FRIENDSHIP DAY
MONDAY, JUNE 27, 1983

Greetings to all of you in the Philippines. I'm delighted to join Ambassador Armacost in saluting the Philippines on this day, which is very special to Americans -- the Fourth of July.

207 years ago one of history's important moments occurred when a small band of patriots meeting in Philadelphia committed their lives, fortunes, and honor to obtaining freedom and American independence.

July 4th, however, honors not only America's independence but Philippine and American friendship. And it is very meaningful to us in the United States that you celebrate our friendship on this special day.

This friendship is esteemed by us in the United States. It is a friendship that has left a mark on both our countries. The three-quarters of a million persons of Filipino heritage who now reside in the U.S. add enormously to the rich diversity of American society. In return, we like to think we've contributed to your tradition of free public education, your institutions of government, and your free enterprise system. Of course, together, during World War II, Filipinos and Americans fought side-by-side in defense of freedom.

Today, as in the past, both our nations face strong challenges. As allies, we stand by our mutual commitments to deal with these challenges -- whether they are in economic cooperation or in meeting the external threat in Asia and the

Pacific. We have just strengthened our mutual security ties through the successful review of our Military Bases Agreement -- an example of how old friends can cooperate.

On this special day it's fitting that Americans reflect on their past -- and celebrate the birth of their Nation. It's appropriate also that Filipinos and Americans reaffirm the warm relations between our two countries, and re-commit ourselves to the principles which we both hold dear.

On this occasion Nancy and I are pleased to send our personal greetings to President and Mrs. Marcos -- and to all people of the the Philippines.

Mabuhay [ma-BOO-hi] and best wishes.
