Dear Member,

Larry and his wife sold their couch, chairs, and refrigerator, and gave their stove to a friend. Then they packed what little they had left into one of their two cars. They ate and slept and "lived" in the other one.

It was pure misery. Larry's 20-year-old wife Becky can tell you: "It was bad! We'd get so cold at night we'd have to wake up and start the car so the heater would keep us warm. But we didn't get much sleep anyway, because there was just no way to roll over and get comfortable."

Every day Larry looked for work -- as a truck driver, mechanic, construction worker, factory worker -- anything! But it was always the same response: "Sorry, no openings."

Shortly before their baby was born, the Barneses traded one of their cars for an old camper. But it was without

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electricity or plumbing, so they still had to walk half a mile to a gas station to use the bathroom and fill up their five-gallon water jug. They had no place to bathe.

And while President Reagan was busy using his power and influence to block a jobs bill that might have put Larry to work, Larry was struggling just to survive.

Because of the unfair budget cutbacks in social services, there was no help available for the Barnes family. And they couldn't even afford the few dollars a week it took for propane to heat their camper.

By spring, all they had to live on was \$128 a month in food stamps, plus the fish Larry could catch from a nearby river, and the rabbits he could hunt illegally at night. It was a matter of survival, and Larry rationalized: "But when you're hungry, you do what you have to do."

Last fall, Becky's folks in Nebraska suggested she and Larry and the baby move to Lincoln where Larry could look for work. They did, and stayed with Becky's sister's family.

But cramped living quarters and limited financial resources took a mounting toll in frustration and tension. Finally, after a family quarrel, the Barneses had to leave.

Other than their clothes, the only personal possessions they had left were a Bible and their baby's pictures. They even had to borrow \$3 from the police for gas to drive to an emergency shelter.

Today they live in an old house trailer and exist on \$297 a month in assistance and a reduced amount of food stamps.

The baby's formula never lasts a full month, so Becky has to borrow money from her dad to feed the baby. Larry still looks for work almost every day, but the response is always the same: "We'll call you when we get something." But they never do.

It's been a humiliating and demoralizing experience. Larry Barnes' dream of security, health and happiness for his family is shattered, and he can't understand why.

"I've always believed that if a man wanted to make anything of his life, he had to go out and work for it. And that's what I've done nearly all my life. But now I'm right back where I started -- with nothing."

The thing that really angers me about Larry Barnes' story is that while this man -- and millions more like him

-- are struggling to survive, we've got an administration in the White House that seems insensitive to the pain and anguish so many Americans are suffering.

All Larry really wants is a job and a chance to live his dream. What he has is a lot of Reaganomics political palaver about "trickle down" and "gradual recovery."

At no time during the past 42 years -- under any Democratic or Republican administration -- has unemployment been as high as it has been under Ronald Reagan. An astounding national average of 10.1 percent in April of this year!

So you see, I have good reason to be angry. The staggering problem of unemployment is literally tearing our country apart at the seams! These are the facts:

- Today, more and more people are being treated for mental health problems and severe depression.
- Severe family quarrels are on the increase, along with instances of wife beating and child abuse.
- The suicide rate is up.
