#### TALKING POINTS

- 1. I know the suspense is over now that I've sent the signal about the campaign, but we still have to mind the store and I just wanted to start by telling you how important it is that you and I do "mind the store" in the election year.
- 2. We also need, as I've said before to get our message to the American people. And I can use all of you to help do that.
- 3. I think the message is a simple one--AMERICA IS BACK.
  - And, we can go ahead and ask people if they think they are better off today than they were four years ago.
- 4. Before I turn this over to some fellows I've asked to organize this campaign, I'd like to say how much I appreciate the loyal dedication and hard work all of you have demonstated. We wouldn't be enjoying the success we have in several areas right now if it wasn't for the fact that we've all worked together to make it happen.
  - Now I know you're going to get briefed here and later today at lunch, but I'd like you to know that a winning strategy is one that requires assistance from every one of you. I hope that you'll understand when the campaign office calls with a request that we really need your help.
- 5. Let me turn this over to Jim Baker. I've asked Jim to coordinate this campaign effort here at the White House. Jim, why don't you begin the briefing now that I've gotten their attention.

#### TALKING POINTS

- -- My reason for being with you today is twofold: First, to thank you again for the support you have demonstrated for our programs. We owe a large portion of our success to you.
- -- My second reason is to ask you to help us finish the job to ensure steady economic growth well into the future.
- -- The key is for government to spend no more than it takes in.
- -- The economic recovery program that we have pursued -- tax cuts, spending reduction, regulatory relief, and monetary stability -- has not always been popular. Our critics christened it "Reaganomics." It's funny, but now that the program is showing results, they don't call it that anymore.
- -- You, our friends in the business community, stood by us in the dark days of skepticism. You have been the strength of our support, and I thank you for your efforts.
- -- But the work is not complete. In fact, the most difficult times may be coming upon us now, for today we must face all the "born again" budget balancers.
- This afternoon, you have been briefed by Don Regan and Joe Wright on the specifics of our budget proposal, and in a few minutes you will hear from Martin Feldstein. I think that the sum of our message to you today is that common-sense budgeting is an important first step toward a decade of economic vigor.
- -- I hope we can count on you to work with us.
