"Good Morning America's" major focus will be on the President's political announcement, campaigning as a sitting President, and the personal aspects of campaigning.

Other areas will include, to a lesser degree, the State of the Union address and the Middle East.

The interview will air on "Good Morning America" on Tuesday, January 31, at 7:00 am.

Following introductions, the interview will proceed (from the wing chairs).

The following questions concerning the political aspects of the presidency and your personal feelings toward the upcoming campaign are provided for your consideration:

- What do you think of the Democratic candidates?
- What kind of campaign do you plan to run? Will you be an active campaigner? What advantages do you have as President in that regard?
- As a candidate, what do you feel are your vulnerable points? Your strong points?
- What do your polls tell you? How do you feel about polls, whether they are accurate?
- Looking back over the last 3 years, how do you rate your time in office, the success of your policies?

The following topics regarding the State of the Union address will be raised:

Space Station Proposal:

- The U.S. space station would be a multi-purpose, permanently manned facility orbiting the earth.
- It would serve as a national research laboratory for both government and industry.
- Satellites and other payloads would be assembled and repaired at the facility.
- Ultimately, the station would serve as a staging base for additional space initiatives.
- Most importantly, the U.S. space station would serve as a place where new technologies and new industries will be created.

Deficit Downpayment Panel:

- "Less contentious" spending cuts proposed in the past.
- Proposals for closing tax loopholes developed by the Treasury Department, but as yet unpassed.
- Outlay savings based on the work of the Grace Commission.
- Nothing is foreclosed for consideration.

Tax Simplification:

- The Treasury plan by December, 1984.
- To make the tax system more fair for all taxpayers.
- To bring the underground economy into the sunlight.
- To make the tax base broader so personal tax rates could come down, not go up.

On foreign policy:

What political ramifications could result from a continued U.S. Marine presence in Lebanon?

- Stability in Lebanon is key to avoiding war between Israel and Syria.
- Stability in Lebanon is threatened by the spectre of Syrian intervention and the menace of state-sponsored terrorism.
- If terrorists prevail in Lebanon, they will be emboldened to challenge objectives of free peoples around the world.
- We cannot simply walk away from the commitment we have undertaken to help resolve Lebanon's tragedy.
- We do not intend that our forces should remain in Lebanon indefinitely. On the contrary we will leave just as soon as we are assured of progress on the diplomatic front.
- Our steadfastness is critical to the peace and stability in the entire Middle East, a region vital to U.S. and Allied security.
- Our presence provides confidence to the Government of President Gemayel enabling him to deal fairly with the legitimate demands of the opposing factions.
- If we leave precipitously we will be seen as an unreliable partner in the quest for peace and security in the Middle East.
- Withdrawal under pressure would lead others in the Middle East and in the world who rely on U.S. leader-ship and support to question the value of that support.
