What are the prospects unemployment will continue to be reduced in the next several months? Will inflation remain low?

What role do you foresee for the federal government to improve the quality of education in America?

When can we expect an announcement that you will run for re-election?

I. PURPOSE

To be interviewed by Merv Griffin for his television program, which will air Tuesday, September 27, 1983.

II. BACKGROUND

This interview will encompass an entire program of "The Merv Griffin Show" and will be in the format of "a visit with the President".

It is an opportunity to discuss the more personal aspects of the Presidency. The First Lady will also participate at the end of the interview.

Following introductions, the President and Mr. Griffin will be seated on the couch and chair, respectively. The interview will run approximately 50 minutes. The First Lady will then be interviewed along with the President during the final 10 minutes.

INTERVIEW WITH MERV GRIFFIN - OUTLINE OF QUESTIONS

- o Do you feel you have taken on the Presidency at one of the most challenging times in American history?
- o It's clear that a President is juggling any number of crises each day. How do you set a priority list?

FOREIGN ISSUES

- o Will the Korean Airline incident change your negotiating approach on everything with the Russians? Is there more to the incident that we haven't heard yet? In light of this, will Soviets be welcome at 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles?

Soviets do not seem impressed with any sanctions imposed on them. What's next?

Can Soviet expansionism be stopped?

Are the Soviets the toughest negotiators you've faced in or out of office? NOTE: The President had once told Mr. Griffin a story that, as President of Screen Actors Guild, heads of movie studios were more difficult to negotiate with than the Soviets.

Is there anything that the Soviets could offer at the negotiating table that would convince you to defer the MX deployment?

The Marines have now suffered casualties in Central America and in Lebanon and many citizens fear another Vietnam. Has the spectre of Vietnam impaired your ability to live up to our defense agreements?

DAILY DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT

- o Is there a "red phone" to the Kremlin on your desk? Has it been used? Have you spoken to Andropov directly?
- o Describe a day in the life of the President. Do you have time for a quiet breakfast with the First Lady?
- o Was there any aspect of the day-to-day job that was unexpected?
- o The President's communication system: is there such a thing as making a simple phone call anymore? With an elaborate and sophisticated system, there must be some amusing stories.

ECONOMY

- o The average American's greatest concern is his paycheck. Is the American worker better off now than he was when you were sworn in?

Why don't we hear the term "Reaganonomics" anymore?

Many Americans fear losing jobs to Japanese technology. Should our government subsidize our high technology companies as the Japanese do?

What impact does being a child of the depression have on you in the presidency?

OTHER TOPICS

- o Every President has a strong sense of his place in history. Which former Presidents do you admire most?
- o President Kennedy's most frustrating aspect of the job was trying to implement his programs in the face of a vast and unyielding federal bureaucracy. What's your greatest frustration as President?
- o Apparently you don't mind a little ribbing. Do you have a favorite Reagan joke?
- o What is the single most difficult decision you have had to make since becoming President?
- o Are the conversations and meetings in the Oval Office taped?
- o Almost every President in recent memory has aged dramatically in office. You, in contrast, seem remarkably fit after 3 years. How do you do it?
- o How do you relax? How do you keep the office and personal life separate?
- o How much did Mrs. Reagan have to do with your being in office?

FIRST LADY PARTICIPATION

- o How do you view your job as First Lady? Is it what you expected? Is it the glamorous job it's cracked up to be?
- o Has the President changed since taking office?
- o What do you talk about after office hours, does he take the office home with him?
- o How do you feel when reading things about the President that aren't true (not caring for poor, equal rights).
- o The President has been repeatedly criticized for being out of touch with women's issues. Is it a bad rap?
- o In previous interview with Griffin, you told him you work very hard to maintain a private life for yourself and the President. Can you give some examples of how you do it?
- o From your perspective, does the job of the Presidency seem to much for one man?
- o Do you think America is ready for a woman president.

PRESIDENTIAL REMARKS: NATIONAL AQUARIUM SOCIETY BENEFIT
FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 23, 1983

Nancy and I are delighted to have all of you here but Nancy says I have to behave today, so I guess I can't tell any fish stories. Well, maybe just one.

I think it's accurate to say that all of us are here because of the "one that didn't get away." Thanks to the generosity and the hard work of those of you here today, not only has the National Aquarium been saved, it is an even greater influence in the life of Washington than it was.
