RED FLAGS: The time has come to significantly increase meetings and briefings with the conservative organization leadership. I will be proposing a substantial number of these meetings in the next few days.

KUDOS: Kudos to the conservative and pro-life activists who organized the Rally for Life in Dallas on September 3rd. Many of these people are strongly opposed to the O'Connor nomination and deeply concerned about what they perceive as an insensitivity in the Administration to their issues. I have Exposen spoken to several of the speakers and organizers of this rally and have reviewed the news coverage in Dallas, the New York Times story, and wire service dispatches printed elsewhere. In all cases, the speakers carefully distinguished their concerns about O'Connor and the Administration's handling of related matters from their enthusiastic support of the President in their legislative program. Despite numerous attempts from reporters at news conferences and in private interviews, the conservative leaders involved in the program stuck to their praise and support of the President.

CHANGES IN ISSUE FORECAST: One matter which is of increasing concern to conservative groups is the scarcity of record votes in the Congress. The cpnservative organization leadership is now urging conservative leaders in the Congress to begin to begin to produce record votes on their major issues of concern. There have been very few record votes this year on conservative vs. liberal issues, particularly social issues. More votes are necessary if these organizations are to be able to activate the troops in 1982 as they did in 1980 reason to believe their actions would cause big frowns for this end of Pennsylvania Avenue. On some issues, such as the Legal Services Corporation, the Pres ident may be very comfortable in leading the fight, but on others it will be in his best interest to allow the congressional conservatives to organize their own battles. I believe it is highly important that the senior staff not stand in the way of independent congressional efforts to force record votes in a mistaken attempt to maintain an aura of invincibility on the Hill. If conservatives lose some votes, which they obviously must, our posture should be one of allowing the Congress to work its legislative will.


