I. PURPOSE

To review with the Republican Congressional Leadership your START/Build-down decisions for the new round of negotiations in Geneva and to discuss the legislative agenda for the remainder of this session of Congress.

II. BACKGROUND

The President last met with the GOP leadership a week ago. At that time, the leaders were encouraged to support the War Powers Resolution on Lebanon and a responsible continuing resolution. The Congress subsequently acted favorably on both.

This week is highlighted by the bipartisan support being given to the President's decisions on START/Build-down. While the President has met with Cohen/Nunn/Percy and Aspin/Dicks/Gore on Monday and a bipartisan group of members on Tuesday, a short briefing of the GOP leaders on your decisions should help solidify and continue building congressional support.

As Congress prepares to take next week off for Columbus Day, attention is already being focused on those legislative items that need action prior to the end of this session of the Congress. The target date for adjournment is November 18th. Much priority work must be completed, in one or both houses, including appropriations bills, Export Administration Act, intelligence authorization, IMF, crime bill, tuition tax credits, enterprise zones, immigration, Project Democracy, debt ceiling extension, natural gas deregulation and the Civil Rights Commission nominations. The GOP leadership would welcome Presidential guidance on the Administration priorities.

TALKING POINTS ON ARMS CONTROL

- As you know, we have been consulting with the Congress and the Scowcroft Commission over the summer months on arms control matters and there has been quite a bit of interchange.
- As a result of that effort and the efforts of the State Department and ACDA, I have announced a number of decisions and, as a result, Ambassador Rowny is carrying back new instructions to Geneva.
- I will ask Ron Lehman to brief you on the specifics including a mutual guaranteed build-down, but before doing so I want to emphasize that if we are to convince the Soviets to negotiate seriously we must present a united front. We have already received strong bipartisan endorsement. The Soviets must not see advantage in waiting -- and hope to encourage divisions within our country.
- I need your strong support for these arms control initiatives. They are fair and they are balanced.
- The more you support these efforts the greater are the chances for getting a meaningful agreement.

TALKING POINTS ON LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

- Understand that when you return from the Columbus Day recess, you'll be making a concerted effort to complete this session of Congress by November 18th. I've cut short my Asian trip to make sure the store is still here when I return.
- Much work remains to be done before adjournment. Let me highlight our priorities and get your reaction.
- Top priority must be to complete all the outstanding appropriation bills. Stress importance of Defense appropriations, including MX.
- Hopeful that export administration, federal supplemental benefits extension, revenue sharing, IMF, project democracy and intelligence authorization can be concluded successfully.
- Need to pass a debt limit extension -- distasteful as that is -- clean in the Senate.
- Encourage Senate to consider natural gas deregulation and the crime bill this fall.
- Howard and Bob Dole have pledged to me that tuition tax credits would be on the Senate floor as an amendment to an important bill before the end of this session.

I know it will be a difficult debate and a filibuster is likely but I am committed to doing everything possible to see this program enacted.

--- On enterprise zones, we have a pledge from Dan Rostenkowski to have hearings soon. If the Senate passes it again this fall, I am hopeful we can get something enacted.

--- On immigration reform, I proposed this initiative, I supported the Senate bill and I support House action. We hope the House leadership will allow consideration as soon as possible.

--- I remain firmly committed to our 3 Civil Rights Commission nominees and want them to be confirmed promptly.

--- Finally, if there's time this fall, I hope school prayer and trade reorganization could be considered by the Senate and bankruptcy reform by the House.

--- It's an ambitious agenda. Would welcome your thoughts.

--- Howard-----then Bob.

- Why are there 20,000 bankruptcies in this country? Why are the airlines going under? Do you anticipate a return to regulation of the airlines?

ECONOMY

- As Senator Dole and others have suggested, will you call an "economic summit" of Congressional leaders to lower the deficits?
- Will you consider raising taxes next year to lower the deficit?
- Do you expect interest rates to come down?

EDUCATION

- The National Education Association and other educational groups have endorsed Mondale for President, apparently in response to your budget cuts for education and your support of "merit pay" for teachers. Will you have any new education initiatives to win back support from these groups?

NATIONAL INDUSTRIAL POLICY

- The Democrats are developing a National Industrial Policy. Are you developing a similar policy or don't you think it's necessary?

FCC

- You recently had a meeting with Chairman Mark Fowler of the FCC regarding television syndication rights. What is your position on this and do you feel it was proper to have Chairman Fowler come in on this issue?

POSSIBLE QUESTIONS - FOREIGN

KAL

- Are there any more sanctions being contemplated in response to the KAL plane incident?

LEBANON

- When are the Marines coming home from Lebanon?
- Is the Soviet influence on Syria no longer as strong as it once was?
- Has there been a shift in the attitude of our government toward Syria?
- Polls continue to show that the American people are confused and uneasy over our presence in Lebanon. Are vital U.S. interests really at stake?
- The Druze forces have set up their own administration in the Chouf mountains. Is this another step closer to the partitioning of Lebanon?

PHILIPPINES

- What will your not going have on U.S.-Philippines relations?
- Is the Marcos government in danger of falling? If so, how would this affect U.S.-Philippine relations?

U.S.-SOVIET RELATIONS

- On the surface and after Andropov's harsh statements last week, it appears to many that U.S.-Soviet relations are deteriorating further. Just how bad is the state of relations between us, and what are the chances of improvement over the months ahead?
- In retrospect, do you think that maybe you reacted too strongly to the Soviets' shooting down Korean Airline flight 007?
- With the missile deployments in Europe fast approaching, how do you expect the Soviets to react?

CENTRAL AMERICA

- Your Administration's policies in Central America have so far failed to attract the support of the American people, and the public does not seem to understand our involvement there. Can you explain what you are trying to accomplish?
- Are things improving?
- What has brought about this improvement?
