Elie Wiesel, an internationally acclaimed author, serves as the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University. Before being appointed Chairman of the United States Holocaust Memorial Council, he served as Chairman of the President's Commission on the Holocaust.

Mr. Wiesel is widely regarded as the preeminent spokesman for the victims of the Holocaust. Mr. Wiesel's first book, Night, relates in understated yet overpowering detail his experience as a boy in Auschwitz and Buchenwald, where his mother, father, and younger sister died. Night has been described by Francois Mauriac as "different, distinct, unique...a book to which no other could be compared," and the New York Times has called it "A slim volume of terrifying power."

Although Mr. Wiesel has written other notable books on the Holocaust, the scope of his work spans biblical studies, portraits of the Hasidic masters, and moral responsibility in today's world. His books include: Dawn; The Accident; The Town Beyond the Wall; The Gates of the Forest; Beggar in Jerusalem; The Oath; The Jews of Silence; Zalmen, or The Madness of God; Legends of Our Time; One Generation After; Souls on Fire: Portraits and Legends of Hasidic Masters; A Jew Today; The Testament; Five Biblical Portraits; and Somewhere a Master.

The holder of honorary doctorates from many academic institutions, Mr. Wiesel has also received the National Jewish Book Council Awards in 1964 and 1973, the Jewish Heritage Award for Literature in 1966, and the 1968 Prix Medicis for Beggar in Jerusalem.

He lives with his family in New York City.

Mr. Wiesel was born in Sighet, Romania, 30 September 1928. His education was received from numerous institutes: Sorbonne, Paris, France, 1947-50; Litt.D. (Hon.) Jewish Theology Seminary, N.Y.C. 1967; Dr. Humane Letters, Hebrew Union College, 1968; Manhattanville College, 1972, Yeshiva University, 1973; Boston University, 1974; D.H.L., Spertus College of Judaica, Chicago, 1973; Wesleyan University, 1979; Notre Dame University, 1980; Anna Maria College, 1980; Brandeis University, 1980; Dr. Philosophy (Hon.) Bar-Ilan University (Israel), 1973; LL.D., Hofstra University, 1975; Talmudic University, Florida, 1979; Litt.D., Marquette University, 1975; Simmons College, 1976; St. Scholastica College, 1978; Yale University, 1981, Marian Erster Rose, 1969;

Mr. Wiesel came to the U.S. in 1956 and was naturalized in 1963. In the past he has been a Distinguished Professor at New York University, 1972; Andrew Mellon Professor in the humanities at Boston University, 1976, and also the recipient of the Prix Rivarol, 1964, Jewish Heritage award, 1965; Remembrance award, 1965; Prix Medicis, 1968; Prix Bordin, French Academy, 1972; Eleanor Roosevelt Memorial award, 1972; American Liberties medallion American Jewish Community, 1972; Martin Luther King, Jr., award, New York University, 1973; and Faculty Distinguished Scholar award Hofstra University, 1973-74

PETER THOMAS BAUER

Professor Bauer is currently a Professor of Economics (with special reference to economic development and under-developed countries) at the University of London, School of Economics since 1960; and holds the distinction as a Fellow of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge 1946-60 and since 1968. His education comes from Scholae Piai, Budapest; Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge - and was a lecturer at Agricultural Economics, University of London, 1947-48; University Lecturer in Economics, Cambridge University 1948-56; Smuts Reader in Commonwealth Studies, Cambridge University 1956-60. Some of his publications are The Rubber Industry, 1948; West African Trade, 1954; The Economics of Under-developed Countries (with B.S. Yamey), 1957; Economic Analysis and Policy in Under-developed Countries, 1958; Indian Economic Policy and Development, 1961, (with B.S. Yamey) Markets, Market Control and Marketing Reform, 1968; Dissent on Development, 1972; Aspects of Nigerian Development, 1974; Equality, the Third World and Economic Delusion, 1981; articles on economic subjects.

Professor Bauer was born 6 November 1915.

Dr. H. Joachim Maitre

Dr. H. Joachim Maitre is the senior editor, Axel Springer Publishing Company, and managing director, Ullstein Publishing Company. He is a well-known journalist in Germany. As the senior editor, his articles appear in a number of Springer publications, and he is best known for his in-depth studies of current defense and political issues.

Dr. Maitre, a former MiG pilot trainee, defected and left East Germany illegally in 1953, and eventually became a Canadian citizen.

Dr. Maitre was born in 1934 in Gerlachshain (Silesia), raised in Bernau/Berlin (Brandenburg), attended "Geschwister-Scholl-Schule" in Bernau (secondary education); membership and activities in communist youth organizations "Freie Deutsche Jugend", "Gesellschaft fuer Deutsch-Sowjetische Freundschaft", and the paramilitary organization "Gesellschaft fuer Sport und Technik". He was awarded the "Abzeichen fuer Gutes Wissen in Gold".

He studied at Muenster, Bonn and Innsbruck universities (German literature and philology, geography, physical education, and journalism). In 1959-60, he was editor of the Bonn University students' journal "spuren". He undertook lengthy trips to the Middle East (1957), Portugal and Spain (1958), Canada and USA (1959). In the USA, he worked as a camp counselor in Vermont. He concluded his studies in 1961 (Staatsexamen at Bonn University).

In August 1961, he became a lecturer (modern languages) at the University of Nigeria, Nsukka (Eastern Nigeria). Between 1961 and 1963, he had press assignments in Central, Western and Eastern Africa. As of 1962, he made regular contributions for "Die Welt" in Hamburg.

Dr. Maitre left Nigeria in the fall of 1963 in order to pursue graduate studies at McGill University in Montreal. He concluded his doctoral thesis (on Thomas Mann) in May of 1965. Thereafter, he held a professorship at McGill (1965-70), 1973-); full tenure as of 1973; acting chairman from 1974 to 1976. While on leave from McGill University, he was the editor of "Welt des Buches", the weekly literary supplement of "Die Welt" (1971 to April 1973). While with "Die Welt" newspaper, he made repeated trips to South Vietnam.

In 1976/1977, he was a National Fellow at the Hoover Institution (Stanford University) and Fellow, National Endowment for the Humanities.
