PROPOSAL

To establish a Presidential national security and arms reduction advisory panel to be chaired by a woman and staffed with women members.

PANEL DESCRIPTION

It will be the responsibility of the Advisory Panel to work closely with members of the White House staff, the National Security Council, the Departments of State and Defense, the USIA and any other agencies or departments involved in national security and arms reduction activity. The panel would be responsible for making specific recommendations for Administration policies in the field of national security and arms reduction by compiling and coordinating ideas for the private sector, including women's organizations, career women, unions, special interest groups, Congressional organizations and other groups interested in national security and arms reduction.

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF PANEL

To form a bi-partisan women's committee on national security and arms control issues who would serve as effective public spokesmen for Administration positions.

Although there are many organizations throughout the United States which support the Administration in the areas of national security and arms control, we need to develop a stronger rapport with women's groups. This should be done so that the Administration will be able to solicit their support and form a strong, effective private sector team.

PLAN AND METHOD OF SETTING UP PANEL

It is anticipated that after this panel is appointed and duly empaneled, and additionally following necessary briefings, the chairman and members of the panel would serve as effective public spokesmen for Administration positions in this area. Steps to be taken to effectuate this panel are as follows:

- Develop a list of potential members for the panel, utilizing OPL portfolio managers and Presidential Personnel specialists and other resources at our disposal.
- 2. Obtain clearance and review (in advance) through Ed Rollins' office.
- 3. This Presidential activity is normally covered by the Federal Committee Advisory Act as amended (5 U.S.C. App. I), and Jonathan Vipond has verbally reviewed the proposal with Fred Fielding's office for any necessary legal preparation. This proposal will be submitted to him for further review.
- 4. Most panels (and Commissions) of this type are given a Presidential charter under which to operate. Our office is now requesting that one be prepared. Attached, find a sample charter of the General Advisory Committee on Arms Control and Disarmament.
- 5. Ed Harper's office, the National Security Council, and the Department of Defense should be asked to develop the issues to be addressed by this panel.
- 6. OPL, following the above steps, should develop an itinerary for the members of this panel following organizational meetings and briefings to bring them up to speed on various weapons systems and related arms reduction proposals.

This would probably require meetings with Paul Nitze, Ambassador to the Intermediate Range Nuclear Force Negotiation and Edward Rowny, Chief U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Negotiator. OPL office should work with David Gergen's office to develop a communications plan and suggested areas for speaking engagements.

- The OPL office, under the direction of the Project Officer (I assume this is me) will be asked to monitor the progress of the program.
- 8. Since there is little or no funding for this project in the OPL budget, we need to immediately request funds from other agencies, such as, the Department of Defense, the National Security Council, the Department of State and other potential support groups.

BACKGROUND MEMORANDUM Supplement to: Proposal for a Presidential National Security and Arms Reduction Advisory Panel

The description of the above-named panel makes it clear that it would serve not only as an advisory group to the President, making recommendations for policies in the fields of national security and arms reduction, but also would be an advocacy group on behalf of the 'President's policies in national security, defense and arms reduction. (Please refer to panel description in section entitled, "Proposal and Panel Description.")

DESCRIPTION OF GENERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT AGENCY:

The advisory committee to ACDA was organized to provide a body of <u>experts</u> to advise the director of ACDA and the President on arms control issues. It is not the role of the general advisory committee to be an advocate, but to give objective, professional, outside advice on arms control. It is a 15-man advisory board, traditionally manned by experts in the area of arms control, national security and Soviet policy.

CONCLUSION:

These two groups would not compete with each other nor be in conflict on the basis of the charter of the general advisory committee and/or the proposed charter of the Presidential National Security and Arms Reduction Advisory Panel. JAMPLE)

GENERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON ARMS CONTROL AND DISARMAMENT

CHARTER

- (A) The official designation of the Committee is the General Advisory Committee.
- (B) The objectives and the scope of the activity of the Committee as set forth in Section 26 of the Arms Control and Disarmament Act (22 U.S.C. 2566) are to advise the Director of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA) on arms control and disarmament policy and activities, and from time to time to advise the President, the Secretary of State and the Disarmament Director respecting matters affecting arms control, disarmament and world peace.
- (C) The Committee carries out its purposes on a continuing basis.
- (D) The Committee is a Presidential Advisory Committee and advises the President, the Secretary of State and the Director of ACDA as set forth in paragraph (B). Management functions with respect to the Committee have been delegated to the Director of ACDA.
- (E) ACDA is responsible for providing the necessary support for the Committee.
- (F) The duties of the Committee are set out in paragraph (B) above and are solely advisory.
- (G) The estimated annual operating costs for the Committee are \$250,000 and 2.6 man-years.
- (H) It is estimated that the Committee will meet several times per year and that each meeting will last for approximately two days.
- The Committee has no termination date; however, pursuant to Section 14 of the Federal Advisory Committee Act (U.S.C. App. I) and regulations promulgated thereunder, the Committee will terminate on January 5, 1985 unless renewed by the President for successive two-year periods.
- (J) This charter is filed effective January 5, 1983.

- (C) In order to assure the Committee carries out effectively its purposes on a continuing basis, the Members will be appointed for staggered terms.

SUBJECT:

Appointment of Citizens Advisory Panels Chaired by Women to Arms Reduction Talks

In order to increase the visible participation of younger women in the defense and nuclear debate, I suggest that we consider appointing two citizens advisory panels - one for Ambassador Nitze and the INF talks and one for Ambassador Rowney for START. The panels would be named by the President and consist of approximately five to seven members each. The chairman of each group would be a woman with children, preferably of draft age. The majority of the members in each group would be women who, after briefing, could serve as effective public spokesmen for Administration positions on defense and arms control generally. The announcement and appointment of such advisory panels would receive maximum publicity.

Secretary Shultz and I have discussed this proposal informally. He favors the idea. I have not as yet spoken to Judge Clark. I will work with Secretary Shultz, Judge Clark, Dave Gergen and Ed Rollins to assemble names and prepare a plan if you approve.

POINT PAPER MX PEACEKEEPER

The President's bipartisan Commission on Strategic Forces recommended a package of actions, including deploying 100 MX missiles in existing silos and commencing work on a small missile. The President has endorsed the Commission's recommended package.

Background

Specific recommendations of the President's program follow:

- Proceed with immediate production of the PEACEKEEPER missile, and deployment of 100 such missiles in existing Minuteman silos.
- Start work on a small, single-warhead ICBM -- full scale development in 1987 and deployment in the early 1990's are contemplated.
- Continue to pursue ambitious and objective arms reduction negotiations with a goal of agreements that are balanced, promote stability, constitute significant force reductions, and are verifiable.
- Improve strategic command, control, and communications; continue with the Trident submarine, D-5 missile, the bomber and air-launched cruise missile efforts as planned.
- Expand research into, and undertake the most vigorous examination of, all forms of defense against ballistic missiles.
- Undertake a specific program on hardness, and a study of fratricide and research on different types of landbased vehicles and launchers.

Additional Background:

Need MX deployment to resolve four major issues:

- Aging Force (Titan 1962, MM II 1965, MM III 1970)
- Ineffective prompt capability against targets most important to Soviets (Military and leadership installations - many of which are hardened and time-urgent)
 - Influences Soviet perceptions
- Arms control leverage
- NATO theater nuclear moderization

Cost for President's program less than previous ICBM programs.

- \$10B less than Closely Spaced Basing (CSB) and \$30B less than Multiple Protective Shelters (MPS)
- Saves \$1.4B in FY 84, more in later years.

Arms reductions supported by President's program:

- MX gives near-term arms reduction leverage
 - -- Encourage Soviet participation in reduction talks (historical evidence: successful negotiations of 1972 ABM Treaty)
- Small missile development gives opportunity for US/Soviet agreement to deploy more stable, low value systems.

MX, then, is required now to bolster deterrence and support near term arms reduction endeavors, while small missile supports longer term prospects for mutually stabilizing force structure.
