I am writing to you because I know that you are sincere in wanting to bring an end to the current situation of abortion on demand in this land, and because you are in a position to help shape the policy of this Administration toward that end.

I am concerned because of a rumor that I keeping hearing. The rumor goes something like this: soon the White House is going to announce a plan to settle the abortion problem by supporting a compromise solution. That is the rumor. It is a fact that Senator Hatch is going to soon be introducing a new human life amendment, one called the Legislative Authority Amendment, which would simply declare the matter of abortion to be one of Congressional mandate. This Legislative Authority Amendment is widely mis-named a "states' rights" amendment.

My concern is that the rumor and the fact are related, and that the White House may be going to come out in support of the Legislative Authority Amendment. In and of itself that would not necessarily be a bad idea; in fact, a strong case can be made that would be a good idea. However, whether or not it is a good idea depends heavily on how it is done.

If the Administration presently announces support for some compromise like the Legislative Authority Amendment — but does so without having consulted with the right to life it could be buying discord and division rather than support and harmony. I want to see real gains made for the unborn in this Congress; support of the White House, carried on in harmony with the right to life movement, would certainly help achieve such gains.

I am writing to you merely to communicate to you my sense of urgency that right to life consensus be sought before the White House announces any course of action. If you share my concern in this regard, perhaps you can communicate it to the people who need to be aware of it.

Dear Paul:

Thank you for your comments regarding bills which seek to limit the scope and effective-ness of political action committees.

In my view the growth of political action committees has enabled many thousands of people to increase their participation in the political process. One hallmark of such groups is that all contributions to them are, by law, entirely voluntary. This is a healthy situation. The freedom of all Americans to organize themselves voluntarily to affect the course of their government is a precious right.

In the last Congress, almost all Republicans united in vigorous opposition to the Obey-Railsback bill which would have placed new, rigid limits on the right of citizens to contribute to political candidates through political action committees. The Senate did not pass this bill, which narrowly passed the House without any committee hearings and with severely limited debate.

Because many of the supporters of this type of bill were not returned to the Congress, there seems little chance that either House would pass such legislation now.

Our Federal election law is so complex and burdensome currently that virtually every participant could be at the mercy of a selective enforcement process. It would be easy for enforcement officials to cite almost any candidate or committee for some technical infraction. That most certainly is not a healthy situation.

Our election laws need to be simplified rather than made more burdensome. Citizen participation should be encouraged rather than limited. I would surely oppose any bill similar to the Obey-Railsback proposal.

That is why I am asking you to write to Mr. Butler at Proctor and Gamble to commend that company for the contribution it has made to the betterment of America. It is already evident that the filth industry is cranking up a major campaign against Proctor and Gamble for their courage. Paul Weyrich is the key organizer of a surprising number of the conservative organizations and coalitions responsible for political activity now supporting the President.

He is currently the head of the Committee for the Survival of a Free Congress (a PAC), CSFS, Inc., a lobby, and the Free Congress Foundation (for which Connie Marshner works).

Weyrich came to D. C. as press assistant for Senator Gordon Allott of Colorado and later was a top assistant to Senator Carl Curtis of Nebraska. He was the first president of the Heritage Foundation. He was one of the key organizers of both the Senate Steering Committee and the House Republican Study Committee, the two key conservative groups in the Congress. He was one of those who assisted the conservative House and Senate democrats in forming their respective coalitions. He organized and hosts the three coalition meetings: Kingston Group(general conservative, chaired by Dick Dingman); Library Court(pro-family, chaired by Connie Marshner); Stanton Group(foreign affairs, national defense, now chaired by Weyrich himself).

Dear Mr. President:

We have three different coalitions consisting of more than sixty different groups which work on a wide range of issues. Perhaps the only issue upon which everyone in these coalitions was united concerned the effort to limit the effectiveness of political action committees. In the last session of congress the specific measure was known as the Obey-Railsback Bill. It passed the House but died in the Senate under the threat of a filibuster.

The organized left in this country intends to make a major push for this legislation and, in doing so, they will have the cooperation of much of the nation's media, which has bought the Common Cause argument that most politicians in the congress are bought and paid for by the special interests. The Minority Leader, Senator Robert Byrd of West Virginia is dedicated to making this into a major issue for his party. It is conceivable that this measure could pass the congress, although, of course, all of the groups involved in the coalitions are going to do everything possible to stop this legislation.

It would be very helpful in our fight if we could have a pledge from you that you will veto any bill which seeks to limit the scope and effectiveness of political action committees if it passes the congress and comes to you for your signature. All of us involved in the movement for limited government, free enterprise, a strong national defense and traditional family values, would deeply appreciate a committment of this kind from you which we can use to counter the upcoming battle initiative by the political left. We urge you to give this matter your earliest consideration and hope for a favorable reply.

The chairman of the group is Connaught Marshner, who has worked on Capitol Hill for more than 10 years. She is the Chairman of the National Pro-Family Coalition and was Chairman of the Family Policy Advisory Board of the Reagan-Bush campaign. Author of *Blackboard Tyranny*, a critique of public education, she formerly was Education Director for the Heritage Foundation and earlier worked for Rep. Phil Crane. He later worked as special assistant to Senator Carl T. Curtis. He was the founder and first President of the Heritage Foundation. Shortly thereafter he established the Committee for the Survival of a Free Congress as well as the Free Congress Foundation.

721 2nd Street, NE Washington, D.C. 20002 (202) 546-3003 Coalitions for America is a non-partisan group under the sponsorship of the Committee for the Survival of a Free Congress, Inc. It was founded for the purpose of organizing independent organizations to have a collective impact on the important issues of the day. It is classified as a Section 501 (c) (4) organization under the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, and may accept financial support from individuals, companies, associations, or corporations. Contributions are not tax deductible, however.

Although it has a variety of functions, Coalitions for America primarily acts as a coordinating council for the implementation of conservative ideas. Its role is both educational and operational. A forum recently sponsored by Coalitions for America, for example, allowed conservatives to hear from some of the nation's leading defense experts on the subject of military reform. Because of the current Soviet-United States military imbalance, vastly increased defense expenditures will be necessary in the next few years. Conservatives need to consider carefully how to utilize these funds to our best strategic advantage. The forum presented alternatives for reform—alternatives which may be expected to be taken up as legislative action in the future.

Besides its educational and operational role, Coalitions for America gives exposure to the ideas of leading conservative innovators and makes it possible for those ideas to be implemented. It also cooperates with other organizations which need assistance in carrying out worthwhile programs. Major contributions, for example, were made to the Panama Canal Truth Squad effort, as well as to the Defeat Salt II program, which was sponsored by the Conservative Caucus.

Another speafic project of Coalitions for America has been the coordination of the Family Protection Act, which is a major piece of legislation sponsored by U.S. Senator Roger Jepsen of lowa and Rep. Albert Lee Smith of Alabama. It is the focal point of the pro-family agenda in the United States. This legislation could be the most important factor in the 1980's in the effort to assist middle and low income families to survive economically and to sustain traditional values in homes and schools without federal intervention.

In addition, through Coalitions for America, task forces have been organized to prepare the conservative legislative agenda on a whole variety of other issue areas, including economics, the judiciary, consumer affairs, education, child care, health and welfare, budgetary reform, taxes, the Federal Election Commission and so on. The legislative drafting as well as the implementation of these ideas are major projects of Coalitions for America.

Coalitions for America has played, and will continue to play, a key role in bringing together various conservative, business and single issue groups for the purpose of advancing conservative objectives and defeating liberal initiatives at all levels, in all branches of government, on a continuing, day-to-day basis

The coalition meetings are carefully structured and conducted to produce action. Consistent dedication and regular attendance from the participants is required. The chief objective

of the meetings is to formulate strategy and to decide on appropriate action. All participation is voluntary, but there is staff follow-through for each action volunteered. The coalitions have demonstrated that through their collective efforts and dedication to principle, conservatives can have a substantial impact on Capitol Hill and across the nation.

There are presently three coalitions, the Kingston Group, the Library Court Group and the Stanton Group. More than 70 different organizations, groups and committees participate in them.

The Kingston Group. The oldest of the coalitions, Kingston brings together representatives of a broad range of business, conservative and single-issue groups on a weekly basis. Although it began with a small number of conservative activists in the early 1970's, it has grown along with the conservative movement and now includes more than 50 organizations, all dedicated to the ideals of limited government and free enterprise.

The meetings provide an invaluable opportunity for Senators, Members of the House, Administration officials, and key Hill staffers to report on proposed or pending legislative initiatives. This enables issue focus groups to alert their grassroots activists on timely questions.

During the budget fight in 1981, for example, the Kingston Group played a key role from beginning to end. As the

Minority Whip in the House, Rep. Trent Lott, wrote: "I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Kingston Group members for your hard work on behalf of the Reagan bi-partisan budget substitute. Your grassroots effort was pivotal in this critical victory.

"You and the interest groups you represent are to be congratulated. It is understandable that people put their time and money into a project in which they have a specific interest, but on the budget you helped simply because you believed it

was in the best interest of the American people and the economy."



Richard B. Dingman

The Kingston Group is chaired by Richard B. Dingman. He is the Director of the Republican Study Committee and has served in various capacities on Capitol Hill for many years. A former elected official in one of the Washington area suburbs, Dingman has an excellent grasp of how the political process works.

Since its first meetings, the Kingston Group has been involved in nearly all of the important legislative battles which have taken place over the past several years. Some of the legislation it has dealt with

includes the Consumer Protection Act, Labor Law Reform,

Common Situs Picketing, Taxpayer Funding of Congressional Elections, the Repeal of the Harch Act, and so on. The group has acted on literally hundreds of legislative initiatives and now, thanks to a better political climate for conservatives, is advancing from merely trying to stop liberal measures to taking initiative in pursuing conservative reforms. Kingston has been a successful prototype; similar groups are now meeting in other parts of the United States, remaining in close rouch with the Washington group.

The Library Court Group. Formed in 1979, this coalition seeks to coordinate the activities of the growing number of organizations concerned with education and social issues.

More than 30 separate entities now participate regularly in the Library Court Coalition, which meets every other week. The oim is to work to protect the family and to promote social policies which support traditional values, such as the work ethic and a sense of individual responsibility. Representatives of the various organizations volunteer at the meetings to undertake specific tasks, thus maximizing the effectiveness of each constituent group and the coalition as a whole.

The Library Court Group also sponsors the Legislative Exchange Action Force (LEAF). LEAF funds a phone bank operation to alert the extensive grassroots network interested in family issues when pressing business requires immediate action. Many participants in the group represent organizations with newspapers, newsletters and radio and television programs. Collectively they have the ability to reach millions of people on major issues.

During the last two years of the Carter Administration, the Library Court Group concentrated on stopping liberal initiatives, such as the so-called Domestic Violence Act, and on helping to derail the White House Conference on Families. Now, however, the group is working closely with various Administration officials to implement positive programs and reforms which pro-family groups believe are in the best interests of the nation.

MEETING IN HOUSTON WITH GRASSROOTS HISPANIC LEADERS

Rick Roldan of our staff set up a meeting for me in Houston with 11 grassroots Hispanic leaders. All of these people had supported Ronald Reagan for President in 1980. Most of them had supported Gov. Clements and some of the other statewide GOP candidates as well. They were Republicans, Independents and Democrats. Nine of the eleven were more or less conservative. Two of the others were moderates in the true sense of that word.

I polled them about whether they thought Ronald Reagan could carry Texas in 1984. One thought he could for sure. Another wasn't sure, but hoped so. Nine said there was no way even though six of these nine would vote for him if he runs in 1984. Interestingly all eleven said John Tower was in better shape than Reagan and all eleven said that Tower can win if he runs and all eleven will enthusiastically support Tower, who, they say, is the only GOP candidate who relates to the Hispanic community.

The meeting took place at LUCAC Council #60 in Houston. The group included Joseph Pena who is 1st V.P. and Comptroller for Underwood, Neuhaus and Co., Angel Abitua, a State Employment Officer, Al Vera, a High School teacher, Luis Adame, who owns a catering business, Al and Rosemarry Gonzales, who own a small engineering consulting firm, Manuel Leal, an assistant U.S. attorney and Olga Soliz, a businessman. I will have the names of the others later.

These people had very strong views about why the Republicans, with the exception of Senator Tower, do poorly in the Hispanic community.

Basically they said that the various Hispanic leaders who claim to speak for them are self-created and don't really represent their views but that the GOP and the Administration continue to deal with these people and consequently they retain their credibility. "They are the only ones who will listen to us" one of them said.

Another said that Hispanics have chosen to obey the law and work within the system while certain prominent Blacks chose civil disobedience, riots and flaunting the law. In return for their working within the system they see the Blacks rewarded and themselves neglected.

Leal said that the Hispanic community offers "a whole culture which is right in line with your principles" and yet Republicans make little effort to appeal to Hispanics on cultural grounds. "We are family people. We are church people. The liberals give us their solutions. They relate to us. Conservatives don't offer us the way out even though we are made to receive the message," he said.

They believe that Gov. Clements and other Republicans failed to do well in their area because "the party chose not to do grass roots campaigning. They put everything into TV. They were Country Club campaigners.

All of them have very strong views about immigration. They want the current laws enforced. They believe and say they have evidence that various Mexicans pay off border patrol people to get back in the country. They cited one fellow who has been working in the U.S. for 15 years. Everytime he wants a vacation to see his family, he turns himself back in and gets a free ride back but in a month is back in the U.S.

They despise the amnesty provision in the immigration bill but like the provision which penalizes employers for hiring illegal aliens.

They are very angry about the SBA. They believe strongly that they are discriminated against by the SBA. even when they have a long record of stability. They came forth with a lot of particulars which I did not really grasp. I promised that I would call this to the attention of the White House, without holding out any hope that something would be done about it.

To a person they accused the current GOP leadership in Texas, as well as nationally, of insensitivity. They said that in their areas it comes down to a contest of "which candidate or which party is going to take care of the little guy" and they said Republicans are seldom in the ballgame because "they don't speak the right language."

"I will tell you this, the people will take care of the insensitivity at the polls next time", Abitua said.

Interestingly all of them want a tough policy on El Salvador. They said if the GOP campaigned on strong defense and military action in the Hispanic community there would be an emotionally favorable response. "We are patriotic people" said Adame who was the least conservative of those attending. When I asked Olga Soliz what sort of policy she favored in El Salvador she said "send in the marines" which caused the three other women in attendance to clap affirmatively.

They have an abiding distrust of the business establishment in Houston which they think wants to settle undesirables in their areas, thus creating a problem for them. They asked why these people don't choose to settle refugees from Central America in their own neighborhoods. There is obviously rivalry between groups here.

They felt the GOP could do better with a strong direct mail campaign, which they said, the Democrats used to great advantage.

Most of them want to support GOP candidates in 1984 but they feel that their views will be shunted aside.
