Dear Mr. Blackwell:

Thank you for your note of May 26, 1981. I know of no organization called the "National Coalition on Abortion Rights." However, I suppose it is possible that such a group exists and that they may have requested a meeting with President Reagan.

June 1, 1981

As executive director of the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights, I have been delegated to facilitate a meeting between the President and the head officials of 22 national religious organizations, representing most of the mainline Protestant and Jewish denominations. The names of those prominent leaders were signed on a letter to the White House dated January 28, 1981.

In view of the fact that these people are the religious leaders of organizations representing some 35 million Americans, including the denominations in which the President himself holds membership, I am sure he would welcome the opportunity for direct dialog with them on an issue that has become so divisive among Americans. In fact, in February I was assured by Gregory Newell that such a meeting would take place.

Because of the unfortunate attempt on the President's life, we refrained from pursuing this matter for a few months. Now that he has resumed a full schedule, we would like to request that a date be set for the meeting as soon as possible.
