RED FLAGS: Militance on the O'Connor nomination is increasing among right-to-life and conservative organization leaders. Large public meetings, demonstrations, and mass mailings are being planned. Much of the thrust of these meetings will be damaging because a central theme will be that the President, who repeatedly gave these leaders explicit assurances that Supreme Court justice nominees would be pro-life, has failed to keep that commitment.

Sanders also expressed his personal support for eliminating H.U.D.'s housing authorities which are often in conflict with tribal governments. Sanders is pushing for having Indian housing funds, albeit reduced, provided directly to tribal governments.

Driving Hawk heartily endorses this concept and left the meeting quite pleased.

RED FLAGS: The continued failure to schedule Pro-Family leaders and Veterans leaders with the President is damaging to the credibility of the Administration with these groups. Both groups are important parts of the winning coalition which supported the President last year and worked hard in behalf of the Reagan Bipartisan Budget Resolution. Polite excuses serve only so long. Eventually either these supporters must have reasonable access to the President or they will lose confidence in his Administration. Frequently leaders of these groups comment that the President seems to spend more time with ~~xxxxxxx~~ his political enemies than with his best friends.

KUDOS

The President's decision to defer until this fall any policy statement regarding the 1965 Voting Rights Act was exactly right. This issue must eventually be determined, but there was no need in crossing that bridge until we get there. Conservative groups overwhelmingly favor termination of the pre-clearance provision of the act, which would still prohibit election changes which would damage voting rights. What is most obnoxious CHANGES IN ISSUE FORECAST: is the pre-clearance provision for jurisdiction which have a perfect record in these matters and have had no problems since 1965.
